#### Man sedates, rapes 2 teens in Cox's Bazar

Two teenage girls were raped by a youth in a village of Cox's Bazar Chakaria upazila on Tuesday night, police said.

The father of one of the girls filed a case against the accused -- Abu Hasan Mohammad Ibrahim of the same village -- with Chakaria Police Station on

The victims are cousins and aged 14 and 15. They study in class-VIII and -IX.

Quoting the case statement, OC Mohammad Zubair of the police station said one of the girls went to the other's house as the latter's family members were visiting a relative's house in a nearby village.

The girls were alone at home on Tuesday night and when Ibrahim, a neighbour, came to know about it, he went there and tricked the girls into taking food mixed with sleeping pills. Later, he raped them, according to the case statement.

## Engr threatened for not allowing bad bitumen

A contractor has allegedly threatened a railway engineer publicly for not complying with his wishes of using poor materials in a road construction project in

According to locals, contractor Al Amin has been threatening engineer Abdur Razzague for the last two days as the engineer refused to use Iranian bitumen for sealcoating the approaching road of the district's railway station.

Abdul Quader, a resident of the station area, said the contractor threatened the engineer to transfer him elsewhere. The contractor even told locals that he would not finish the project unless the engineer was transferred.

Contacted, the accused said he wanted to finish the project using Iranian bitumen on the road as the BPC (Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation) bitumen was not available in the market. But the engineer did not allow it.

He denied the allegation of threatening the engineer.

Asked, Abdur Razzaque, senior subassistant engineer (SSAE-Works) of the railways, told The Daily Star that the road would not last long if construction work was done with Iranian bitumen.

PAKISTAN RAID BOLIADI The Pakistan army attacked

at least five villages within 30 miles of Dhaka in the last four days, killing Hindu men and burning homes and markets in

pre-dawn raids, reported Washington Star on June 28, 1971. Arriving at one village, Boliadi, the correspondent Arnold Zeitlin passed an army column leaving the place and saw dead Hindu men and the bazaar and houses burning. From nearby villages, rifle fire could be heard and columns of smoke were rising, he added.

Residents of Boliadi said the raids started Friday, the day after the arrival in Dhaka of four members of the British Parliament investigating conditions in East Pakistan and refugee camps in India. The people in Boliadi said the soldiers attacked the Hindu section of their village at 4:00am on June 27. A Hindu woman held her husband in her arms. He had been

shot in the neck. Another sari-clad woman moaned over the body of her husband. Across a small creek in a tiny corrugated iron sheet house lay the body of a white-haired man with a bullet wound in his back. Residents said at least five or six other corpses were in the Zeitlin further reported that the commander of the troop

column identified himself only as Col Omar. He said his men were on a "routine patrol" and refused to give details. He led about two dozen men in regular army uniforms carrying automatic rifles and ammunition boxes.

#### Myanmar torches over \$500m drugs stash

Myanmar authorities torched over half a billion dollars worth of narcotics across the country yesterday, sending opium, heroin and methamphetamine up in smoke as experts warn smugglers have adapted to Covid-19 travel restrictions and are back in business.

Sacks of green-brown cannabis were stacked high at a compound in the commercial capital Yangon, alongside bin-liner-sized bags of red-pink pills, marking one of Myanmar's offerings for the annual World Drug Day burning.

Slabs of heroin, bags of ketamine and tramadol and ice were also laid out on the pyre.

Stashes were also burned at ceremonies held in Mandalay and Taunggyi in Shan State, Myanmar's antidrugs police department said. SEE PAGE 10 COL 6

# Rare giant barking deer spotted in Cambodia

A critically endangered giant barking deer has been spotted in Cambodia for the first time, in a boost for the country's wildlife preservation efforts, officials said Friday.

The giant muntjac -- known for its long antlers -- was captured on a hidden camera in April in northeast Cambodia's Virachey National Park in Ratanakiri province, environment ministry spokesman Neth Pheaktra said. But the discovery was only made recently after

#### Regime forms legal team for ICI



The Myanmar military regime has organised a new legal team, led by its Foreign Minister U Wunna Maung Lwin, to present the defense in the Rohingya genocide case at the International Court of Justice (ICJ).

The regime's order to restructure the committee, which was previously led by detained State Counselor Aung San Suu Kyi, was announced in a bulletin published by the Myanmar Gazette on Thursday.

The panel has eight members, which include two former military officers -- U Wunna Maung Lwin, who will serve as chairman; and the regime's planning, finance and industry minister, U Win Shein. Two serving lieutenant generals -- Yar Pyae and Adjutant General Myo Zaw Thein are also members
