## Swinging between lockdowns

Lack of coordination writ large in govt measures

When the cabinet division decided late into Saturday evening, that the nationwide "total and complete" lockdown would be postponed from June 28 to July 1, and the interim period would consist of a limitedscale or partial countrywide lockdown, many had this question: What does "limited-scale" lockdown even mean?

As the country enforces a partial lockdown from today, the cabinet division yesterday issued a circular outlining how the nation would operate over the next three days leading up to the actual lockdown on July 1.

The new decision comes amid travel restrictions across the country from June 16-July 15.

The government has yet to issue a directive regarding the "total and complete lockdown" even though the Press Information Department earlier said that the cabinet division would issue a gazette regarding the lockdown on Saturday.

As per yesterday's gazette on the three-day partial lockdown, all forms of transport, except rickshaws, will be banned. The government and private offices may remain open with only the essential staff.

"The law enforcement agencies will patrol the streets to ensure this," said the

#### Blast kills at least | Country logs seven, injures 50

Fire service officials suspect AC unit explosion in city's Moghbazar area

At least seven people were killed and over 50 others were injured in an explosion in Dhaka's Moghbazar area yesterday.

Debashis Bardhan, deputy director of (operation and maintenance) of fire service and civil defence, told the The Daily Star, "The explosion took place around 7:35pm at a building on Outer Circular Road. We are primarily suspecting that an air conditioner unit exploded.

"Many people have been injured ... we need more time to get details," he added

Fifteen fire engines were conducting the rescue operations around

Around 10 of the injured had burn injuries and were admitted to the Sheikh Hasina National Institute of Burn and Plastic Surgery. At least 40 others were in treatment at Dhaka Medical College Hospital emergency unit, said hospital sources.

Of the injured, fifteen were said to be in critical condition, the sources

Eyewitness and fire service official said they were suspecting that the explosion took place on the ground floor of the building where an appliance store, an abattoir, a restaurant, and a sweetmeat shop are housed. Accumulated gas in the appliance store could have exploded, an official

"We are analyzing the nature of the explosion ...," said Rahmatullah Chowdhury of the bomb disposal unit.

# highest daily deaths at 119

A total of 119 people died with Covid-19 in Bangladesh in 24 hours until yesterday morning, the biggest figure since the pandemic hit the country.

During the period, 5,268 more people came out positive with the deadly coronavirus in 24,400 sample tests.

The country's daily positivity rate fell to 21.59 percent yesterday from Saturday's 22.50 percent, according to the government data.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh's coronavirus fatality rate rose to 1.60 percent from

Saturdav's 1.59 percent. The new numbers pushed the country's caseload to 888,406 while the death toll to 14,172 vesterday.

Barely two months ago, the country reported 112 deaths in a single day on April 19.

On Saturday, the death toll from Covid-19 in Bangladesh crossed 14,000 mark as health authorities reported 77

### Fear of hard days spurs mad rush

People in their thousands, mostly low-income ones, made desperate bids to leave the capital yesterday ahead of the nationwide complete lockdown

They boarded trucks, pick-ups, three-wheelers, human hauliers and rode motorbikes to go back to their village homes, disregarding the health

Most of the home-goers were low-income people who feared that they would lose their livelihoods in the city and face starvation if the lockdown continues till the Eid-ul-Azha. So they have no way, but to leave Dhaka. Many others who came to the capital from different districts for

treatment or other emergencies were also seen heading for their homes. The government is set to enforce nationwide strict restrictions from today till Wednesday and a complete lockdown from Thursday to curb the

spread of the novel coronavirus. With public transport suspended to and from seven districts around the capital, many took three-wheelers and human hauliers and even got on trucks and pick-ups to reach their destinations in those districts, leading

to traffic congestions on different roads. Meanwhile, thousands of home-goers, including women and children, waited for hours at Shimulia and Paturia ferry terminals to cross the

They took detours and changed vehicles multiple times to go home.

Many others walked long distances to reach their destinations. The exodus began on Saturday after the announcement of a complete

lockdown amid a surge in Covid deaths and infections across the county. In a statement on Friday, the Press Information Department said nobody would be allowed outdoors unless there is an emergency. This was the

#### BUYING VACCINES Momen doubts it'll be smooth

Says global politics at play

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen expressed scepticism about procuring vaccines smoothly saying bilateral cooperation is not the only deciding factor and that issues of global politics are at play.

"We have discovered, with shock and disappointment, that global politics and affluence-power nexus have the overpowering dominance in the global society...," he said at a webinar titled titled "Revisiting Contemporary Peace and Security Challenges in the South Asian Region", organised by Bangladesh Institute of International and Strategic Studies (BIISS) It was attended by

diplomats, academics and government officials.

Momen said due to the sudden rise in Covid-19 cases in neighbouring countries, it is imperative that South Asian nations receive their share of the vaccine without any strings attached.

# AstraZeneca tests booster jab against variants

AstraZeneca and the University of Oxford yesterday began new trials to test a modified vaccine against the Beta variant, which first emerged in South Africa.

The 'booster' vaccine's trial will involve around 2,250 participants from Britain, South Africa, Brazil and Poland.

They include people who have been fully vaccinated with two doses of the original Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine or an mRNA vaccine such as Pfizer as well as those who have not got the jab at all.

AZD2816, has been designed using the same base as the main AstraZeneca shot but with minor genetic alterations to the spike protein based on the Beta variant.

Testing booster doses of existing vaccines and new variant vaccines is important to ensure we are best prepared to stay ahead of the pandemic coronavirus, should their use be needed," said Andrew Pollard, chief investigator and director of the Oxford Vaccine Group at the University of Oxford.

Britain has had a succesful vaccine

The new vaccine, known as roll out programme, but experts do not know how long protection lasts.

"This study will provide vital evidence on whether further doses including 'tweaks' against new virus variants may be needed in the future," said Maheshi Ramasamy, Principal Investigator at the Oxford Vaccine

Initial data from the trial is expected

Current vaccines are believed to be less effective against the Beta variant, although it is the Delta variant, which emerged in India, that is currently
