





FIGHT AGAINST TB, HIV

Bangladesh poised to reach targets

Finds a study

One in every 1,000 tuberculosis (TB) patient in Bangladesh has HIV, found a recent study -- in what can be viewed as a boost to the country's bid to end the infectious disease and meet 90-90-90 targets for HIV by 2030.

Bangladesh -- which is a low-level HIV prevalent country and one of the 30 high TB-burden countries, accounting for 3.6 percent of the global total -- is committed to the two targets as part of the Sustainable Development Goals.

People living with HIV are more likely than others to become sick with TB as HIV weakens the immune system, making it harder for the body to fight TB germs. Globally, TB is one of the leading causes of death among people with

prevalence among tuberculosis patients in Bangladesh was 0.1 percent, found the study styled "HIV Sero Survey among Tuberculosis Patients in Bangladesh, 2019-2020" conducted by the National Institute of Preventive and Social Medicine (NIPSOM) under the Directorate General of Health Services.

The result is very positive for Bangladesh as HIV prevalence in TB patients is a sensitive indicator of the spread of HIV into the general population, said Baizid Khoorshid Riaz, principal investigator and director of

It's a case of suicide, not murder

HC says, acquits deathrow convict

The High Court yesterday acquitted a death-row prisoner convicted of killing his wife in Gournadi, Barishal, in 2010.

The HC concluded that the woman died by suicide and acquitted Mostafa Sarder. The body of Kohinur Begum, 35, was

found in a tin-shed house of her husband, Mostafa Sarder, in February of that year. In 2015, a Barishal court found Mostafa uilty of killing his wife Kohinur and

sentenced him to death. The HC bench of Justice SM Emdadul Hoque and Justice Bhishmadev Chakrabortty yesterday delivered the verdict after hearing on the death reference

and an appeal filed by Mostafa challenging the Barishal court verdict. "After considering the depositions of the prosecution witnesses, post-mortem report and the inquest report, the HC concluded that it was a case of suicide and not homicide," Mostafa's lawyer Mohammad Shishir Manir told The Daily

YAHYA'S LETTER TO NIXON Pakistani President Yahva Khan, in a letter dated June 28, 1971, expressed his

disappointment to American President Richard Nixon at

AstraZeneca tests booster jab against variants

AstraZeneca and the University of Oxford yesterday began new trials to test a modified vaccine against the Beta variant, which first emerged in South Africa.


The 'booster' vaccine's trial will involve around 2,250 participants from Britain, South Africa, Brazil and Poland.

They include people who have been tully vaccinated with two doses of the original Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine or an mRNA vaccine such as Pfizer as well as those who have not got the jab at all.

The new vaccine, known as AZD2816, has been designed using the same base as the main AstraZeneca shot but with minor genetic alterations to the spike protein based on the Beta variant.

Ninetv-three percent of those who received both doses of the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine have developed against Covid-19, according to a study done at Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

Antibody tests were done on 308 fully vaccinated doctors, nurses and other DMCH employees.

Effect of Delta Variant

Moscow posts record deaths

Lockdowns, other curbs return across Asia-Pacific

Moscow yesterday recorded the worst daily coronavirus death toll so far for a Russian city, as countries across the Asia-Pacific region extended or reimposed restrictions to tackle fresh waves of infections.

The pandemic has now killed close to four million people across the world but vaccination drives have brought down infection numbers in many wealthy countries, though the Delta strain of the virus remains a concern.

The variant is now in 85 countries and is the most contagious of any Covid-19 strain identified, according to the World Health Organization.

Still, in much of Europe and the United States curbs on daily life are easing as vaccination programmes bear fruit,

although Russia is grappling with a deadly third wave. The Russian capital yesterday recorded 144 Covid-19 deaths in the last 24 hours, a day after Saint Petersburg set the previous highest figure.

Saint Petersburg has hosted six Euro 2020 matches and is due to host a quarter-final on Friday, with spectator numbers capped at half but still upwards of 26,000 people. Russia as a whole has seen an explosion of new infections since mid-June driven by the Delta variant.

The dramatic rise in cases comes as officials in Moscow are pushing vaccine-sceptical Russians to get inoculated after lifting most anti-virus restrictions late last year.
