418 children killed in six

At least 418 children were killed in road crashes in first six months of this year as road safety situation still remain alarming, Road Safety Foundation said yesterday.

Of the children, aged between two and 15 years, 211 were killed while traveling on vehicles while 207 others killed as pedestrians, it said.

Among the victims, 341 were students, 58 were child labourers and 19 were destitute.

The organisation released the data to mark the 10th anniversary of fatal Mirsarai road crash, which killed 45 people -mostly children -- in 2011.

The foundation demanded the government observe the day nationally and provide necessary compensation to the victim families as the court directives.

On that day, a truck carrying 60 students skidded off the road and fell into a roadside ditch at Abu Torab in the upazila, killing 44 students and a local guardian. The students were returning home after enjoying a school football match held in Mirsarai stadium.

BARISHAL COVID-19 CRISIS More beds, ICU a crying need

Patients being turned back from SBMCH, oxygen shortage hits city hard

As the Covid-19 situation worsens in Barishal city, its residents as well as those from neighbouring districts are facing an acute crisis of ICUs, Covid beds, and oxygen cylinders.

Visiting Covid-dedicated Sher-e-Bangla Medical College Hospital yesterday, this correspondent saw patients from the city, greater Barishal district, Pirojpur, and other areas being turned back by the hospital authorities, as they have run out of capacity.

"We are asking those who are not in a critical condition to stay back home in isolation, as all 300 of our beds are occupied," hospital director Dr HM Saiful Islam told The Daily Star.

After visiting the Corona Isolation Unit in the afternoon, this correspondent came to know that at least a dozen patients seeking admission were turned back from the hospital in the previous 24 hours Some came in with symptoms, while others were in more severe conditions.

On condition of anonymity, a ward sfatter working at the isolation unit said all of the hospital's beds are filled up at the moment. In fact, many patients are camping on the hospital's floors and taking treatment from there. He also cited shortage of oxygen cylinders and oxygen supply.

"We have 22 ICUs, all of which are occupied. There are 54 people lined up for a bed," said Dr Moniruzzaman Shahin, assistant director of the hospital.

Publish list of injured in Rupganj blaze: HC

Expressing grave concern and shock at the death and injury of people in the deadly fire at a food processing factory in Narayanganj's Rupganj on Thursday, the High Court yesterday ordered authorities concerned to publish a list of the injured victims in public and to ensure their proper treatment.

The court asked the attorney general to talk to the health and labour secretaries to take necessary steps to this effect.

The HC bench of Justice M Enayetur Rahim passed the order during hearing a writ petition filed by four rights organistions, seeking directives for compensation for the victims and for conducting an enquiry into the incident.

The HC bench, however, refused to pass any order over the compensation, as bodies of the deceased victims could not be identified so far.

The court said government authorities have reportedly assured that they will compensate the

victims' families

"We are also shocked at the incident of fire that caused deaths and injuries to a number of people. The whole nation is shocked at the incident. We don't hope such occurrence happens," Justice Enayetur Rahim said when petitioners' lawyer Sara Hossain placed the writ petition.

The lawyer mentioned issues of negligence and failure of authorities concerned to prevent occurrences of fire, deaths and injuries, compensation for victims and child labour in the factory and prayed to the HC to issue a rule questioning the negligence and failure and to direct the authorities to give compensation to victims.

The HC judge said a criminal case has been filed in connection with the incident and all owners of the factory have been arrested.

Terming the horrific fire at the Hashem Food and Beverage factory in Narayanganj an incident of murder, BNP yesterday questioned the role of the Fire Service and Civil Defense, as it took huge time to put out the blaze.

Russian team visits Rooppur plant to see Covid-19 situation

A Russian worker of Rooppur Nuclear Power Plant died from Covid-19 on Friday while over 200 coronavirus infected Russian workers of the plant are undergoing treatment.

Amid this situation, high officials from the Russian government's Rosatom State Atomic Energy Corporation visited the plant in Pabna's Ishwardi on Saturday to observe the situation.

The delegation, headed by the deputy director of Rosatom, also consists of their medical experts, said Dr Shawkat Akbar, project director of Rooppur plant.

The delegation discussed with the project officials and the Ministry of Science and Technology about taking necessary steps for smooth progress of the development project amid the alarming Covid-19 situation, said project authorities.

"Russian workers at the plant will get the Russian vaccine Sputnik V. It has already reached the project area. Around 700 Bangladeshi officials of the project are likely to get this vaccine too," he said.

Meanwhile, Ivan Karpovan (38), a worker of Russian construction firm Nikmith-Atmostroy, died from Covid-19 at a private hospital in the capital's Shyamoli on Fridav.

Md Ruhul Kuddus, in charge of the plant's site office said Ivan was infected with Covid-19 last month and was admitted to the hospital in Dhaka on June 19. Later, he was shifted to the ICU as his condition became critical.

Talking to The Daily Star, Dr Fakhrul Islam, a doctor at Rooppur plant, said a total of 231 Russian workers were found Covid positive last month. Of them, 144 have been hospitalised in four hospitals.

"A total of 1,300 Russian workers will get the Sputnik V in first two phases. Over 3,600 Russian workers are working in the Rooppur plant," Dr Fakhrul said.

Dr Shawkat said they are monitoring the health condition of all local and foreign workers on a regular basis from the very beginning of the pandemic.

"Still some workers got infected ..., so we have to be more cautious," he said.
