MODERNA SHOTS Inoculation begins in 12 cities tomorrow

The government will start inoculating people with Moderna Covid-19 vaccine in the 12 city corporation areas from tomorrow and with Sinopharm vaccine across the country from today.

Issuing a press release yesterday, the Directorate General of Health Services said migrant workers are being given Pfizer vaccine at seven centres in the capital.

It added that the migrants can have the Moderna vaccine in the city corporation areas from tomorrow and they need not come to the capital for taking the jabs.

Others can also get the jabs in the city corporation areas, it said.

Shamsul Haque, line director of DGHS, said those who were administered the first jabs of Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine will have to wait a few more days.

"The Oxford vaccine is likely to arrive in the country by this or next month."

Bangladesh already received 45 lakh doses of Covid vaccines from two sources -- 25 lakh Moderna vaccine jabs provided by Covax, a global vaccine alliance, and another 20 lakh shots of Sinopharm vaccines bought from China recently.

The efficacy rate of Moderna vaccine is over 94 percent in trials.

Like Pfizer, Moderna uses the same mRNA technology. The doses need to be stored at minus 20 degrees Celsius, but those can be kept at 2-8 degrees Celsius for up to a month. A recipient has to take two shots of the Moderna vaccine -- 28 days apart.

Journo Tanu gets bail in DSA case

His report was on alleged irregularities in food given to Covid-19 patients in Thakurgaon Sadar Hospital.

But the hospital authorities alleged that journalist Tanvir Hasan Tanu did the report with false information with the intent to deteriorate the law and order, push the government in danger, and tarnish the image of the hospital and its staffers.

For this, the hospital's superintendent Mohammad Nadirul Aziz on Friday filed a case against him and two other journalists with Thakurgaon Sadar Police Station under the Digital Security Act (DSA).

The two other correspondents are Rahim Shubho, of online news portal News Bangla, and Abdul Latif Litu, of Bangladesh Pratidin.

Police arrested Tanu, the district correspondent of Jagonews24, after he went to the police station upon knowing about the case on Saturday night. As he fell

ILLEGAL MIGRATION 2 Bangladeshis among 12 dead in Turkey bus crash

A bus carrying Afghan, Pakistani and Bangladeshi migrants crashed in eastern Turkey early yesterday, killing at least 12 people and injuring 26 others, local authorities said.

The crash occurred in Van province's Muradiye district near the Turkish border with Iran, where the vehicle caught fire after tumbling into a ditch, two local sources with information on the matter told Reuters.

The identities of those killed in the accident were not immediately clear, both sources said.

However, two have been identified as Bangladeshis, an official at Bangladesh mission in Ankara told The Daily Star via WhatsApp text.

The sources said the owner of the bus was detained.

Among the dead were 11 migrants and a person who helped organise their illegal transport, the authorities were quoted as saying.

The injured were taken to hospital, they added.

Medical teams, firefighters, security forces as well as emergency personnel

'Arms shipment is condoning genocide'

SWARAN SINGH CONDEMNS ARMS SHIPMENT TO PAKISTAN

The Indian External Affairs Minister Swaran Singh told the Lok Sabha today that supply of arms to Pakistan by any country in the present context "amounts to an intervention on the side of the military rulers of West Pakistan against the people of Bangladesh".

The Indian government felt that such supply amounted to condoning "genocide in Bangladesh and encouragement to the continuation of the atrocities by the military rulers of Pakistan," he added.

The minister was replying to a call-attention notice on the reported US government decision to supply arms to Pakistan under personal orders of US President Richard Nixon. "We have left the US Government in no doubt," Swaran Singh said, "about the dangerous implications of such a policy on the situation in Bangladesh and on the peace and stability of the subcontinent and the region as a whole."

SAMAR SEN CALLS ON THANT
The Indian Ambassador to the UN Samar Sen called on the UN Secretary General U Thant today and discussed with him the Bangladesh situation and the refugee problem in India. Samar Sen was reported to have impressed on U Thant the

WIMBLEDON Djokovic wins 20th Grand Slam

Novak Djokovic won a record-equalling 20th Grand Slam title and sixth Wimbledon on Sunday with a four-set victory over battling Matteo Berrettini of Italy.

The world number one triumphed 6-7 (4/7), 6-4, 6-4, 6-3 to move level on 20 majors with Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal.

His win also put him three-quarters of the way to the first calendar Grand Slam of all four majors since 1969.

Glass-bottomed panda train debuts in China

Chengdu is famous for being the home of China's panda breeding program, so it seems only fitting that the southwestern city should have a panda train to welcome international tourists when they return.

On June 26, the capital of Sichuan province debuted the Zhongtang Air Railway, a sky train with a "glass" bottom riders can see through. It has 270-degree visibility as the top is not transparent. Travelers who look at the train head-on will notice that it is painted to resemble a panda.

UK envoy summoned over rights report

The foreign ministry yesterday suggested that the UK refrains from using an form of insinuating and misleading statements about Bangladesh government or the ruling party, Bangladesh Awami League.

It summoned acting British high commissioner Javed Patel to convey the message, along with the government's views and disappointment with certain issues mentioned in the Bangladesh chapter of the Human Rights and Democracy Report 2020 released by the UK Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) on Thursday.

According to the report, there was no overall improvement in the human rights situation in Bangladesh in 2020.

It noted concerns over

On information, the CTTC officials cordoned off the first militant hideout at Mirabari of Arahazur upazila around 6:00pm yesterday and hours later another hideout in Madanpur area, according to officials.

Taliban widens control in Afghanistan

India pulls officials from Kandahar as Australia withdraws last troops

India said yesterday it had temporarily brought back officials from its consulate in Kandahar, a major city in southern Afghanistan, as Taliban fighters continue to gain control amid the withdrawal of international forces.

"Due to the intense fighting near Kandahar city, India-based personnel have been brought back for the time being," Arindam Bagchi, chief spokesperson at India's foreign ministry, said in a statement.

"India is closely monitoring the evolving security situation in Afghanistan," Bagchi said, adding that India's consulate in Kandahar was being run by local staff temporarily.

Australia's defence minister yesterday confirmed the end of his country's involvement in the 20-year Afghanistan war, saying the troop withdrawal had taken place "in recent weeks".

Australia announced in April that it would remove its remaining troops by September in line with the US decision to end its military operations in the war-torn country.

Defence Minister Peter Dutton told Sky News that the country's last 80 support personnel had left Afghanistan "in recent weeks".

"That doesn't mean we won't be a part of campaigns with the United States... where we deem that to be in our national interest or in the interest of our allies," he added. "For now, though, that campaign has come to an end."
