## Neo-JMB wanted to make den in Bandarban

Say cops after arresting bomb-expert militant

Kawsar Hossain, an explosive expert of the IS inspired militant outfit Neo-JMB, tried to build a militant den in the hilly area of Bandarban to establish links with militants in nearby Myanmar's Arakan.

He also wanted to use the den to recruit new operatives and train them on making Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs).

Kawsar, also known as Major Osama in the banned organisation, used to impart the training both in-person and online, an official of the Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime (CTTC) unit said yesterday after the arrest of Osama and another top Neo-JMB member on Sunday.

Based on information gleaned from the two the CTTC busted two Neo-JMB hideouts and recovered IEDs and bomb-making materials from there the same day.

"Around a year ago, Osama had changed his mind and decided to go to Syria," a CTTC official told The Daily Star, wishing anonymity.

To execute his plan, he first went to Khulna from Bandarban along with some of his accomplices and learnt how to drive speedboats and launches.

Led by Osama, a section of Neo-JMB operatives also made money through online banking fraud and robbing battery-run three-wheelers, known as easy bikes.

Although it is a well-known strategy of mainstream JMB to raise funds for militant activities, Osama adopted the tactics to collect funds for Neo JMB, said investigators.

## Khaleda Zia registered for vaccine

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia has registered for the Covid-19 vaccine on the Shurokha app, launched by the government for the vaccination drive that began in February.

"She registered on July 8 but did not get the date of vaccination yet. She will be vaccinated at Sheikh Russel National Gastroenterology Institute and Hospital," AZM Zahid Hossain, Khaleda's personal physician and BNP vice chairman, told The Daily Star.

Khaleda tested positive for Covid on April 11 and was admitted to Evercare Hospital on April 27.

## ENFORCING LOCKDOWN Cops, magistrate attacked in Ctg, Noakhali

An executive magistrate and a police team working to enforce the ongoing Covid-19 lockdown came under attack by locals in two incidents in Noakhali and Chattogram.

The magistrate's vehicle was vandalised while two policemen, including a sub-inspector, were injured in the incidents.

Police and witnesses said a makeshift cattle market was set up in Nabagram Chiringa Bazar area of Noakhali's Kabirhat upazila yesterday defying the lockdown.

On information, district administration's executive magistrate Debobrato Das along with some policemen raided the area around 3:00pm.

Seeing them, locals and cattle traders became agitated and hurled bricks at the magistrate's vehicle. They also vandalised it. However, magistrate managed to escape the attack.

Later, Kabirhat Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO) Hasina Akhter rushed to the spot along with additional police members and brought the situation under control.

A case was being filed against those involved in the attack, the UNO told The Daily Star last night.

## UN resolution calls for reconciliation in Myanmar

The UN Human Rights Council yesterday adopted a resolution condemning human rights violations by Myanmar's military against the Rohingya and other minorities, and called for a process of reconciliation.

The resolution, brought forward by Pakistan on behalf of the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation, was approved without a vote in the Geneva-based council.

China, one of the 47 council members, said it could not join the consensus but nonetheless did not insist on bringing the text to a vote.

"Unfortunately, the humanitarian and human rights situation of Rohingya Muslims remains dire, and therefore requires a collective call by the council asking Myanmar to immediately halt human

## 'Super Mario' cartridge sold for record \$1.5m

A cartridge of Nintendo's classic video game "Super Mario 64" set a world record Sunday, selling at auction for \$1.56 million.

The sale, the first ever of a game cartridge to surpass \$1 million, came just two days after a sealed copy of "The Legend of Zelda" -- made for the old Nintendo NES console -- sold for a then-record of \$870,000.

Dallas-based Heritage Auctions, which handled both sales, has not identified the buyers. Before

A journalist of a local newspaper was assaulted by land grabbers in Barakhata area of Lalmonirhat's Hatibandha upazila on Sunday, police said.

A video clip where the journalist, Selim Shamrat, 25, is seen being beaten up mercilessly has gone viral on social media. A case was filed over the incident with Hatibandha Police Station last night, said Ershadul Alam, officer-in-charge of the police station.

Selim was attacked when he went to Barakhata area around 5:00pm on Sunday to gather information about a land grabbing incident. Alleged land grabbers Ali Reza Badal, 50, and his younger brother Tajjul Islam Mukut, 45, along with their men, attacked him there, said the OC, quoting locals.

## VACCINE CO-PRODUCTION China waits for Bangladesh's go ahead

Says Chinese envoy; Sinopharm, Sinovac are all set

China is waiting for the nod from the Bangladesh government to start co-production of Covid-19 vaccines in the country.

"For co-producing [of vaccines in Bangladesh], the Chinese side is ready. Sinopharm is ready, Sinovac is ready... you have very modern, very good facilities for co-production," Hualong Yan, the Chinese embassy's deputy chief of mission, said yesterday in response to a question from The Daily Star at a webinar.

"Now we are waiting for the signal from the Bangladesh government. Everything is ready, China is ready," he said at the webinar titled "Centenary of Chinese Communist Party", organised by the Association of Bangladesh-China Alumni.

In a Facebook post on July 6, Hualong said Chinese vaccine companies were working with Bangladeshi partners for future vaccine co-producing in Bangladesh.

China has so far provided vaccines to nearly 100 countries, and will provide the first batch of 10 million doses to global vaccine alliance Covax, he added.

China gifted 1.1 million Sinopharm vaccines and, under a purchase agreement, supplied two million Sinopharm jabs to Bangladesh early July.
