US sanctions Cuba for repressing protests

The United States imposed sanctions on Cuba's defense minister and a special forces unit Thursday for repressing peaceful protests, a step President Joe Biden warned is "just the beginning" of punitive measures against Havana. The US Treasury Department said its Office of Foreign Assets Control froze the assets of minister Alvaro Lopez Miera and the Special National Brigade (SNB), a division of Cuba's interior ministry, in relation to human rights abuses committed during a crackdown on protests on the island earlier in July. The sanctions were imposed under the Magnitsky act, which allows a US president to take action against human rights abuses and corruption.

Taliban claim of controlling 90pc of Afghan border is 'lie'

The Taliban's claim to hold 90 percent of Afghanistan's borders is an "absolute lie", the defence ministry said yesterday, insisting government forces were in control of the country's frontiers. The Taliban's claim on Thursday came after the group captured key border crossings with Iran, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan and Pakistan in recent weeks in a staggering offensive launched as US-led foreign forces began their final troop withdrawal from Afghanistan. According to an AFP report, the Afghan ministry insisted government forces were in control of the country's borders and all "main cities and highways".

Great Barrier Reef avoids Unesco 'in danger' listing

Australia yesterday avoided having the Great Barrier Reef listed as an endangered world heritage site by Unesco. After a concerted lobbying effort by Canberra, members of the World Heritage Committee voted to give Australian conservation efforts more time. The group brushed aside Unesco experts' recommendation that the reef's World Heritage status be downgraded because of dramatic coral decline, instead telling Australia to report on the reef's status by 2022. The 2,300-kilometre-long ecosystem has suffered three mass coral bleaching events since 2016, caused by rising ocean temperatures due to global warming. Despite the damage, the reef remains a vital tourist draw for Australia, which had feared an "in danger" label could deter post-pandemic visitors.

Ex-rights chief to lead UN Israel-Palestinian inquiry

Former UN rights chief Navi Pillay will lead the United Nations' open-ended inquiry into "systematic" abuses in Israel and the Palestinian territories, it was announced on Thursday. The UN Human Rights Council's president said Pillay would lead a three-person investigation into abuses and their "root causes" in the decades-long conflict. A commission of inquiry (COI) is the highest-level investigation that can be ordered by the council. The probe was triggered during a special session of the council held on May 27 to discuss the surge in deadly violence between Israelis and Palestinians earlier in the month. The conflict killed 260 Palestinians including some fighters, according to Gaza authorities. In Israel, 13 people were killed, including a soldier, the police and army said.

PEGASUS SPYWARE SCANDAL

'This is treason'
Indian opposition demands probe

Indian PM Narendra Modi's main political rival Rahul Gandhi yesterday demanded an inquiry into the Pegasus spyware scandal, accusing the government of "treason", according to an AFP report.

Gandhi is one of dozens of Indian politicians, journalists and government critics on an alleged global database of 50,000 possible Pegasus spying targets that was revealed by an international group of media outlets.

The Indian government has rejected spying claims although critics note it has not said whether it is a client of NSO Group, the Israeli maker of the Pegasus spyware which effectively captures a target's cellphone.

The claims have sparked uproar in the Indian parliament, with one opposition MP on Thursday snatched and ripped up the text of a statement on the subject being delivered by IT minister Ashwini Vaishnav.

The MP, TMC's Santanu Sen, has been suspended from Rajya Sabha for the remaining period of the monsoon session, Indian media reported yesterday.

"Pegasus is classified by the Israeli state as a weapon and that weapon is supposed to be used against terrorists," Rahul Gandhi, 51, told reporters in New Delhi.

"The prime minister and the home minister have used this weapon against the Indian state and against our institutions. The only word for this is treason... and this has to be investigated."

The alleged database of phone numbers included more than 1,000 in India, with the owners of 300 of them identified in the media reports, reports AFP. It is not known how many of the phones on the list were actually targeted for surveillance or how many attempts were successful.

But according to Indian news website The Wire -- one of the media outlets given access to the database by two rights groups -- mounting forensic evidence suggests one or more official agency has been using the spyware.

Other possible targets revealed in the reports on Thursday include aides to the Tibetan spiritual leader the Dalai Lama, who lives in exile in India, businessman Anil Ambani, and former CBI Director Alok Verma and two other senior officers at the agency.

The numbers of Ambani and his employee Tony Jesudan entered the list in 2018, when a legal challenge had been mounted in the Supreme Court about the Indian government's deal with Dassault to purchase the Rafale jets, reports TOI.

Indian tax officials raid media outlets

Indian tax authorities have raided a prominent newspaper and a TV channel that have been critical of the government's handling of the coronavirus pandemic, triggering accusations of intimidation.

There was no official comment from authorities on the raids against Hindi-language daily Dainik Bhaskar and the Bharat Samachar channel.

At the height of the outbreak, families in India's north and east gave up the bodies of their loved ones to the river or buried them in shallow graves on its banks, likely unable to afford the cost of funeral pyres.

Last month, the daily's editor Om Gaur wrote an op-ed in the New York Times saying the bodies in the Ganges were symbolic of the "failures and deceptions" of present Indian government.

Rajasthan CM Ashok Gehlot and New Delhi CM Kejriwal said the raids were a brazen attempt to suppress the media.

FLOODS, LANDSLIDES IN INDIA

At least 112 killed

At least 112 people have died in the western Indian state of Maharashtra, authorities said yesterday, after torrential monsoon rains caused landslides and flooded low-lying areas, cutting off hundreds of villages.

Parts of India's west coast received up to 594 mm (23 inches) of rainfall over 24 hours, forcing authorities to evacuate people from vulnerable areas as they released water from dams that were threatening to overflow.

"Unexpected very heavy rainfall triggered landslides in many places and flooded rivers," Chief Minister Uddhav Thackeray, who heads Maharashtra's state government, told journalists.

"Dams and rivers are overflowing. We are forced to release water from dams, and, accordingly, we are moving people residing near the river banks to safer places."

The navy and army were helping with rescue operations in coastal areas, he added.

At least 38 people were killed in Taliye, 180 km southeast of the financial capital Mumbai, when a landslide flattened most of the small village, state government officials said.

In nine other landslides in other parts of Maharashtra 59 people died and another 15 were killed in accidents linked to the heavy rainfall, they said.

A few dozen people were also feared to have been trapped in landslides in Satara and Raigad districts, said a state government official who asked not to be named.

Thousands of trucks were stuck on a national highway linking Mumbai with the southern technology hub of Bengaluru, with the road submerged in some places, a Maharashtra government official said.

Meanwhile, hundreds of villages and towns were without electricity and drinking water, he said.

Rivers were also overflowing in the neighbouring southern states of Karnataka and Telangana where authorities were monitoring the situation, government officials there said.

Seasonal monsoon rains from June to September cause deaths and mass displacement across South Asia every year, but they also deliver more than 70% of India's rainfall and are crucial for farmers.

CLIMATE CHANGE

WHEN PREDICTIONS BECOME REALITY

Climate scientists have long warned of severe impacts on the near horizon, and the 21st century has seen more than a few natural disasters made worse or more likely by global warming. But a cascade of deadly extreme weather this summer could make 2021 the year when climate predictions became a reality that can no longer be ignored.

CANADA'S HEAT DOME

In late June, western Canada was caught under a "heat dome", a phenomenon causing scorching temperatures when hot air is trapped by high pressure fronts, and heats up even more as it is pushed back down. The country broke its record high temperature several times, finally capping at 49.6 degrees Celsius (121 degrees Fahrenheit) in the village of Lytton on June 30. The US states of Washington and Oregon were also affected. The exact human toll is not yet known but amounts to at least several hundred deaths. A study by a group of leading climate scientists found that the weather conditions would have been "virtually impossible" without human-caused climate change.



DEADLY DELUGE IN CHINA

As the flood water receded in Europe, catastrophic flooding hit China this month killing at least 51 people. An unprecedented downpour dumped a year's worth of rain in just three days on the city of Zhengzhou, instantly overwhelming drains and sending torrents of muddy water through streets, road tunnels and the subway system. The troubles are far from over as China yesterday had to evacuate tens of thousands as floods submerged swathes of central China -- while an approaching typhoon threatened to dump more rain on the stricken area. In the worst-hit city of Zhengzhou, firefighters yesterday continued to pump muddy



DEADLY FLOODS IN EUROPE

In mid-July western Europe was hit by devastating floods after torrential rains that ravaged entire villages and left at least 209 people dead in Germany and Belgium, as well as dozens missing. The flooding also caused damage in Luxembourg, the Netherlands and Switzerland. Up to two months' worth of rainfall came down in two days in some parts of the region, waterlogging soil that was already near saturation.

DEADLY LANDSLIDES IN INDIA

At least 112 people have been killed in landslides caused by monsoon rains in India, authorities said yesterday. As many as 40 other people were missing after ten separate landslides hit the western state of Maharashtra. The Navy and Air Force joined rescue efforts after the heavy rains caused floods that left thousands stranded. Rescue efforts were being hampered by landslides blocking roads, including the main highway between Mumbai and Goa. India's meteorological department has issued red alerts for several regions in the state, indicating that heavy rainfall will continue for the next few days. Climate change is making India's monsoons stronger which might contribute to more disasters, according to a report from the Potsdam Institute for Climate Impact Research (PIK) published in April.



CALIFORNIA'S RAGING WILDFIRES

Triggered by an alarming drought, the wildfire season is just starting in the American West where thousands of firefighters are already dealing with 80 large blazes. By the beginning of the week the fires had ravaged more than 4,700 square kilometres (1,800 square miles) of vegetation. The most spectacular blaze is the "Bootleg Fire" in Oregon, which in the space of two weeks has burned the equivalent of the city of Los Angeles in vegetation and forests. In neighbouring California, several villages were evacuated in the face of the advancing "Dixie Fire", which is suspected to have been caused by a tree falling on power cables.
