Looking for way back

Returnee migrants seeks to re-migrate amid lack of jobs, insufficient income at home

Mustakim Alam quit his job and came home from Kuwait amid the Covid-19 pandemic in May last year after living there for over seven years, working at a printing press.

The 30-year-old from Khulna's Paikgachha has been unsuccessfully looking for a job this last one year.

"I don't have enough cash to start a business. The savings that I brought home has already been spent on family expenses," he said.

Now Mustakim is trying to re-migrate to overcome financial hardship. He has already asked one of his acquaintances in Kuwait to secure a new work visa, for which he will have to pay between Tk 2-3 lakh, depending on the job type.

Mustakim's experience is shared by other migrant workers who find themselves unemployed back in Bangladesh. Surveys suggest people wishing to re-migrate abroad are forced by several socioeconomic drivers, including lack of job opportunities, and consider a life abroad as offering better opportunities than what can be achieved at home.

Upon returning home from Qatar in February last year, 40-year-old Murad Islam said he unsuccessfully looked for a job at local factories in Munshiganj where he lives.

He had lived in the Gulf country for seven years; earlier, he worked in Saudi Arabia from 2000 to 2005 after which

Covid Vaccination Frontliners' loved ones above 18 to get shots

From now on, Covid-19 frontline health workers' family members -- aged 18 and above -- will get vaccines, Health Minister Zahid Maleque said yesterday.

"We have received permission from the prime minister in this regard," he said while addressing a virtual discussion organised by Bangladesh Private Medical College Association.

The minister said, "We had decided to vaccinate frontline doctors, nurses, other healthcare staffers and teachers. Their family members, who are aged 18 and above, will also get vaccines from now on," he said

"We have already received an adequate number of vaccine jabs and another 30 lakh doses of Sinopharm vaccine will arrive either on July 26 or 27."

Fewer cattle sacrificed this Eid too

The number of cattle sacrificed on the occasion of Eid-ul-Azha dropped for the second year as the ongoing second wave of coronavirus cases and the growing economic costs of the pandemic dampened the spirit of the religious

A total of 90.9 lakh cows, buffalos, goats, sheep and other animals were sacrificed this year, down about 3.8 percent from a year earlier, according to data from the Department of Livestock Services (DLS).

Many well-offs who used to slaughter two to three cows opted for just one cow this time for the sake of rituals, said Debashis Das, a director at the DLS.

In 2019, 1.06 crore animals were sacrificed on the occasion, the second biggest festival in the country and the major source of raw material for the country's promising leather and leather goods industry.

Small cows were in high demand during the last two Eid-ul-Azha, while the demand for big bulls plummeted, according to Das.

Ferry Rams Bridge Probe body finds two employees responsible

A probe committee formed after a ferry on Friday rammed a pillar of the under-construction Padma Bridge found that the master and quarter master of the vessel were responsible for the mishap that left 20 people injured.

The four-member committee, which is expected to submit its report today, will recommend departmental action against the two employees of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Corporation (BIWTC), said sources familiar with the development.

The committee will also recommend placing rubber tenders around the pillars of the bridge to reduce impact in case of such crashes, they added.

Scientists find tiny mountains on neutron stars

Neutron stars have mountains that are only a fraction of a millimetre high due to their extreme density, according to a new scientific model.

The stars are some of the densest objects in the universe, weighing as much as the Sun while only being around 10 kilometres wide.

Neutron stars are formed when a massive star runs out of fuel and collapses, with every proton and electron in the object forming a neutron – a neutrally charged subatomic particle.

Teen rape victim dies by suicide

A gang-rape victim died by suicide in Pekua upazila of Cox's Bazar early yesterday.

The dead is Tabassum Jannat Rekha Moni, 14, of the upazil's Hazirpara village. She was a student of grade VIII at a local madrasa.

The victim's father Ayub Ali filed a rape case against three local youths -- Alamgir, Robi Alam and Abul Kashem. Police, however, recorded an unnatural death case later.

FLOODS, LANDSLIDES IN INDIA

Death toll rises to 138

Rescue teams in India struggled through thick sludge and debris yesterday to reach dozens of submerged homes as the death toll from landslides and accidents caused by

torrential monsoon rain rose to 138.

Maharashtra state is being hit by the heaviest rain in July in four decades, experts say. Downpours lasting several days have severely affected the lives of hundreds of thousands, while major rivers are in danger of bursting their banks.

"138 accidental deaths reported in Maharashtra due to rain and other monsoon-related incidents," Maharashtra Minister of Relief and Rehabilitation Vijay Wadettiwar said yesterday.

In Taliye, about 180 km (110 miles) southeast of the financial capital of Mumbai, the death toll rose to 42 with the recovery of four more bodies after landslides flattened most homes in the village, a senior Maharashtra government official said.

"About 40 people are still trapped. The possibility of rescuing them alive is thin as they've been trapped in mud for more than 36 hours," said the official, who declined to be identified as he is not authorised to talk to the media.

Harsh weather has hit several parts of the world in recent weeks, with floods in China and Western Europe and heat waves in North America, raising new fears about the impact of climate change.

Parts of India's west coast have received up to 594 mm (23 inches) of rain, forcing authorities to move people out of vulnerable areas as they released water from dams about to overflow. The hill station of Mahabaleshwar recorded its highest ever rainfall - 60 cm in 24 hours.

Rescuers were searching for victims of landslides in four other places in the state, the official said.
