are being motivated by top leaders of Ansar Al Islam. One of the leaders is Mahmudul Hasan Gunobi, the outfit's spiritual leader. He used to inspire his close associates to take part in "jihad" and take part in "holy" wars.

The Rab arrested Gunobi in the capital on July 15.

A CTC official said some Ansar Al Islam members have discussed among themselves online their desire to go to Afghanistan.

A closed online group, created by the banned militant outfit with end-to-end encrypted app Telegram, was named "Science Project". The group had 10 members, the official said.

The CTC had arrested the group's four members in the capital in May. The arrestees informed investigators that they had a plan to leave the country for Afghanistan after carrying out attacks on police and Border Guard Bangladesh in Dhaka and Sylhet.

They also said three of their group members -- Abdur Razzak of Cumilla, Shibbir Ahmed of Sylhet and Rabiul Islam from Noakhali -- have already reached Afghanistan, according to a CTC official.

Razzak studied at a madrasa in Sylhet. His brother Salman Khan filed a general diary with Kotwali Police Station in Sylhet on March 25 about Razzak's going missing.

CTC Chief Md Asaduzzaman said they came to know about Ansar al Islam men going to Afghanistan from the statements of the outfit's arrested members.

"We are verifying their statements. They might have gone to other places

in Bangladesh for 'hizrat'. We don't have any information that anyone from Bangladesh left for Afghanistan," he told The Daily Star on Saturday.

He said they were always on alert to thwart any move by militants to go to Afghanistan.

Rab Director (Legal and Media wing) Commander Khandaker Al Moïn said they had recently carried out several operations and arrested a number of militants, but none of the arrestees gave them the information that their fellows travelled to Afghanistan.

Speaking to The Daily Star recently, security analyst Maj Gen ANM Muniruzzaman (ret'd) said the resurgence of Taliban after the withdrawal of US-led international forces from Afghanistan might incite militancy in Bangladesh as all big terrorist groups here were born with links to Afghanistan.

"As Taliban's influence in Afghanistan is on the rise, a similar effect on Bangladesh might be seen," he added.

In the 1980s, many Bangladeshis, particularly madrasa students and teachers, went to Afghanistan to join the war against the forces of the then Soviet Union. They were trained on operating heavy arms and using grenades. After the Afghan war ended in 1992, many of them returned home and declared the launch of Harkat-ul-Jihad al-Islami (Huji) at a press conference in Dhaka on April 30, 1992.

Investigators have held Huji responsible for killing more than 100 people in Bangladesh in 13 militant attacks between 1999 and 2005.

pursue of the city, he said.

Besides, changes have been brought in the peripheries of two municipalities -- Dohar in Dhaka and Shibchar in Madaripur, the cabinet secretary added.

Describing the rationale behind the formation of three new upazilas, Anwarul said Eidgaon is a very remote place as it is 40 km away from Cox's Bazar Sadar upazila and it needed upgradation.

Modhyanagar upazila was created by splitting Dharmapasha upazila as Modhyanagar is an isolated place due to a Haor, which is some 25 km off

Dharmapasha, he said

Dashar is also very remote place in Madaripur's Kalkini upazila, the cabinet secretary said. "That's why all those areas need to be integrated."

Meanwhile, the cabinet gave the final approval to the draft of the Bangladesh Legal Practitioners and Bar Council (Amendment) Ordinance, 2021 with a provision of allowing the government to form an ad-hoc committee for a tenure of maximum one year to arrange the Bar Council election in an unusual situation.

"If the regular Bar Council election can't be held by May 31 after every

three years, the government can form a 15-member ad-hoc committee for a maximum one year," Anwarul said.

He said the law ministry placed the proposed law as the deadline for the Bar Council election expired on May 31 last amid the pandemic.

The meeting rejected a proposal for bringing amendments to the Government Services Act, 2018.

Besides, the cabinet cancelled its previous decision over the approval of the draft of an agreement on certain aspects of air services, which was supposed to be signed between Bangladesh and European Union.

Astronauts grow chili peppers

into Advanced Plant Habitat (APH). The APH uses LED lights and a porous clay substrate (where an organism lives in the soil) that releases fertiliser at controlled times to deliver water, nutrients and oxygen.

"The APH is the largest plant growth facility on the space station and has 180 sensors and controls for monitoring plant growth and the environment," said Nicole Dufour, a project manager for the experiment. "It is a diverse growth chamber, and it allows us to help control the experiment from Kennedy, reducing the time astronauts spend tending to the crops."

The APH is one of three plant growth chambers in the orbiting laboratory, which has previously been used to grow cabbage and mustard. If the mission is successful, another crop will be added in order to supplement astronauts' diets for future missions.

Before then, the peppers will have to grow for four months on the station before they are harvested. Some of the peppers will be eaten by the crew, while the rest will be sent back to

Earth for analysis -- assuming that they are indeed safe to consume. The combination of microgravity, light quality, temperature, and rootzone moisture could all affect the flavour, and it is as yet unclear how the fruit will develop.

"It is one of the most complex plant experiments on the station to date because of the long germination and growing times," said Matt Romeyn, principal investigator for the experiment.

"We have previously tested flowering to increase the chance for a successful harvest because astronauts will have to pollinate the peppers to grow fruit."

Choosing the peppers was not an easy task; researchers spent two years evaluating over 24 varieties from around the world.

"The challenge is the ability to feed crews in low-Earth orbit, and then to sustain explorers during future missions beyond low-Earth orbit to destinations including the Moon, as part of the Artemis program, and eventually to Mars," Romeyn said.

Russia blocks 49 Navalny-linked websites: aide

Russia's media regulator has blocked 49 websites linked to jailed Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny, his ally said yesterday, as pressure mounts on the movement of the opposition leader ahead of parliamentary elections in the autumn.

Navalny, President Vladimir Putin's most vocal domestic critic, was arrested in January after he returned to Russia following months of treatment in Germany for a nerve agent poisoning he blames on the Kremlin.

He was subsequently jailed for two-and-a-half years on old fraud charges

and his organisations were banned as "extremist", barring members and sponsors from running in parliamentary elections in September. "By the decision of the prosecutor general's office, 49 websites were blocked simultaneously," key Navalny aide Leonid Volkov said on his Telegram channel yesterday.

The blocked websites include Navalny's main website, the website of his Anti-Corruption Foundation (FBK), the websites of key allies and of Navalny's regional offices that disbanded earlier this year.

AFP journalists said Navalny's website was unavailable in Russia.

Health fears as killer DR Congo volcano spouts ash

The DR Congo's Nyirangongo volcano has released large amounts of ash some two months after its eruption, sparking concerns for local residents' health, experts said on Sunday.

The volcano in the far east of the vast central African country first erupted on May 22, claiming 32 lives and destroying hundreds of homes.

"The ash is the result of the collapse

of part of the Nyirangongo's central crater," volcanologist Muhindo Syavulisembo said in a statement.

Syavulisembo, who heads the Goma Volcanology Observatory (OVG), however ruled out an imminent new eruption.

"There hasn't been visible damage, but we fear respiratory and water-borne illnesses," Samson Buunda, a local civil society representative, told AFP.

the first formal inquiry into allegations that between 2017 and 2019 an Indian client of Israel's NSO Group used Pegasus to hack hundreds of phones of opposition leaders, journalists, government officials and even a constitutional authority.

The decision to form the committee was taken at a special cabinet meeting chaired by Mamata in Kolkata yesterday.

"We thought the centre would form an inquiry commission, or a court-monitored probe would be ordered to look into this phone-hacking incident. But the centre is sitting idle... so we decided to form a 'commission on inquiry' to look into the matter," Banerjee said in a pointed swipe.

"... I hope this small step will wake up others. We want it to start as soon as possible. Many people from Bengal have been tapped," she added.

Justice Jyotirmay Bhattacharya is a retired Calcutta High Court Chief Justice and Justice Madan Bhimraj Lokur is a former Supreme Court judge.

Last week Banerjee, who is travelling to Delhi to unite the opposition against the BJP ahead of the 2024 election, spoke of a "surveillance state" and said it was a "threat" to democracy.

"Three things make democracy - media, judiciary and the Election Commission - and Pegasus has captured all three," she said in a speech shared with several senior opposition leaders.

Calling the Israeli military-grade spyware "dangerous" and "ferocious", Banerjee said she could not even talk to other opposition leaders, as she feared her phone too had been tapped.

In a ferocious attack she said, "Mr Modi, don't mind. I am not attacking you personally. But you, and may be the Home Minister, you are deploying agencies against opposition leaders."

On July 19, in a second round of reports on potential Pegasus targets, The Wire (part of an international media consortium investigating this issue) said Abhishek Banerjee, Congress MP Rahul Gandhi and poll strategist Prashant Kishor were on the

list.

The Trinamool came down heavily on the BJP at the centre, declaring this proved they were afraid of Abhishek Banerjee and that the party was suffering from "fear-psychosis" after its defeat in Bengal.

Abhishek Banerjee hit back with a taunting tweet, calling for two minutes' silence for "sore losers".

The opposition's explosive accusations - the NSO Group has said it sells Pegasus only to "vetted governments" - triggered outrage and demands for a joint parliamentary committee probe.

The centre has rejected calls for a probe of any sort, insisting surveillance of the alleged kind was impossible given existing checks and balances within the country's legal framework.

IT Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw - who, as it turned out, was also on the list of potential targets (albeit before he joined the BJP) told parliament attempts were being made to malign Indian democracy.

Crisis-hit Lebanon picks billionaire Najib Mikati as next PM-designate

Lebanese lawmakers yesterday tasked ex-premier and billionaire Najib Mikati with forming a government and ending one year of political deadlock that has crippled the economy.

Mikati, seen by many as a symbol of Lebanon's corrupt oligarchy, will pick up where Saad Hariri left off earlier this month, after failing to broker a deal despite intense international pressure.

A new government would face the daunting task of steering Lebanon through one of the worst phases in its history, and to polls slated for next year amid unprecedented popular distrust.

Mikati, a 65-year-old telecom mogul who was last in power in 2014, is the third PM-designate to be named since the caretaker government of Hassan Diab resigned in the wake of last August's monster port blast.

He clinched more than 72 endorsements, with only one lawmaker voting in favour of veteran diplomat Nawaf Salam, according to

the official National News Agency.

A total of 42 lawmakers, including members of the president's Free Patriotic Movement, abstained from endorsing any candidate, NNA said.

Top parliamentary blocs, including Hariri's Future Movement and the powerful Shia movement Hezbollah, named Mikati as their pick.

Mikati will now have to start consultations with the president and political factions to set a cabinet lineup, while Diab stays on in a caretaker capacity.

It could take months before an actual government is formed, but crisis-hit Lebanon, grappling with soaring poverty, a plummeting currency and shortages of basic items from medicine to fuel, can ill afford any delays.

Speaking to reporters after a meeting with Aoun, Mikati called his designation a "difficult step", appealing for the Lebanese people to support him.

"If I didn't have the necessary guarantees from external powers... I would not have taken on" the job, he said, referring to foreign backing.

"I don't have a magic wand and, alone, I can't make miracles happen," he said.

"Whoever has solutions should bring them to the table."

Mikati, who started a career in politics in 1998, is considered to be Lebanon's richest man and one of the wealthiest in the Middle East, with a net worth of \$2.7 billion according to Forbes.

Many in Lebanon consider the businessman as emblematic of a corrupt ruling class targeted by a 2019 protest movement.

A native of second city Tripoli, he is suspected of illicit enrichment in 2019, and lacks a wide popular base even in his hometown, which is Lebanon's poorest.

On the eve of consultations, dozens of protesters gathered outside Mikati's Beirut home, accusing him of corruption and cronyism.

But Lebanon's bickering politicians view Mikati as a consensus candidate who could be capable of easing a political impasse that has stymied efforts towards forming a government.

France, Greece send aircraft to help tackle Italy fires

Firefighting aircraft from France and Greece arrived in Italy on Sunday following an appeal for help in taming fires raging across parts of Sardinia that have forced hundreds of people from their homes.

"It's a disaster without precedent," the island's governor Christian Solinas said, as hot southwesterly winds complicated the efforts to put out the blazes and the region declared a state of emergency.

As many as 1,200 people had been evacuated from their homes, including residents of a care home, according to Rai News.

Frightened tourists were among those fleeing the little seaside village of Porto Alabe, it said.

Canada planes could be seen collecting water off the coast of Porto Alabe, before flying low over beachfront properties and emptying it over the blazing vegetation just behind them.

Italy's Foreign Minister Luigi Di Maio said on Facebook that the civil protection agency had appealed for planes from other European countries.

Two had already arrived from France and two from Greece, the agency said.

A vast area in the Oristano province in the west was "on its knees due to the devastating fire", he said.

About 20,000 hectares (50,000 acres) of vegetation had gone up in flames, with properties damaged and animals killed, Solinas said. The fire danger level remained "extreme", the civil protection agency said.

About 7,500 emergency workers, including members of Italy's forest police and the Red Cross, were helping evacuees and those at risk, the fire service said.

Solinas said it was too early to know the extent of the destruction but he would ask the government to allocate recovery fund money for reforestation.

France, UK sign accord on fighting Channel terror threat

Britain and France yesterday signed a new security deal aimed at protecting the public in the event of a terror attack in the Channel against a large vessel such as a passenger ferry, the British government said.

The UK-France Maritime Security Treaty was signed in Paris as the defence and foreign ministers from both sides met for talks on shared security interests.

The British government said in a statement that the treaty is the foundation for "seamless joint and coordinated action to be taken by UK and French forces in response to an incident, such as a terrorist attack on board a ferry or other large vessel in the Channel."

The treaty includes provisions which will enable Britain and France to share information concerning potential threats, mount swifter responses to serious incidents, and coordinate more efficient joint responses.

"As close allies it is vital the UK and France work together to protect our citizens and values," said British Foreign Secretary Dominic Raab.

The treaty "will reinforce our ability to jointly respond swiftly and effectively to terrorist threats in the Channel," he added.

There was no immediate communication on the new treaty from the French government.

The British government emphasised that the treaty is aimed at fighting terror threats and incidents in the Channel and is not intended to tackle illegal migration.

Firefighters battle California blaze generating its own weather

Thousands of US firefighters were battling a blaze in California yesterday that has grown so big it is generating its own weather system, with authorities warning conditions could worsen.

The flames have grown so large that they have created clouds that can cause lightning and high winds, which in turn can serve to fuel the fire, according to experts.

Around 5,400 firefighters have been struggling to contain the inferno, which was just 22 percent contained as of yesterday morning, the California fire and forestry department reported.

"If these clouds get tall enough they do have the potential to produce lightning," warned Julia Ruthford, a government meteorologist assigned to the blaze.

The Dixie Fire has been raging in the forests of northern California since mid-July, part of a climate crisis that has brought sweltering heat and an alarming drought. Over the weekend it merged with another fire, prompting new evacuation orders.

Wildfires are common in the state but this summer has been particularly incendiary.

Fires have already ravaged three times more vegetation this year than

they had at this time in 2020, the worst fire year in California's history.

Rescue workers have been dispatched from as far away as Florida to help contain the Dixie Fire and its pyrocumululus clouds.

Despite its size -- the fire's circumference stretches at least 82 miles and it has burned 197,487 acres -- it has so far ravaged extremely remote areas, destroying the few dozen homes and small buildings in its path.

Moving along steep slopes, the firefighters sometimes ride a train from which they can spray water on otherwise inaccessible areas.
