The Tigers were frustrated where all the batters looked to play the big shots and ignored taking singles and doubles and in the process, they had lost wickets at crucial stages.

When Nurul Hasan was dismissed in the 15th over, Bangladesh had already given away 42 dot balls out of ninety legal deliveries. The hosts had an uphill task of posting a big total from then on.

Top-scorer Shakib had to play the big shots since Bangladesh was struggling against the Aussie bowlers and was eventually dismissed on 36 off 33 balls to become Hazlewood's third victim.

Bangladesh did manage to score 27 runs in the final three overs and eventually posted a modest 131 for 7, courtesy of Afif Hossain's 24. Starc showed his class to pick up two wickets in the end and became the first Australian to pick 50 wickets in the shortest format.

For Bangladesh, it was probably a reality check, especially for the batters, who might have realised

Top orders to be tested as England face India



Batsmen on both sides are set to face a stiff examination when an England team without Ben Stokes face India in

the first Test in Nottingham starting on Wednesdav.

Although England captain Joe Root boasts an impressive Test average of 48.68, the next best in his side belongs to opener Rory Burns, with 33.23. Zak Crawley in particular has seen his Test returns decline dramatically since making a brilliant 267 against Pakistan, with a mere 123 runs in 12 subsequent innings.

Following England's 1-0 series loss to New Zealand in June -- their first home campaign reverse in seven years -- former captain Alastair Cook said the current top order "can't handle" the pressure of Test cricket.

There are worries too about India's batsmen ahead of a five-match campaign that comes 50 years after the tourists' first series win in England.

India captain and star batsman Virat Kohli has not scored a Test hundred in nearly two years, while opener Mayank Agarwal was ruled out of the first Test with suspected concussion after being hit on the head batting in the nets on Monday.

Cheteshwar Pujara, meanwhile, averages under 30 in England. And Ajinkya Rahane, since kick-starting India's stunning revival during their eventual series win in Australia last year with 112 in Melbourne, has passed fifty just once in 13

Just as India prepared pitches favouring their spinners during a 3-1 win at home to England earlier this year, it would be no surprise were a green surface designed to maximise the skills of veteran England new-ball duo Stuart Broad -- playing on his Nottinghamshire home ground -- and James Anderson to be on show this week.

Anderson, England's all-time leading wicket-taker, has an especially brilliant Test record at Trent Bridge, with 64 wickets in 10 matches at under 20 apiece.

India, however, also have an impressive seam attack featuring the likes of Jasprit Bumrah and Mohammed Shami, Ishant Sharma and Mohammad Siraj.

"We expect England to give us such wickets, this is their home conditions, said vice-captain Rahane, with India having been in England for several weeks since a World Test Championship final loss to New Zealand. "We are not too worried about what wickets they are giving us. We are ready.

The series may be decided by which team copes best with the Covid restriction surrounding players on both sides. It was announced on Friday that key all-rounder Stokes was taking an "indefinite break from all cricket" to prioritise his mental

England and India, two of world cricket's biggest drawcards, have made little concession to the coronavirus by continuing to pursue packed schedules that can be especially onerous for multiformat stars such as Stokes.



Warholm dazzles in 400m hurdles

Norway's Karsten Warholm shattered the world record to claim gold in an epic 400m hurdles at the Olympics on Tuesday.

One of the most eagerly anticipated events of the Olympic track and field programme, the 400m hurdles lived up to its billing as world champion Warholm produced a jaw-dropping performance in fierce midday sun at Tokyo's Olympic Stadium.

Spain to meet Brazil in final



Marco Asensio struck in an extra-time winner as Spain ended Japan's hopes of Olympic gold in men's football with a 1-0 (aet) victory, setting up a clash with Brazil in Saturday's final.

Defending champions Brazil also had to struggle to make the final, beating Mexico 4-1 on penalties after the game ended goalless after extra-time.

Japan had matched Spain throughout the game, playing with creativity and invention going forward and tenacity without the ball and they were five minutes away from taking the match to a penalty

After a cagey first half, Spain thought they had a great chance to go in front when referee Kevin Ortega of Peru pointed to the penalty spot after Mikel Merino went down under challenge from Maya Yoshida. But the VAR ordered Ortega to go to the pitchside monitor and he saw the clear images that Yoshida had made a perfectly fair and welltimed challenge.

That overturned penalty sparked both sides into life and it was a lively second half with openings at both ends. Japan keeper Kosei Tani did well to race out quickly and smother Rafa Mir as the ball broke to him close to goal while at the other end Takefusa



Kubo's blast at the near post was parried by Unai Simon. Both teams were unable to make the most of half-chances, however, and the game followed a similar pattern into extra-time before Real Madrid forward Asensio picked the ball up in the inside right channel, glanced up and curled the ball into the far corner.

Spain are looking to repeat their gold medal success from the Barcelona Games in 1992 but will

have to beat the Rio winners from five years ago. "They are a quality side, we know that and we know that if we are going to win the gold medal we are going to have to play the best teams here," said

High-scoring thriller in BPL

Chattogram Abahani survived a late scare against Uttar Baridhara Club before handing them a 4-3 defeat in a thrilling encounter of Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) at Birshreshtha Shaheed Mostafa Kamal Stadium yesterday.

The other match at Bangabandhu National Stadium saw Rahmatganj MFS repeat their first-leg performance to beat Brothers Union 2-0, thanks to Christ Remi and Felix Chidi who struck for Rahmatganj after a goalless first half.

Chattogram Abahani carried the momentum from their previous match - a win over leaders Bashundhara Kings -- into the match and left the ground on a high, courtesy of a brilliant performance by Brazilian Nixon Guylherme.

Nixon first cancelled out Baridhara's 10-minute lead given by Evgeniy Kochnev with a header in the 23rd minute before giving the port city side a lead in the 43rd minute with a soft touch from Monaem Khan Raju's assist.

Further ahead, he had set up Nigerian Chinedew Mathew for the third goal in the 50th minute while Baridhara defender Saiddoston Fazilov struck his own net while attempting to clear Rakib Hossain's cut-back in the 59th minute.

Later, Suman Reza and substitute Maruf Ahmed struck in the 67th and 80th minute respectively but eventually failed to find the equaliser. Overall, 10 victories took Chattogram Abahani to the fourth position of the 13-team table while Rahmatganj, Baridhara and Brothers Union resided at the ninth, 10th and 12th positions, respectively.

Previously, BPL had resumed at two separate venues after a 14-day break following the Eid-ul-Adha and Lockdown.
