COVID-19 VACCINATION

Special drive hits a major snag

Cut down to one day from 6 due to shortage of jabs

A special Covid-19 mass inoculation drive, mainly aimed at vaccinating rural people at the union level, has suffered a major setback just days before it was scheduled to begin on Saturday. Due to a shortage of vaccines, the government last night decided to cut

the duration of the campaign to one day from six. The government had earlier planned to administer around one crore doses during those six days, but the number of the jabs administered will

now become significantly lower.

"The duration of the vaccination drive, originally August 7-12, has been shortened due to shortage of jabs. For the time being, the drive will take place only on August 7 [Saturday]. Based on prior registration, 300 people will be jabbed at each centre. The elderly, women and people with disabilities will get priority," a top government official said after the decision was made at a high-profile meeting last night.

"We tried very hard, but we can't change the decision," said the official. There are 4,553 unions, 328 municipalities and 12 city corporations in

There will be three vaccination booths in every union and vaccines will be administered from those centres only, said an official who attended the

The drive hit the snag even though the government had repeatedly said it had enough stock of vaccines. The health minister and top health officials had said that the special

campaign would vaccinate at least one crore people in those six days. Health officials said the government had around one crore shots in stock. An official who attended the meeting said people in the union digital

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Lightning kills 19 in 2 districts

17 of them die when it hits a boat carrying a wedding party

At least 19 people were killed and 16 others injured by lightning in two incidents in Chapainawabganj and Kishoreganj yesterday.

Of the dead, 17 including five women are from Chapainawabganj. They ere travelling with a groom to a marriage ceremony.

The groom and his guests started their journey from Surynarayanpur area of Chapainawabganj by a boat for the bride's home in Panka area of Shibganj upazila. Lightning hit the boat when it reached Telikhari Ghat near Panka

around noon. The incident left 17 people dead, said Moudud Alam Khan, project implementation officer (PIO) of Chapainawabganj Sadar upazila. The groom survived. As per government rules, the PIO is responsible for providing assistance

to the families of the victims who die of lightning strikes.

Abdul Malek, officer-in-charge of Shibganj Police Station, said 16 of the dead were residents of Chapainawabganj Sadar upazila and the other one was from Shibganj upazila. Ten of the injured were admitted to Chapainawabganj Sadar Hospital,

said Dr Nurun Nahar, resident medical officer of the hospital. A two and a half years old baby boy was sent to Rajshahi Medical

College Hospital as he was in critical condition, the RMO added.

In Kishoreganj, two fishermen were killed and five others injured by lightning in Nikli upazila.

Steps not taken could've saved many lives

The government only recently decided to set up warning systems in 723 lightning prone areas in the country, even though 2,400 people died in lightning strikes yesterday.

It will also set up shelters at different

There are 723 lightning prone areas and we have decided to set up signalling systems from where we will send messages to everyone [in or near the area] on mobile phones 40 minutes before a strike," said Md Enamur Rahman, state minister for disaster management and relief, recently.

"We have also taken the decision to set up lightning shelters, like cyclone shelters, in empty spaces. They can be constructed every one or two kms in lightning prone areas," he said, adding that they have not yet calculated the number of shelters needed.

Why is the govt indulging Evaly so much?

What does one do when one sees wrongdoing taking place in front of one's very eyes? For most, the natural response would be to stop it in its tracks. And this is the question staring at the government regarding the e-commerce juggernaut Evaly.

By now, thanks to investigations by government agencies, particularly the Bangladesh Bank, everyone is all too aware of Evaly's notoriously close-lipped business model.

No, the e-commerce platform, which began its journey on December 16, 2018, did not crack any magic formula that would allow it to run yearround advertising blitzkrieg and unbelievable discounts at once -- without

How it operated until the first quarter of this year from its inception looks awfully similar to a Ponzi scheme: take advance payment from unsuspecting customers and use the money to run massive advertising campaigns broadcasting discounts as incredulous as 90 percent on the platform to draw

in more customers and get more money, and rinse and repeat. After months, the first round of customers might get delivery of their products or their order will be cancelled, with the refund taking place not in cash but in the form of a credit on Evaly's unlicensed digital wallet.

Faced with widespread criticism, the government yesterday backtracked on its decision -- made just a day before -- of not allowing people aged over 18 on the streets from August 11 unless they are vaccinated against Covid-19.

Liberation War Affairs Minister AKM Mozammel Haque retracted the comment he made on Tuesday, when he told the media following an interministerial meeting at the Secretariat that "anyone above 18 years will not be allowed on streets and on any mode of transport unless they are vaccinated".

The government will ease the "strict lockdown" currently in place to curb the spread of coronavirus from August 11.

Yesterday morning, hours before Mozammel's retraction, the health ministry in a press release distanced itself from the liberation war affairs minister's Tuesday's comment.

All hope lost for 24 families

The bodies of 24 of the workers who died in the Hashem Foods factory fire last month were handed over to their

Up until the phone calls yesterday, many of the families had some flickering hope that perhaps their loved one just went missing and was admitted to a hospital somewhere

and they will eventually be found. "I heard the DNA matching is done... is Shantamoni truly dead then?" asked the uncle of the 12-year-old who

used to pack lollipops in the factory.
Shantamoni is not just dead, her body was so charred that she was one of three dead bodies whose bone samples had to be tested for DNA. The other two are 16-year-old Munna and 15-year-old Fatema.

The bone samples are tested when the tissue collected from the body is too damaged, said Rumana Akter, special superintendent of the forensic department of the Criminal Investigation Department (CID).

The rest of the 45 bodies, who were all burned alive after being trapped on the third floor of the six-storey building with its only exit locked, were identified by way of their tissue samples.

The others whose bodies were handed over yesterday include Ayat Hossain, 19; Md Naim Islam, Nusrat Jahan Tuktuki, Hima Akhter, 16; Mosammat Shagarika Shaila, Khadeja Akhter, 16; Md Ali, Takia Akter, 14; Shahana Akter, 18; Mitu Akhter, Jahanara, 38; Fatzana, 14; Nazma Khatun, Ishrat Jahan Tuli, Nazma Begum, 35; Md Rashed, 25; Md Rakib Hossain, Feroza, 36; Md Tarek Zia, 15; Md Ripon Miah, 18; Mosammat Shahana Akter and Riya Akter, 30.

Each of the coffins was marked with a placard pointing out which way was the head of the body for ease of burial. "We had the bodies washed and wrapped in burial cloth
