In Fight Against Covid

Govt failing to engage people

Lack of instructions from government high-ups and coordination between different government bodies has left in a shambles the move to ensure community engagement in the fight against Covid-19.

The government had formed committees at the grassroots level across the country after the pandemic struck in March last year. The committees were supposed to work to make sure that people actively participate in health safety measures, including wearing masks, maintaining social distancing and keeping patients isolated.

Most of those committees, however, have remained inoperative since their formation because the government did not give much efforts to make them functional, The Daily Star has learned lately after talking to dozens of public representatives.

Health experts said Covid rules were being flouted in the absence of effective community engagement, causing the coronavirus situation to worsen every day.

They said the government also depended too much on administrative officials for the engagement, apparently ignoring the grassroots committees involving public representatives, different professionals and volunteers, and the decision did not help the cause much.

Country hits another grim milestone

Logs record 264 daily Covid deaths; 12,744 infected

The country yesterday recorded the highest number of Covid-19 deaths in a single day. A total of 264 people died in 24 hours ending at 8:00am yesterday, read a press release of the Directorate General of Health

Services (DGHS). Earlier, the record was 258 deaths on July 27.

The total number of Covid deaths in the country now stands at 21,902 and the Covid death rate stands at 1.66 percent.

As the country's healthcare system grapples with the wave of Covid cases caused largely by the Delta variant, 12,744 new cases were reported yesterday.

A total of 46,995 samples were tested across the country during the 24-hour period. Yesterday's positivity rate was 27.12 percent. So far 13,22,654 Covid cases have

Now a trial run tomorrow

The last-minute retreat regarding the special vaccination drive has exposed the lack of coordination and planning on the government's part, experts said.

It may also put the government in a credibility crisis and could make people lose interest in taking Covid-19 jabs, they

As part of the special drive, the government had planned to inoculate around one crore people in six days from August 7. But it held back its decision and decided to conduct a trial instead due to a shortage of vaccines.

Field-level officials have already started preparing for the trial run.
