RESTORATION OF BURI TEESTA IRRIGATION SCHEME

Hope revives in Jaldhaka, Dimla

In a positive development amid the ongoing drought-like situation in the North, the Buri Teesta irrigation project has resumed operations in Jaldhaka and Dimla upazilas under the coverage of the irrigation network initially.

Bangladesh Water Development Board (BWDB) hopes to bring around four thousand acres of croplands in Jaldhaka and Dimla upazilas under the coverage of the irrigation network initially.

BWDB officials said that after recording only 824 millimetres of rainfall in April-July, as opposed to 1,881 millimetres during the same period last year, they decided to expedite the restoration work of the decades-old project with the help of local farmers in order to save drought-stricken Aman paddy fields in the region.

The farmers voluntarily joined hands with the BWDB to repair breaches in the banks of canals, dig earthen channels and

level out uneven or raised canal beds.

Despite unavailability of funds for the project's rehabilitation work and limited work force, the BWDB made a whole-hearted effort in reviving the much-needed irrigation scheme in the area.

Implemented in 1968 at Kaliganj village, the irrigation scheme has a 91-meter-long barrage, a water reservoir on 1,200 acres of land and a 30-kilometre-long network of canals to irrigate 5,500 acres of cropland.

The project, however, got sidetracked in 1998 when the Teesta irrigation project, the largest of its kind in the country, was launched in Dimla upazila.

Eventually, pieces of land belonging to the Buri Teesta irrigation project started to go in the possession of land grabbers. The final blow to the project came in 2010 when the then BWDB authorities leased out its reservoir to fish farmers.

Locals took the matter to the High Court, which issued a stay order on fish

farming or irrigation operations in the project area.

After ten long years, in 2020, the High Court cancelled the lease and lifted the stay order. But the irrigation project by this time became almost non-functional.

SR Shafik Sadik, president of Buri Teesta irrigation management committee of farmers, said, "We demanded water for irrigation so that poor rainfall cannot hamper Aman cultivation amid Covid-19 situation. We assured the BWDB that we would repair the canals by ourselves and despite their limitations, the BWDB extended their cooperation."

BWDB Sub-divisional Engineer Abdul Hannan Prodhan said, "We started discharging irrigation water from 28 July, although most of the project's infrastructure was vulnerable and [we had] no fund available."

The BWDB arranged money for major repair work from its general maintenance

fund and the farmers built channels to bring water to about four thousand acres of cropland.

The coverage area is increasing gradually, he added.

Birendranath Roy, a farmer from Rashidpur village, said, "We made earthen channels, repaired breaches in the banks [of canals] on our own to bring water in to our land."

The production cost will now go down and proper irrigation will ultimately result in better yield of crops, hoped Ashraf Islam, another farmer from Taluk Golna village.

Abdullah Al Mamun, executive engineer of BWDB in Nilphamari, said, "In Covid-19 times, it was a challenge to ensure irrigation through a project that had been inoperative for ten years. But we have succeeded."

"We are likely to expand it in future as a new project is underway," he added.

Man held for raping 6yr-old in Rangpur

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) on Tuesday arrested a young man from Gaibandha in connection with a case for raping a minor girl in Rangpur's Pargachha upazila.

The arrestee, Tushar Imran, a resident of Norsingha village in Pargachha upazila, was produced before a court yesterday that sent him to jail.

Rab officials said father of the six-year-old victim filed a case with Pargachha Police Station accusing Tushar on August 8, but the culprit went into hiding since the incident occurred on July 28. Commander of Rab-13 in Rangpur Reza Ahmed Ferdous said at a press conference held at Rab-13 Headquarters in Rangpur yesterday.

Based on secret information, a team of Rab-13 arrested Tushar from one of his relatives' house in Gaibandha Sadar upazila on Tuesday afternoon, the official said, adding that the arrestee was handed over to Pargachha Police Station.

According to the case statements, the minor victim was playing nearby her house on July 28 afternoon.

At one stage, neighbouring Tushar suddenly appeared on the scene, lured the girl to his house and raped her there.

Neo JMB member held

Police claimed to have arrested an active member of militant group "Neo JMB" from the capital on Tuesday.

The arrested, Nazmus Shakib, is son of Korban Ali of Tangbhanga village in Lalmonirhat's Hatibandha upazila.

Officer in Charge (OC) of Hatibandha Police Station Ershadul Alam said Shakib is accused in a case filed with the police station for injuring a policeman and involved in anti-government activities.

A team of Hatibandha police with the help of Anti-Terrorism Unit members arrested Shakib from Dhaka's Khilgaon area on Tuesday night, the OC said.

The arrestee was produced before a Lalmonirhat court yesterday that sent him to jail, he added.

Hindu idol vandalised

Unidentified criminals damaged an idol of Hindu Goddess Kali at a temple in Sherpur upazila yesterday.

The incident took place at Chandizan village around midnight, villagers said.

One of the villagers Gosai Chanda Das, 60, said the temple is very old and locals have been worshipping the Goddess Kali here since the British era.

On Monday midnight, some unidentified criminals entered the Kali Mandir, vandalised the idol, and threw the idol some 150 metres away from the temple.

Ripon Kumar, a local youth, first saw the broken idol and informed them, he said.

Resumption from next week

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India, sources at the CAAB said.

Millions of people including patients, businessmen and students used to visit India every year while many Indians used to visit Bangladesh for various purposes.

Bangladesh suspended operating all international flights on April 14 after the start of the second wave of coronavirus in the country.

After being closed for 16 days, the operation of international flights resumed from May 1 except for 12 countries including India.

CAAB later added and deducted names of different countries from the list.

In its latest circular on July 5, CAAB made a fresh list of eight countries including India from where no passengers were allowed to enter Bangladesh.

Earlier, when coronavirus infection started in the country last year, air communication with India was closed for several months.

The flight started between Bangladesh and India on October 28 last year under the air bubble agreement.

All Indian Visa Application Centres (VACs) in Bangladesh already resumed

operations from Wednesday as the Covid-19 lockdown restrictions have been eased.

A Facebook post from the Indian High Commission in Dhaka on Tuesday said all applications except for tourist visas will be accepted.

CAAB in its letter to the Director General of Civil Aviation of India on August 4 had proposed 21 air bubble flights per week for both countries. It also said the air bubble flight may resume from August 11.

The letter also said which categories of passengers could be flown.

Besides, for the mandatory Covid-19 test and negative certificate, the test must be done within 72 hours of flight departure.

Regarding capacity restrictions on flights, CAAB said a maximum of 140 passengers in the narrow-bodied (single-aisle) aircraft and 200 passengers in the wide-bodied (twin-aisle) aircraft can be carried.

Apart from Biman Bangladesh Airlines, Novo Air and US Bangla, and 5 Indian airlines used to operate flights from Bangladesh on various routes to India during normal time.

Indian airlines include Air India, Indigo, Spicejet, Vistara and GoAir.

BFIU seeks

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Pornography Control Act, Arms Act, Special Powers Act and Digital Security Act, CID Additional Superintendent of Police Azad Rahman told this newspaper.

ROZINA'S BANK INFO SOUGHT

Banks were asked to provide statements of deposits and transactions made through the accounts of Rozina, senior reporter of Bangla daily Prothom Alo, within five working days.

The directive was issued on Tuesday following a request from a state agency, BFIU officials said.

On May 17 this year, Rozina went to the health ministry at the Secretariat to perform her professional duties.

She was confined to a room at the ministry for nearly six hours, and then taken to Shahbagh Police Station. She was in police custody for nearly 11 hours.

Later, Rozina was shown arrested in a case filed against her under the Official Secrets Act and the Penal Code, which drew widespread protest and criticism.

On May 23, she was released from jail after a Dhaka court granted her interim bail.

HC issues contempt rule

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for violating its directive by allowing Indo-Bangla Pharmaceuticals Limited to produce antibiotics.

The five officials against whom the contempt of court rule was issued are Health Secretary Lokman Hossain Miah; Director General of Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) Prof Dr ABM Khurshid Alam; Director General of Drug Administration (DGDA) Major General Md Mahbubur Rahman; Director General of Directorate of National Consumer Rights Protection (DNCRP) Babul Kumar Shaha and Managing Director of Indo-Bangla Pharmaceuticals Limited AFM Anwarul Haque.

The HC bench of Justice Mamnoon Rahman and Justice Khandaker Diliuzzaman issued the rule following a contempt of court petition filed by Ripan Barai on behalf of rights organisation Human Rights and Peace for Bangladesh (HRPB).

During hearing on the contempt of court petition yesterday, HRPB's lawyer Manzill Murshid told the court that antibiotics are life-saving medicines.

Taking that into consideration, the

HC on February 13, 2017 had delivered a verdict directing officials concerned of the government to take necessary steps so that 14 pharmaceutical companies including Indo-Bangla Pharmaceuticals Limited cannot produce antibiotics, as their products were below par.

Delivering the verdict on a writ petition filed by HRPB, the HC on that day asked the DG of DGDA to monitor the activities of drug companies and see that the orders are implemented.

The HC had also formed a five-member committee to ensure that the companies do not produce antibiotics without having received a Good Manufacturing Practice (GMP) recommendation from the World Health Organization (WHO).

But, Indo-Bangla Pharmaceuticals Limited are causing damage to people by producing and selling antibiotics in violation of the directives issued by the HC in 2017, the lawyer said.

Manzill Murshid also said the officials concerned, including the DG of DGDA, are not taking any steps against Indo-Bangla Pharmaceuticals, which is disrespectful to the HC directives and also contempt of court, and a punishable offence.

Migration to South Korea

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Overseas Employment and Services Limited (BOESL).

The countries are China, Thailand, Indonesia, Vietnam, Philippines, Mongolia, Cambodia, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Nepal, Myanmar, Uzbekistan, Sri Lanka, Timor-Leste, Kyrgyzstan and Laos, says EPS' official website.

BOESL, owned by the government, is the lone agency sending workers from Bangladesh to South Korea under EPS.

Billal Hossain, BOESL's managing director, on Monday said the visa embargo put by South Korea on new EPS workers is still in place.

However, following negotiations, the Bangladesh government was able to resume re-entry of some old workers, he told this newspaper over the phone.

He said they held a meeting with the director of the Human Resources Department of South Korea recently to get the visa embargo lifted. Besides, they were negotiating through the Bangladesh foreign ministry.

If necessary, the BOESL MD said, they are ready to intensify any measures including a quarantine facility, which is already in place.

The overall visa embargo that South Korea put on Bangladesh was due to the Covid-19 situation while BOESL's concern

is regarding the migrant workers under the EPS, he further said.

Mokima Begum, first secretary at the labour wing of the Bangladesh Embassy in Seoul, recently said they have kept all sorts of efforts ongoing to have the visa embargo lifted.

She said the embassy has already sent a note verbal to the South Korean authorities concerned for withdrawal of the embargo.

As workers are unable to get jobs due to the visa embargo at present, this has left many of them in frustration, Mokima told this newspaper via WhatsApp.

According to BOESL's 2019-2020 annual report, Bangladesh signed a memorandum of understanding with South Korea in 2007 for the recruitment of Bangladeshi workers under EPS and started sending workers through BOESL the next year.

The age range for workers wanting to migrate under EPS is 18-39 years while the total migration cost is \$1,115 including airfare, states the report.

Such workers usually earn about Tk 2 lakh a month, including overtime. Sometimes, employers provide free accommodation and food for workers, it also states.

Before 2006, Bangladeshi workers migrated to South Korea under the Industrial Trainee Scheme (ITS) at a higher migration cost.

Terrifying 'dragon'

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Researchers including Tim Richards, a University of Queensland postdoctoral student in the School of Biological Sciences' Dinosaur Lab, analyzed a jaw fossil from the pterosaur. It was originally discovered in a quarry just

Five out of 20 gold bars still

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charge of Feni DB police, sub-inspectors Mizanur Rahman, Motahar Hossain and Nurul Haque and assistant sub-inspectors Avijit Roy and Masud Rana for robbing 20 gold bars, worth Tk 1.27 crore, from a businessman.

Khandaker Nur-Un-Nabi, superintendent of Feni police, said Gopal Kanti Das, a Chattogram-based gold businessman, complained to him against six DB personnel about looting of his gold bars on Monday.

Gopal alleged that on Sunday, he was travelling to Dhaka from the port city and was stopped at the DB police check point on Dhaka-Chittagong highway near Star Line Filling Station at Fatehpur of Feni. The police officers forcibly took away 20 gold bars from him.

Following the complaint, the SP started

investigation. On Tuesday, Gopal identified four out of six police officers.

After interrogation, the four officers and the rest two were found involved in the robbery incident.

Later, the Chattogram-based businessman lodged a robbery case against the six DB men with Feni Model Police Station on Tuesday night.

Police arrested the DB officials.

Out of 20 gold bars, 15 were recovered from the possession of Inspector Saiful. Police are trying to recover the rest, the SP added.

Aminul Islam Sumon, a lawyer of the complainant, said, "We prayed to the court to issue remand order for further interrogation to recover the rest gold bars."

It should be investigated whether DB Inspector Saiful was involved in other crimes, he told the court.

Upazila chairman gets jab

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prohibited.

He said he issued a show-cause notice yesterday, asking Tanore Upazila Health Officer Barnabas Hasda to explain in three days why the chairman was vaccinated in his home.

"People wait in queues for hours in the vaccination centres to take Covid shots and you are having it at your home. This is not ethical at all," he said.

He also accused the upazila chairman of misusing his power for taking the vaccine.

Health officials confirmed that the man seen in the photo administering the dose on the chairman was Nishan Mandal, a porter who works to transport vaccines from government stores to vaccination centres.

Contacted by The Daily Star, Nishan

admitted jabbing the chairman and said he learnt the job by "observing health staffers".

The upazila parishad chairman said he asked health staffers to vaccinate him at his home because it "would save his time".

"I had to go to Dhaka for an emergency. So I requested them to come to my home and give me the shot."

Barnabas Hasda, the upazila health officer, said he only cooperated with the chairman by acting on his request. He, however, acknowledged that sending vaccines outside vaccination centres was illegal.

But Tanore UNO Pankaj Chandra Devnath described the incident as a "minor" one. "I don't see anything wrong here. It can happen during emergencies," he said.
