CONTRACT BREACH OVER 10 LOCOMOTIVES

## Technical body recommends accepting those

A technical committee has recommended taking delivery of the 10 locomotives South Korean Hyundai Rotem Company (HRC) has supplied to the Bangladesh Railway (BR) that did not meet the specifications agreed in the contract, said BR officials.

The locomotives, which cost about Tk 330 crore, have been sitting idle since they arrived in Bangladesh in As per the technical committee, the locomotives can be

accepted in their present format, according to Dhirendra Nath Mazumder, director-general of the BR.

The locomotives, which were procured under a Tk 733.6 crore-project in 2015, were supposed to have the TA12-CA9 alternator model, as per the contract signed with Hyundai. But the South Korean automotive manufacturer provided the locomotives of the TA9-12CA9SE alternator model.

The two models are different in terms of power output, according to BR officials.

Besides, as per a government plan, all rail lines in Bangladesh would be converted into dual gauge within a few years, so the BR was instructed to purchase locomotives that could be used on both metre-gauge and broad-gauge by changing the undercarriages

But with the TA9-12CA9SE alternator, the locomotives

will not run on broad-gauge, according to BR officials. After the metre-gauge diesel-electric locomotives reached Bangladesh, the BR commissioning committee found that the technical specifications of four key components --

### Neo JMB planned to make bombs with chloroform

Claim CTTC officials; buses, classrooms were targets

The IS-inspired militant outfit Neo JMB was planning to make chloroform bombs for carrying out attacks in buses, classrooms, and at public places, claimed Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime (CTTC) officials.

The outfit's plan was to "kill silently" and it even conducted tests on frogs, which swelled up and died, the officials

The military wing of the outfit had started work to make the chloroform bombs with the blessings of Neo JMB ameer Mahadi Hasan Jon. The outfit's bomb expert Jahid Hasan alias Ismail Hasan Furkan was coordinating it.

The CTTC unit claimed to have unearthed the plans following the arrests and interrogation of several Neo JMB bomb makers, including Furkan.

Rahmat Ullah Chowdhury, in-charge of the bomb disposal unit of CTTC, told The Daily Star yesterday, "The outfit is planning to use the chemical for silent killing. But we are aware of it and have already intensified vigilance.

DOCKER'S BLOCK PAK SHIP A Pakistani freighter due to dock in Philadelphia was forced to change its course and head for Baltimore after pickets supporting the cause

of Bangladesh -- backed by a non-violent fleet of small craft -occupied the shore and the inlet.

About 50 members of the peace group -- which espoused a complete halt to arms and military shipment to the Government of Pakistan -- grouped at Pier 80 on the Delaware River.

### Chinese scientists develop world's strongest glass

Scientists in China have developed the hardest and strongest glassy material known so far that can scratch diamond crystals with ease.

The researchers, including those from Yanshan University in China, noted that the new material - tentatively named AM-III - has "outstanding" mechanical and electronic properties, and could find applications in solar cells due to its "ultrahigh" strength and wear resistance.

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#### Russia posts record daily death toll

Russia yesterday reported its highest daily coronavirus death toll since the start of the pandemic, as rising cases in parts of world fuelled by the Delta variant continued to cause havoc.

A Russian government tally reported 808 fatalities over the past 24 hours -- the first time Russia has crossed the 800-mark for daily virus deaths -- and 21,932 new infections.

Russia, the fourth worsthit country in the world in terms of cases, according to an AFP tally, has been swept with an unrelenting third wave since mid-June that has been driven by the Delta variant.

Authorities have faced a vaccine-sceptic population, with a poll by the independent Levada Centre this week showing that 55 percent of Russians do not plan on getting a jab.
