

PHQ revamps recruitment process

Move comes after widespread allegations of corruption, bribery

With a view to making the recruitment of constables transparent and free of corruption, the Police Headquarters has overhauled the recruitment procedure ahead of hiring 5,000 individuals in the posts in 64 districts.

The new process would allow the PHQ to directly evaluate the written test of the candidates.

The PHQ has changed the weights of the written and viva marks and put in place a more rigorous assessment of candidates before a shortlist is prepared.

The move came following widespread allegations of rampant bribery and corruption in recruitments in recent

Superintendents of police in districts recruit constables as per the existing rules. There are allegations that in most cases, constables are recruited from the lists of names provided by political leaders and influential people, several SPs told The Daily Star.

Political leaders and those who lobbied for recruitment of their candidate allegedly took hefty amounts in bribes from aspiring candidates. Besides, dishonest SPs also allegedly take bribes during recruitment.

To bring such alleged malpractice to a halt, Police Headquarters (PHQ) for the first time will evaluate the written exam sheets of the candidates instead of district SPs, said PHQ officials.

BR wants its own body to consult on projects

Bangladesh Railway (BR) is planning to form a separate body for carrying out feasibility studies and getting consultancy services for its potential and ongoing projects.

Two separate committees technical advisory committee and working committee -- have already been formed for assessing the need of different departments and a draft organogram of the new body, sources said.

The working committee is scheduled to hold its first meeting today and is expected to make their recommendations in this regard, said one of the members of the committee on condition of anonymity.

"This is still at a very preliminary stage. Our committee will prepare the structure and the technical advisory committee will work on it," the member told The Daily Star yesterday.

Death toll jumps to over 1,200

Hospitals swamped by thousands of injured AGENCIES

The death toll from Haiti's powerful earthquake jumped to over 1,200 yesterday, as crews desperately dug through collapsed buildings for survivors in the Caribbean nation still reeling from its president's assassination.

In Les Cayes, as in other ard-hit cities on the southwestern peninsula, most of the population spent the night sleeping outdoors in front of their houses -- or what remained of them -- amid fears of new aftershocks.

The streets there were filled with the grinding of heavy equipment lifting debris from collapsed buildings, as well as the quieter sounds of people pulling away rubble by hand while searching for

Kosygin warns Yahya

WAR WILL BE SUICIDAL, KOSYGIN **TELLS YAHYA**

Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin was said to have told Pakistan President Yahya Khan that any war with India will be suicidal for Pakistan. Kosygin conveyed this in a message which the new Soviet Ambassador to Pakistan AA Rodinov delivered at Rawalpindi today.

The communication, it was learnt, asked the Pakistani junta to bring an end to atrocities in Bangladesh and not to proceed with the trial of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. The Soviet Premier also pointed out that the continued influx of refugees from Bangladesh to India had been due to conditions of insecurity in East Pakistan. He was supposed to have advised President Yahva in favour of a political solution with the elected leaders of Bangladesh.

Bodies of 2 missing Rohingyas recovered

Two bodies of Rohingya women were recovered yesterday from coastal areas of Chattogram's Sandwip after a boat carrying 30 Rohingyas capsized in the Bay of Bengal while fleeing from Bhasan Char early Saturday.

At least 17 Rohingyas still reportedly remain missing while 11 were rescued from the sea by a fishing trawler on Saturday. So far, two bodies were recovered in four days.

The rescue operation, launched by Coast Guard East Zone, is going on for the missing Rohingyas, say SEE PAGE 10 COL 1
