Twin blasts kill over 60

Says Afghan health ministry official; 12 US servicemen among the dead; dozens wounded; IS claims responsibility

Islamic State suicide bombers struck the crowded gates of Kabul airport with at least two explosions yesterday, killing at least 60 people and injuring dozens, and bringing a catastrophic halt to the airlift of tens of thousands of Afghans desperate to flee.

An official with Afghanistan's Ministry of Public Health told CNN that more than 60 people were killed and 140 wounded. The country's new Taliban rulers said the blasts killed between 13 and 20 people.

Twelve US troops were killed and 15 wounded in the attack, said General Kenneth McKenzie, head of the US Central Command.

Islamic State claimed responsibility for the attacks, the group's Amaq News Agency said on its Telegram channel.

The blasts came as the August 31 deadline looms for the United States to withdraw its troops, and for it and other Western countries to end a massive airlift that has already evacuated nearly 100,000 people.

Students of all public and private universities will be inoculated against Covid-19 by September and the universities will start inperson classes from October 15, a meeting of the ministries and stakeholders concerned decided yesterday.

The students will have to wear masks on campus and follow other health-safety guidelines.

The decision was made at the meeting of the top brass of the education ministries, University Grants Commission (UGC), vice chancellors of all public universities, and high officials of education-related directorates.

Education Minister Dipu Moni chaired the meeting.

Fourth year and masters' students are to start in-person classes first but the authorities have left it to the universities to decide which SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

ACC cannot freeze, attach property: HC

Anti-graft body must seek court permission for it

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) has no authority to freeze, attach or impose any restrictions on anybody's property without permission from the court, the High Court has observed in a

"The Anti-Corruption Commission Rules, 2007, does not give any power to an enquiry or investigating officer or any other officer of the ACC for freezing or attachment of a 'crime acquired property' or otherwise imposing any restriction to enjoy the same at his whim," the court said in the full text of a verdict released on Wednesday.

On June 27, the bench of Justice M Enayetur Rahim and Justice Md Mostafizur Rahman delivered a short verdict declaring illegal the order of an ACC investigation officer to freeze the bank account of Belayet Hossain, who owns a pharmacy in Cox's Bazar.

Rolling out in the open on Sunday

4 stations prepared for performance test

The authorities are all set to conduct a test run of a metro train on the main tracks on Sunday, touching a new milestone in the country's first

On that day, the first set of the metro train would come out of its depot for the first time and run on the elevated rail tracks. City dwellers will be able to see it from outside the project area. "All types of tests inside the depot have already been completed. Now

the performance test of the first metro train will begin on the viaduct on August 29," said MAN Siddique, managing director of Dhaka Mass Transit Company Ltd, which is implementing the project. We have completed almost all preparations for the performance test

Produce Covid jabs in 6 to 9 months

JS body asks govt-owned firm

A parliamentary body yesterday strongly recommended that Essential Drugs, a government-owned company, take immediate measures to produce Covid-19 vaccines within six to nine months so that all citizens can be brought under vaccination as soon as possible.

The health ministry in a meeting at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban told the parliamentary standing committee on the ministry that it formed two committees -- an advisory one and another technical - on producing Covid-19 vaccine at Essential Drug's Gopalganj unit, meeting sources said.

The coronavirus vaccine will be produced at Essential Drug's laboratory through a process known as fill-finish.

Fill-finish, or fill and finish, is the final manufacturing step in the overall drug manufacturing process. In the pharmaceutical industry, fill and finish is the

process of filling vials with the vaccine and finishing the process by packaging the medicine for distribution. Members of the advisory committee are the minister of health, senior secretary of the Ministry of Health, director general of Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS),

vice-chancellor of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University and managing director of Essential Drugs, said meeting sources. The terms of reference of this committee is to advise the technical committee on production of Covid-19 and to review the recommendations of the technical committee

vaccine production activities. The DGHS director general was made convener of the technical committee, the members of which are: director general of Directorate General of Drug Administration (DGDA), additional secretary (health service) of health
