9 fish species on verge of extinction

Finds global study, says one in every four local fish species threatened

On May 7, a fisherman in Sylhet caught a 180kg Baghair from the Kushiyara river and brought it to Lalbazar, a famous fish market in the city.

Having learned that the fish would be put on display, hundreds of curious locals flocked in for a glimpse. Too big for a single customer, the fish was later cut into pieces and sold among locals within hours.

Such "celebrations" of big catch and its public display has long been a tradition in rural Bangladesh, but experts are concerned at the rate some sweetwater fish species, including Baghair, are vanishing.

This particular fish species is listed as "critically endangered" by the IUCN Red List of Threatened Species SEE PAGE 6 COL 2

Lowest daily Covid deaths reported in two months

Health officials reported 80 deaths from Covid-19 yesterday, the lowest in over two months.

On June 27, the officially reported toll was 77.

Amid the transmission of the Delta variant of coronavirus from the beginning of May, the number of deaths started rising and crossed the 200mark on July 7.

The highest single day toll, 264, was recorded on August 5 and 10.

With yesterday's toll, the number of deaths rose to 25,926, which is around 1.74 percent of the total confirmed cases.

Officials said in the 24 hours preceding 8:00am yesterday, 3,436 people tested positive for Covid-19, the lowest in over two and a half months. This took the number of total confirmed cases to 14,89,589.

World's first 3D-printed Wagyu beef revealed

The world's first 3D-printed Wagyu beef has been revealed by scientists, who say it has marbling 'just like the real thing' and is grown from stem cells in the lab.

Most 'cultured' meat produced so far has come out like mince rather than steak, composed of simple muscle fibres rather than more complex

However, steaks - particularly from delicate Waygu beef - contain fat, muscle and blood vessels in an intricate structure producing a marbling effect, and this is what the team from Osaka SEE PAGE 6 COL 6

Officials bury carcass of whale in Cox's Bazar

Forest and livestock officials buried a large Bryde's whale yesterday, around three days after it was washed ashore dead.

The decomposed body of the 33 feet-long whale was noticed by local fishermen in Monkhali beach area of Cox's Bazar's Teknaf upazila on Wednesday morning.

Shawkat Ali, livestock officer in Teknaf, told The Daily Star that they performed an autopsy on the whale and found that it died due to gastrointestinal perforation.

Gastrointestinal perforation occurs when a hole forms all the way through the stomach, large bowel, or small intestine. "This could have caused

Hasina to break ground today

Cox's Bazar Runway Expansion

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is set to virtually inaugurate the ground breaking ceremony and unveil the foundation stone of the runway extension at Cox's Bazar Airport today morning.

The Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (Caab) has taken the initiative to construct the longest runway in the country by extending the existing 9,000feet runway by another 1,700 on the Bay of

On February 9, the Caab signed a deal with the Chinese joint venture of Changjiang Yichang Waterway Engineering Bureau (CYWEB) and China Civil Engineering Construction Corporation (CCECC) on the expansion of the runway.

According to project documents, the deadline to finish construction is May 10,

Under the agreement, the contractor will extend the runway towards the Maheshkhali channel through coastal land reclamation.

The government in 2019 took the initiative to expand the runway to upgrade it to international standards and offer foreign holidaymakers a hassle-free trip to the world's longest unbroken sea beach.
