# Every city dweller loses 7.7 years

Dhaka residents could live 7.7 years longer if air pollution subsidies, found a recent global study.

Air pollution shortens the average Bangladeshi's life expectancy by 5.4 years, said the latest edition of the Energy Policy Institute at Chicago's Air Quality Life Index (AQLI), which is to be released today.

At present, the average life expectancy of Bangladeshis is 72.6 years, according to the Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics. In 1998, life expectancy was cut short by 2.8 years due to air pollution, while it stood at 5.4 years in 2019.

In each of the 64 districts, the levels of particulate matter -- which are solid and liquid particles like soot, smoke, dust that remain suspended in the air -- were found to be at least three times higher than the World Health Organisation guideline.

Most of the particulate matter, also known as PM 2.5, comes from fossil fuels such as from vehicle engines and power plants, said the study by the University of Chicago institute.

Microscopic particles that are just 3 percent the diameter of a human hair are deadly when they enter the respiratory system along with the oxygen.

The average annual PM 2.5 concentrations in Bangladesh was 77.1 micrograms per cubic metre (mcg/m3) of air, which is seven times the WHO exposure recommendation, according to the World Air Quality Report 2020 that was published in March.

# Probe recent accidents at level crossings

Rail minister asks officials after 14 mishaps in a month

Railways Minister Nurul Islam Sujan has directed the authorities concerned to investigate several recent railway accidents in which trucks hit trains at level crossings, most of which are unauthorised.

He also asked the railway police and officials to take legal action against the truck drivers responsible for the accidents.

The minister gave the directives at a meeting yesterday as the railway saw 14 accidents in August alone. In the last eight months, 82 railway accidents took place and at least one person was killed, said railway sources.

Though the meeting was convened mainly to discuss the railway's services and stopping sale of tickets on the black market, the issues regarding railway accidents dominated it.

"Several railway accidents took place one after another in which trucks hit trains. I have asked the authorities to probe whether there was any conspiracy behind this or those were purely accidental," Sujan told The Daily Star yesterday.

# LPG prices to go up again from today

UNB, Dhaka

Consumers will have to pay a higher price to buy liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) as the energy regulator yesterday announced its new price in line with the international market price.

As per the new price, consumers will have to pay Tk 1,033 for a cylinder of 12kg LPG from today instead of Tk 993, up by Tk 40.

Last month, the price was raised by Tk 102 for the same quantity of LPG and the prices of other quantities were raised at the same ratio.

The Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission (BERC) announced the new price of LPG adjusting it with Saudi Contract Price (CP) as the local LPG operators import the bulk petroleum gas from the Middle East.

"As the price of Saudi CP has gone up

# SI arrested for rape

A sub-inspector of Police was arrested after a woman filed a rape case against him with Gulshan Police Station yesterday morning.

The arrestee is Khairul Alam, an SI of Sher-e-Bangla Nagar Police Station.

Faruk Hossain, deputy commissioner (Media) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, said Khairul was arrested yesterday after the girl filed a case against him under the Women and Children Repression Prevention Act.

Police produced him before a Dhaka court seeking five-day remand but the court sent him to jail, rejecting the prayer.

The court, however, allowed police to interrogate him for a day at the jail gate, court sources said.

According to the case statement, the SI met the 20-year-old woman when she visited the Sher-E-Bangla Nagar Police Station to file a complaint a month ago.

# N'GANJ FACTORY FIRE It's an act of 'systematic killing'

Says Citizen Probe Committee report

The death of workers at Hashem Foods factory in Narayanganj was an act of systematic killing, stated a report of the Citizen Probe Committee.

"The devastating incident took place due to indifference, negligence and greed of the owner. That's why we're not terming it an accident, but rather a systematic killing," the report read.

On July 8, a deadly fire razed the factory of Hashem Foods Limited in Ruppaganj of Narayanganj, killing at least 52 workers and staffers of the factory.

However, the probe committee said in their investigation that they found 54 people died in the fire incident.

The summary of the 100-page probe report on the fire incident at Hashem Foods factory and workers' deaths was shared yesterday at Dhaka Reporters Unity.

Nineteen eminent citizens prepared the probe in 30 days and it is based on spot visits, interviews and document analysis.

Barrister Jyotirmoy Barua, convener of the 19-member probe committee, read out the report.

The committee demanded punishment of the responsible officials of the government authorities for their negligence in ensuring fire safety at the factory.

There were no emergency staircases in the building, yet it
