PERSONAL DATA PROTECTION LAW

Door ajar for misuse

Commendable draft leaves out state agencies from compliance

In a forward-looking move, the government has set out to form a law for personal data protection fashioned on the EU's momentous General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) as it looks to make Bangladesh fit for the digital age.

Like the GDPR, the law would allow citizens the right to know what personal information is being collected, how the data will be used or processed, for how long, and where the data will be kept or moved, according to the draft bill.

But where it diverged from the GDPR is that the certain state agencies like the law enforcement agencies are spared from complying with the law for "functions of the government". The Daily Star has a copy of the draft law prepared in November last year.

"The problem in the draft law is that it leaves wide loopholes for the government agencies, which will nullify the whole purpose of the law," said Md Saimum Reza Talukder, an advocate who specialises in

Kids' joy brings schools to life

School and college compounds across the country sprang into life once again as students stepped inside classrooms after 543 days of closure caused by the pandemic.

Relief, excitement and joy were writ large on the faces of students who once more resumed an activity that had seemed so natural until Covid-19 turned their worlds upside down on March 17, 2020.

Since then until yesterday, being stuck at home had become the natural order of things for these

The school authorities welcomed students while strictly maintaining health safety protocols. However, a number of guardians, especially in the capital, crowded around most school gates, flouting safety guidelines.

Many schools welcomed their students with roses, chocolates, pens and pencils and decorated campuses with festoons, balloons and motifs.

Barring a few exceptions, students wearing masks sanitised their hands at the entrances and maintained three feet distance inside classrooms. Authorities of schools split each

class into batches to maintain social distancing inside classrooms.

"I feel like today is the first day at my school," said Tasnim Mridha, a fifth-grader of University Laboratory School and College, who was delighted to return to school.

Teachers were happy to see their students back inside classrooms.

"We have long been waiting for students [to return]. We had been coming to the school for various reasons [during the closure] but we did not feel good without the hustle and bustle of students," Mirpur Government Primary School Head Teacher Nasrin Sultana told The

Education Minister Dipu Moni, when visiting Azimpur Government Girls' School and College in Dhaka, expressed disappointment with many parents not following the Covid-19 health guidelines.

She, however, expressed satisfaction with students following guidelines properly.

"You can drop students off at school and go home if possible. Or, you could wait outside school, maintaining the necessary distance, she told reporters.

Guardians were seen flouting social distancing guidelines by crowding at most school gates including Viqarunnisa Noon School and College, Monipur High School and College (Shewrapara branch), Shaheed Police Smrity College, Upashahar Government Primary

Dipu Moni also warned that if any institution was violating health guidelines, strict action would be taken.

TAKING DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

Keep environment in mind: PM

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday stressed the importance of considering the impact on the environment while taking any development project. "We always focus on the environment

while taking any project. We always take measures to protect the environment while taking any step," she said.

The prime minister said this

while speaking at a programme to inaugurate five power plants with a total electricity generation capacity of 779 MW.

Hasina inaugurated the plants through videoconference from her official residence the Gono Bhaban as the programme was

The five power plants are the Bibiyana-III 400MW Combined Cycle Power Plant in Habiganj, Zulda, Chittagong 100MW Power Plant Unit-2, Meghnaghat 104MW Power Plant in Narayanganj, Modhumoti 100MW Power Plant in Bagerhat and upgradation of Sylhet 150MW Power Plant to 225MW Combined Cycle Power Plant in Sylhet.

The prime minister renewed her call to people to maintain austerity while using electricity as the government provides power

"The production cost of electricity is much higher. To provide services to subscribers, we are giving huge subsidies. The billing price is much lower than the production cost."

Requesting all to be careful about unnecessary usage of electricity, Hasina said, "If you don't have any need, please turn the electricity switches off. She said how much the government could provide

subsidies if people do not maintain austerity. "That should be taken care of [by consumers]."

Talking about the huge production of power in Bangladesh, the prime minister

said the transmission lines have to be set up alongside increasing the production to meet the demand. "So, we're constructing the transmission lines as well."

Hasina said the main aim of the government is to extensively provide electricity to rural areas so that the scope of employment generation increases.

"The overall development of rural people is on top of our priority list. That's why we've given the highest importance to communications and power lines," she said.

Regarding the Covid-19 pandemic, Hasina said the government is providing vaccines
