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REOPENING OF UNIVERSITIES

Jab registration only key

Although the government had planned to resume in-person classes at universities and their affiliated colleges from mid-October after vaccinating all students by September, about 60 percent of the tertiary-level pupils have not even registered for vaccination yet.

Now the government has moved away from the stance and said any university can resume in-person classes if all its students complete the online registration by September 27.

The development came as the Covid-19 infection rate has come down significantly. Once registered, university students will get the shots on a priority basis, said officials concerned.

The decision was made at a virtual meeting attended by officials of the education ministry, the University Grants Commission (UGC), vice-chancellors of public universities and health officials

yesterday.

Education Minister Dipu Moni presided over the meeting, two days after schools and colleges reopened across the country on Sunday following a Covid-induced closure of about 18 months. The meeting was held at a time when discussions are underway on whether universities can reopen ahead

of the scheduled date -- October 15.

UGC Member Prof Muhammed Alamgir, who attended the meeting, said students without national identity (NID) cards would be able to register for the vaccination using their birth certificates.

One-hundred and seven private universities, 50 public universities and their affiliated colleges have 44.34 lakh students in total, according to the latest UGC annual report.

The Dhaka airport authorities have seized Saudi riyals and Singapore dollars worth about Tk 12.5 crore from a Singapore-bound garment consignment, in a first such incident of smuggling of foreign currency in recent memory.

On Monday evening, the aviation security (Avsec) at the Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport recovered about 54.75 lakh Saudi riyals and 20,200 Singapore dollars from cartons that were by Star Express Line, a freighter company, for loading onto Singapore Airlines flight SQ-447.

The foreign notes were wrapped in

carbon paper -- a common technique to dodge the gaze of the dual view x-ray machine, AHM Touhid-ul Ahsan, executive director of HSIA, told The Daily Star.

Gazi Quayyum, a member of Avsec, spotted suspicious components as the cartons were passing through the x-ray machine. He opened one of the cartons and found waist belts in them. Star Express Line did not mention waist belts in the declaration form.

The Avsec member then cut the belt and felt a hard object was stuffed inside it. When he pulled the object out, he found wads of Saudi riyals.

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CLIMATE IMPACT ON COUNTRY'S COASTAL REGION

13.3 million at risk of displacement by 2050

A global World Bank report reveals

Salinity, rising sea levels and other adverse climate impacts could cause as many as 13.3 million people to leave their homes in the coastal areas of Bangladesh by 2050, a global World Bank report reveals.

The Groundswell report part II, unveiled on Monday, showed around 37 percent of all South Asian climate migrants will be from Bangladesh.

The report is an updated version of the first one published in 2018.

In the update, it said reduced agricultural

production, water scarcity, rising sea levels and other adverse effects of climate change could cause up to 216 million people to leave their homes and migrate within their own countries by this period.

About Bangladesh, the report mentioned findings from the 2018 report which said climate migration could outpace other internal migrations which drives the pessimistic reference scenario of South Asia. The region is projected to have 35.7 million climate migrants by 2050 (around

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Got to win even before the polls

They said the opposition party must wage a movement to dislodge the ruling Awami League from power, or else the AL will form government again like it did through an election in 2018.

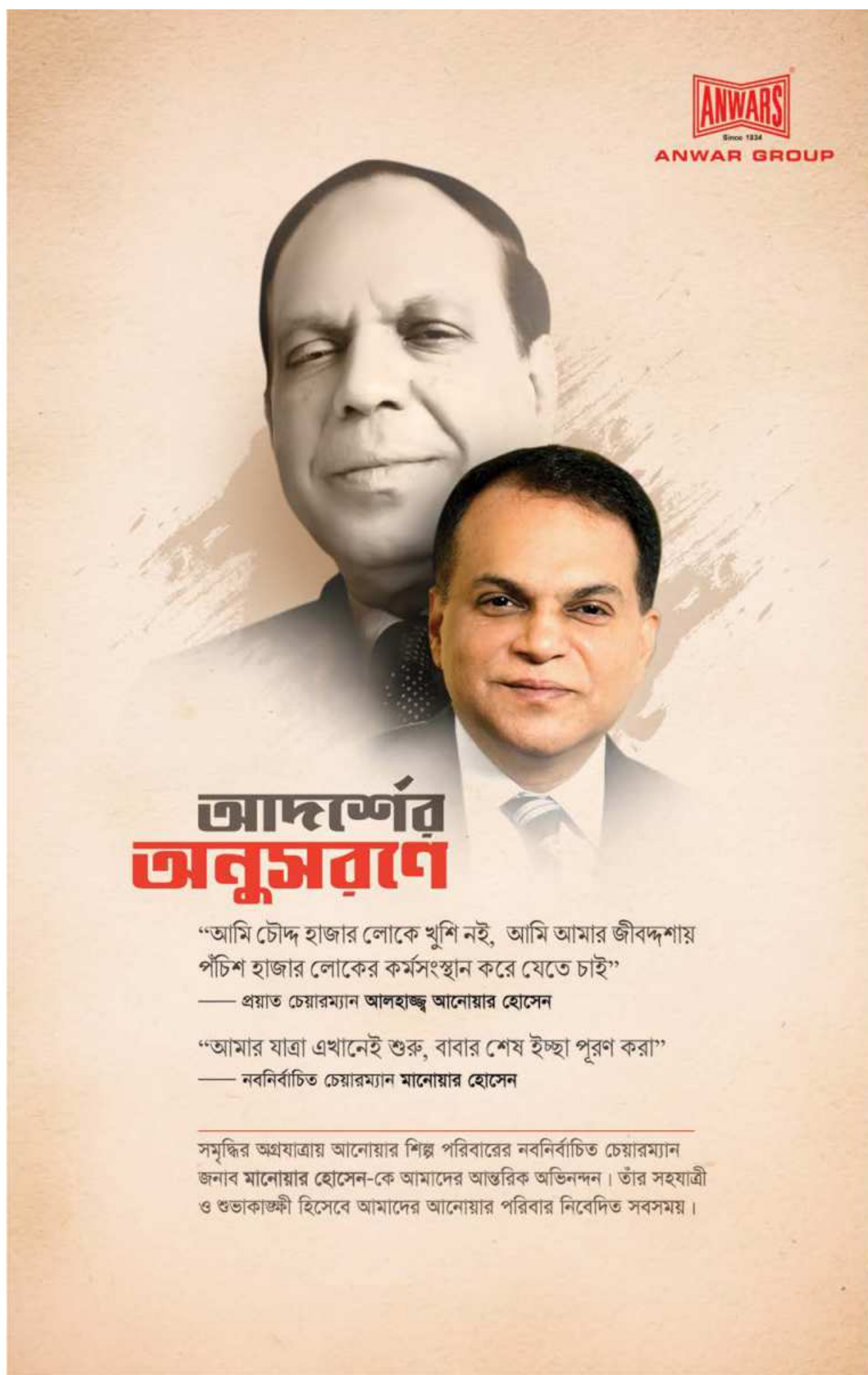
BNP vice chairmen and advisors to the BNP chairperson said that the party

The meetings are taking place as the party rank and file have long been frustrated in the absence of any directions from the leadership.

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
