'We have no connection with cases filed in B'baria, N'ganj'

Says Hindu Mahajote; people using its name for 'personal agenda'

Bangladesh Jatiya Hindu Mahajote, an organisation representing a section of the Hindu community in the country, yesterday protested the filing of two cases in Narayanganj and Brahmanbaria recently using the organisation's name.

"We have no connection with the filing of these two cases," they said in a statement issued yesterday.

They stated in the statement that individuals who filed the cases are not part of the Hindu Mahajote and that the organisation does not have anything to do with such activities.

"In principle, we oppose such filings of cases," read the statement, signed by its President Prabhash Chandra Roy,

Reg must for news portals from next year: info minister

The government will make registrations mandatory ahead of operating any news portal from the next year, said Information Minister Hasan Mahmud yesterday.



"Declaration is a must before publishing any newspaper, and there should be the same rule in the case of news portal operation. News portals must get registered before starting their activities which will help bring discipline in the sector," said the minister.

The minister came up with the remarks at BSRF Dialogue held at the secretariat, organised by Bangladesh Secretariat Reporters Forum (BSRF).

The minister said the government is taking an initiative to stop broadcasting news from IPTVs.

"Internet protocol television (IPTV) is a global reality. It's new media. Those shouldn't be shut. But the mushroom growth of IPTVs can't continue. So, we've put in place the registration process for IPTVs," the minister added.

Responding to a question, he said the proposed media workers law is now at the final stage.

203 hospitalised with dengue

At least 203 patients were hospitalised in the last 24 hours till 8am yesterday, of which 33 are from outside Dhaka, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

With the new cases, a total of 1,139 were diagnosed during the current month out of a total 19,336 infected. Of the total infected, 2,527 are from outside Dhaka.

At least 7,841 were diagnosed in September, 7,698 were diagnosed in August, 2,286 patients were hospitalised in July, 272 in June while 43 were infected in May and rest from January to April.

According to the DGHS, 73 people have died of dengue in the country this year. Twelve people have died in July, 34 in August, 23 in September and four in October so far.

Charge framing hearing against Kajol adjourned

A Dhaka tribunal yesterday deferred the hearing on charge framing against photojournalist Shafigul Islam Kajol in a case filed under the Digital Security Act.



Kajol was charged with circulating indecent, defamatory, objectionable, and fake information about some ministers, lawmakers, and top Jubo Mahila League leaders on Facebook.

Judge Mohammad Ash Sams Joglul Hossain of Dhaka Cyber Tribunal fixed October 20 as the next date after Kajol's lawyer submitted a petition, Shamim Al Mamun, bench assistant of the tribunal, told The Daily Star.

After almost a 10-month long probe, Sub-inspector Mohammad Russell Mollah of Detective Branch of police, also the case's investigation officer, on February 4 submitted the charge sheet with the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court of Dhaka.

Usmin Ara Bally, a member of the central committee of Jubo Mahila League, filed the case with Hazaribagh Police Station on March 10 last year.

'A vacuum that cannot be filled'

Jatiya Press Club mourns passing of 34 journalists

The country has lost luminaries in the field of journalism, leaving a vacuum that can never be filled, observed members of the Jatiya Press Club as they mourned the death of their fellows to Covid-19 and other ailments in the past one year.

An unprecedented 34 journalists who were members of the Press Club died in one year since its inception in 1967.

Their contributions to the development of this country and to the profession of journalism ought to be remembered, they said at the programme held at the Jatiya Press Club in the capital.

The Press Club organised the memorial to pay their deep respect to the departed souls.

"It is an irreparable loss for the

club and to journalism and we are shocked by the vacuum created by their demise," said President of the Jatiya Press Club Farida Yasmin, who chaired the programme.

She said journalists, especially the next generation, have many things to learn from them.

Manzurul Ahsan Bulbul, former president of BFUJ, said they took the club to a different level through their works.

University student killed by muggers

A university student was stabbed to death, allegedly by muggers, in the capital's Tejgaon area last on Tuesday night.

The deceased was identified as Keshob Ray Papon (24), a seventh-semester student of Computer Science and Engineering at Sonargaon University, said police.

He used to work at a courier services office in Elephant Road amid the pandemic, said Golam Sarwar, a sub-inspector of Tejgaon Police Station.

Unidentified muggers stabbed him to death at Karwan Bazar around 9pm on Tuesday when he was heading home in Monipuripara.

The Tejgaon SI said the youth was identified by family members and colleagues yesterday morning.

The police official said they have collected CCTV footage of nearby areas to identify the killers.

Police have so far detained four persons for interrogation, he said.

Customs Intelligence and Investigation Directorate seized 120 gold bars -- weighing around 14kg -- from an aircraft's tissue box chamber at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport on Tuesday.

The bars were hidden in an aircraft of Biman that landed at the airport around 4:15pm, said CIID Director General Abdur Rouf at a press conference at his office in Kakrail yesterday afternoon.

None was arrested as the gold worth around Tk 10 crore was left abandoned, he added.

CIID said they have seized around 40kg gold this fiscal year while the amount of seized gold was 174kg and 180kg in last two fiscal years respectively.
