An Election Commission committee is going to place a recommendation of collecting information of students aged above 16 from their educational institutions to provide them with National Identity (NID) cards.

The committee will also recommend to the EC to acquire details of out-ofschool children from union offices in rural areas and the EC designated places in cities, top EC officials said.

This year, information of citizens who were born between January 1, 2005, and January 1, 2006, will be collected from schools, madrasas, other educational institutions and union offices.

They will get NID cards at the age of 16, after completing the biometric process, and gradually be included in the voter list after reaching 18, the officials said

The committee on NID card, voter list and uses of ICT in election management, led by Brigadier General (retd) Shahadat Hossain Chowdhury, is working on the issue.

"We will place our recommendations before an EC meeting soon," Shahadat told The Daily Star yesterday.

He said that there would be pilot programmes at five educational institutions and the committee was working on detailed modalities of the activities including the issue of finance. Shahadat made the comments when

a section of field-level officials opined that they should go door-to-door to collect information of eligible voters.

They, from an online meeting on September 14, proposed that information should be collected via door-to-door campaigns to keep the Rohingyas away from the voters' list and drop the names of voters who died.

Shahadat said that after the meeting he sat with field-level officials and discussed the matter with them in a training session.

"Rohingyas are not in schools of Bangladesh. There are some other government mechanisms like Office of the Registrar General and Birth and Death Registration that the EC can explore," he said.

He said that they were not proposing going door-to-door due to the Covid-19 situation and they would not get enough information collectors as they would not feel positive about it and many families would not entertain information collectors amid this pandemic.

"Besides, we also have time constraints as our tenure will expire soon and the government is planning to provide Covid-19 vaccines. We had collected information of eligible voters by going door-to-door in 2019 and I believe new EC will update the voter list before the next general elections, Shahadat said.

Usually, the EC gets information from eligible voters by going door-to-door. In 2019, officials received data of people born between January 1, 2001, and January 1, 2004.

NID cards are issued to every Bangladeshi citizen upon turning 18 years old. It is required for multiple essential public services such as obtaining utility connections, getting mobile SIM cards and passports, and opening bank accounts.

Poverty set to drop further

The WB's forecast is close to the government's poverty rate estimation for ultra-poor in the country. According to the government estimation, the poor constituted 20.5 percent of the population while the ultra-poor made up 10.5 percent in the 2018-19 fiscal

The new WB report estimated a further drop in the poverty rate --11.2 percent -- in the 2022-23 fiscal year, which would be lower than pre-

Speaking on the poverty situation, Zahid Hussain, a former lead economist of the World Bank's Dhaka office, said towards the end of last year, people involved in small businesses like tea stall owners, hairdressers and peddlers returned to work albeit earning less than they did before the pandemic.

no more. Now, the pre-Covid situation has almost returned. That is why this year's GDP will be higher than last year's. In that case, I assume that the horror of Covid will not come back," he

according to the report.

The WB report stated that a nationally representative phone survey showed income losses and high levels of self-reported food insecurity in the 2019-20 fiscal year. In areas dominated by the poor in Dhaka and Chattogram, surveys showed that adults who stopped working due to Covid-19 were 11 percent more likely to report food

"As growth strengthened in FY21 [20-21], household surveys point to a gradual recovery in employment and

earnings. Estimated poverty remained flat, although food security improved across the country, with the greatest increase in Chattogram," it said.

The report said a modest recovery in GDP growth was sustained in the second half of 2020-21, despite ongoing movement restrictions to control the Covid-19 pandemic.

The recovery is expected to gradually accelerate, particularly if the supply of vaccines rises and if the economic scarring effects of the pandemic can be contained, the World Bank said.

Growth was supported by a demographic dividend, sound macroeconomic policies, and an acceleration in readymade garment (RMG) exports, while job creation and remittance inflows contributed to a sharp decline in poverty, the report said.

Zahid Hussain said, "Recovery is happening now, especially in the labour-intensive sectors. Now, it turns out that the possibility of going to the pre-pandemic level is quite bright.

"But there is a risk in the form of hike of commodity prices. If the inflation rate rises to 8-9 percent, there could be an impact on poverty. The way energy prices are rising in the international market, it could have an impact on poverty also. This will increase people's income but will reduce their purchasing power," he said.

The former lead economist of the WB's Dhaka office said the rise in energy prices is not due to a shortage of production, but mainly due to supply disruption. This means that the price hike is "cost-pushed".

the next six-seven months, he added. While talking about the poverty rate forecast of local agencies, he said their forecasts are temporary and the outcome may change in another survey. But what the World Bank has done is much more extensive, he said.

"So, WB's figure is not comparable with theirs."

According to the WB, the pandemic is estimated to have created 62-71 million new poor in 2020 and 48-59 million new poor in 2021 in South Asia. GDP TO GROW BY 6.4 PERCENT IN 2021-22

The World Bank projected Bangladesh's economy to grow by 6.4 per cent in the 2021-22 fiscal year, which is 1.3 percentage points higher than the global lender's previous forecast. In June, the WB predicted the

country's gross domestic product (GDP) would grow at 5.1 per cent in the current fiscal year.

"In Bangladesh, continued recovery in exports and consumption will help growth rates pick up to 6.4 per cent in the fiscal year 2021-22," it said.

However, they added, the recovery is still fragile and uneven. Most countries in South Asia are still far behind reaching pre-pandemic economic levels.

In June's budget, the government estimated growth to be 7.2 percent, and in September the Asian Development Bank (ADB) said it would be 7.8 percent.

The pandemic has had profound impacts on South Asia's economy. Going forward, much will depend on the speed of vaccination, the possible emergence of new Covid variants, as shortage of production, it would have well as any major slowdown in the momentum of global growth," said

"While short-term recovery is important, policymakers should also seize the opportunity to address deep-rooted challenges and pursue a development path that is green, resilient and inclusive.

"The surge in official remittance inflows is unlikely to persist if the net outflow of migrant workers slows in FY22 [21-22] and use of formal payment channels declines as travel restrictions are eased.'

"Revenue mobilisation will be supported by ongoing policy and administrative reforms to VAT and income tax, while higher capital expenditure on infrastructure megaprojects is expended to increase public expenditure."

Sustaining the economic recovery and further reducing poverty will depend in part on mitigating economic scarring through targeted support to vulnerable households and businesses, the WB report said.

It however said the risks to the outlook persist. Fiscal risks include weak domestic revenue growth if tax reforms are delayed and higher Covid-19 related expenditure.

"In the financial sector, contingent liabilities from non-performing loans combined with weak capital buffers could necessitate recapitalisations of state-owned banks and depress credit growth."

It said the external risks remain elevated -- while demand for RMGs ppears to be stabilising, the recovery is fragile.

Demand for Bangladesh's overseas workforce in the Gulf region may also be affected by the ongoing recession in that region, impairing future remittance inflows, it added.

Pakistan quake kills at least 20 Hundreds hurt; over 100 houses collapse

An earthquake of magnitude 5.7 hit southern Pakistan in the early hours of yesterday, killing 20 people, most of them women and children, and injuring about 300, at a time when many victims were asleep, authorities said.

The earthquake struck at a shallow depth of about 20 km (12 miles), with its epicentre 102 km (62 miles) east of the city of Quetta, the US Geological Survey (USGS) said.

"I was sleeping when suddenly my entire house jolted," Munir Shah, 40, a resident of Harnai district in Balochistan province, told Reuters by telephone.

"I took my children and wife outside. It was a terrifying situation as houses in Harnai were collapsing, my house was

"I found a large number of people under debris. Some of them might have died.'

More than 100 mud houses collapsed and many buildings were damaged, said

many people were killed by falling roofs and crumbling walls in the district's Babu Mohallah neighbourhood, said Nawab Khan, a local journalist.

"The entire town is a picture of devastation, as no house looks safe, thousands of people are rendered homeless and are under open sky,' Khan said, adding that almost 70% of power supply to the district had been disrupted

Prime Minister Imran Khan ordered immediate assessment of the damages and offered condolences to families that lost loved ones, adding, "I have ordered immediate assistance on an emergency basis ... for the earthquake victims."

Social media showed houses shaking and light fittings swaying as the quake struck. Stunned residents later gathered in the streets in the dark. Geo Television

decision was the outcome of lobbying and demonstrations by transport associations.

Many transport owners and drivers do not get the papers updated on time as they wait for such periods of remission, he said.

As a result, unfit vehicles continue to be on the roads without going through the inspections done while the papers are updated, the chairman of Nirapad Sarak Chai told The Daily Star yesterday, adding that this was a reason why the number of crashes does not come down.

Owners and drivers of private vehicles tend to have updated papers, but that is not the case when it comes to commercial vehicles, said a BRTA official.

A good number of the 4.5 lakh buses, trucks and lorries on the roads do not have proper documents, said

transport association leaders and BRTA officials.

Contacted, BRTA Chairman Nur Mohammad Mazumder said many vehicle owners could not update the papers due to the lockdown. The latest waiver will give them the chance.

He added that the government did not give in to pressure from transport associations.

EXEMPTION NOW NORM

Exemption from paying the fines was one of the major demands of transport workers who went on strike in November 2019, protesting the supposed implementation of the Road Transport Act-2018.

The new law stipulated hefty fines on vehicles with outdated papers.

The government on January 20, 2020 waived the fine until June that year. The waiver was later extended to June this year.

Based in Britain, Gurnah is the first African writer to win the award since the Zimbabwean Doris Lessing in 2007, and only the second writer of colour from sub-Saharan Africa, after Nigeria's

Wole Soyinka, who won in 1986. His novels include "Paradise", which is set in colonial East Africa during the First World War and was shortlisted for the Booker Prize for Fiction, and "Desertion".

"I think its just brilliant and wonderful," Gurnah told Reuters when asked how he felt to win the prize. "I am very grateful to the Swedish Academy for nominating me and my work.

"It's just great - its just a big prize, and such a huge list of wonderful writers -I am still taking it in," he said. "It was such a complete surprise that I really had to wait until I heard it announced before I could believe it.

Asked if he was drinking champagne or dancing for joy, he said: "No" with a laugh.

Gurnah left Africa as a refugee in the 1960s amid the persecution of citizens of Arab origin in Zanzibar where he grew up when the peaceful liberation from British colonial rule led to a revolution.

Zanzibar in 1984, allowing him to see his father shortly before his death.

The prize is awarded by the Swedish Academy and is worth 10 million Swedish crowns (\$1.14 million).

The prizes, for achievements in science, literature and peace, were created through a bequest in the will of Swedish dynamite inventor and wealthy businessman Alfred Nobel. They have been awarded since 1901, with the final prize in the line-up economics - a later addition.

Past literature winners have primarily been novelists such as Ernest Hemingway, Gabriel Garcia Marquez and Toni Morrison, poets such as Pablo Neruda, Joseph Brodsky and Rabindranath Tagore, or playwrights such as Harold Pinter and Eugene O'Neill.

But writers have also won for bodies of work that include short fiction, history, essays, biography or journalism. Winston Churchill won for his memoirs, Bertrand Russell for his philosophy and Bob Dylan for his lyrics. Last year's award was won by American poet Louise Gluck.

Beyond the prize money and prestige, the Nobel literature award generates a vast amount of attention for the winning author, often spurring book sales and introducing less well-known winners to He was only able to return to a broader international public.

Only 'real' tourists to fly

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"Bangladeshis coming to the departure terminal trying to go to Dubai for work on a visit visa will not be cleared through immigration," said the letter signed by Saleh Muhammad Zakaria, assistant superintendent of police (immigration) at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport.

The letter was issued in line with an order by the additional inspector general of police (Special Branch).

"Only the real tourists, business people, civil servants, parliamentarians, ministers, politicians, and job holders will have their immigration formalities processed," it said.

In other words, holders of UAE visit visas showing up at the departure terminal will have to undergo profiling.

Sources in the police said this directive was issued to curb the abuse of the UAE visit visa by traffickers and manpower recruiting agencies.

However, law enforcement agencies have expressed concern that the directive may have just created a scope for the airport authorities to extort migrant workers.

those who had been to Dubai for work or have residency permits may be processed," read the letter.

Those willing to travel on legal residency visas and work permits can pass through immigration without any obstacles, it added.

The new directive came as a surprise for Bijoy who had no idea that he won't be allowed to fly to Dubai for work on a tourist visa.

"I've already spent Tk 2 lakh taking loans from various sources. will now pay for the air ticket and hope I can pass through the airport immigration," he said.

Dubai stopped issuing work permits for Bangladeshi workers in 2015. But that did not stem the tide of workers heading to the glitzy emirate for work.

Employers in the Gulf state bring migrant workers under tourist visa which is later converted to work visas, said industry insiders.

Should a worker find an employment, he can pay 2,000 dirham (about Tk 50,000) to get his tourist visa converted to a work permit.

According to the Special Branch

"The immigration formalities of statistics, around 3.17 lakh people left the country for Dubai on tourist visas from October 2019 to March this year.

Of them, only about 22,000 returned home. The rest either converted their tourist visas into work visas or were trafficked to other countries.

Dubai is used as a transit point of major labour trafficking routes, mainly to countries with which Bangladesh does not have any agreement regarding migrant workers. It is evident in many Facebook groups of Dubai-based migrant workers that the UAE work visa is synonymous with tourist visa and people face little or no trouble in getting past immigration at Dhaka airport

Facebook groups are rife with posts by travel agencies offering packages under the headlines: "Visit visa, ticket, insurance, airport support" or "Dubai visit visa 3-month and 1-month full package".

Gulshan-based travel agency Dhaka Trip's Hossain Faruk explained what "airport support" means.

"The airport authorities create some obstacles to letting people fly on tourist visas, so we arrange help for them at the airport," said Faruk. The "full package" costs Tk 125,000.

Asked whether the "airport support" can be purchased separately, he replied in the negative. "It is managed with support from friends and relatives at the airport. This is not a service we sell commercially," he said.

Munirus Saleheen, secretary of the expatriates welfare ministry, yesterday said they were aware of how the migrant workers abuse tourist visa to go to Dubai for work.

"We also want to encourage workers seeking employment in Dubai. To address this problem, there will be a meeting of the ministers concerned by the end of this month. The meeting may make some decisions in this regard.'

A high official of Special Brach of police told this newspaper that they found a huge number of people were trafficked to other countries after they reached Dubai on visit visa.

"We have imposed the ban to stop this practice and bar human traffickers from having this scope," said the official, requesting anonymity.
