The ghost of 'Gono Rooms' still haunts

Although Dhaka University authorities recently spoke of their desire to get rid of "Gono" rooms at dormitories, first-year students had no other choice than to cram into such rooms again as the residential halls fully reopened on Sunday after a Covid-induced closure of a year and a half.

It happened mainly because some other rooms newly allotted to first and second-year students are still occupied by former students, who are involved with Chhatra League, alleged common students.

Thirty to 35 students had to sleep on the floor of each "Gono" room, which can accommodate eight, on Sunday night.

Besides, the pro-Awami League student wing continued to use the

MOTHER-DAUGHTER RAPE

2 arrestees sent to jail

6 others still at large

A Sherpur court yesterday sent two arrestees to jail in a case filed over raping a mother and her 13-year-old daughter.

After interrogation, they were produced before the court, said Habibur Rahman, officer-in-charge (investigation) of Nalitabari Police Station.

The 40-year-old mother and her daughter, a student of class four, were raped by a gang in Nalitabari upazila early Sunday.

The two arrestees named in the first information report (FIR) are Abdus Sattar, 45, cattle trader, and Sadek Mia, 30, who operates a dredger. Both are residents of Polashikura village in Nalitabari.

Sattar is a member hopeful in Polashikura ward in the upcoming union parishad polls and is campaigning for this, said locals. Sattar was also a member candidate in 2011, but lost in the polls, said Nurul Haque, incumbent member of the ward.

On Sunday, the mother filed a case with Nalitabari Police Station accusing eight people.

The six other accused are: Omar Ali,

KEATING CALLS ON SWARAN SINGH

US Ambassador to India Kenneth Keating in a telegram sent today informed the US state department that Indian Foreign Minister Swaran Singh claimed that the East Pakistan insurgency was not dependent upon India. It was profoundly rooted in Bangalee alienation and had its own dynamic, added the foreign minister. The ambassador called on the Indian foreign minister today.

Swaran Singh stressed that insurgency was caused basically by Pakistani military repression, to which Mukti Bahini was a reaction. He expressed strong resentment at the suggestion of East Pakistan insurgency being maintained by India.

As to the proposed withdrawal of military forces from the border, Swaran Singh said there already were ground rules concerning border deployments which India was honouring. However, he alleged there had been large-scale Pakistani military concentrations in Jammu, Chamba, Sialkot, Lahore, Bahawalpur and areas further south, and the Pakistani army had moved troops forward from cantonment areas such as Peshawar and Quetta.

The Indian foreign minister charged the US for providing support to the Government of Pakistan, that strengthens the Yahya regime's determination to maintain the military repression policy.

BORDER TALKS

China, India lash out after no progress

China and India yesterday blamed each other for the failure of high-level talks to ease tensions along a disputed Himalayan border between the nuclear-armed neighbours.

The strategically important Galwan river valley between Tibet and India's Ladakh region became a high-altitude flashpoint last year after one of the deadliest troop clashes in decades.

Senior military officials from the two countries held their first round of talks in two months, but it ended without any progress.

India made "unreasonable and unrealistic demands", Chinese military spokesman Long Shaohua said in a statement issued by the People's Liberation Army's western theatre

Mars' Jezero crater was a quiet lake 3.7b years ago

Jezero crater on Mars was a quiet lake 3.7 billion years ago, but a flash flood crashed large boulders onto the delta, images from Nasa's Perseverance Rover revealed.

The Perseverance Rover has been trundling along inside the crater since it arrived on the Red Planet in February, sending back images of rocks and other phenomena.

The latest batch of images taken inside the ancient crater and studied in detail by experts from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), in Cambridge.

PROTECTED FOREST HC stays land allotment for civil service academy

The High Court yesterday stayed for three months a government order on allotment of 700 acres of protected forest in Cox's Bazar for building a civil service academy.

The bench of Justice Md Mozibur Rahman Mia and Md Kamrul Hossain Molla passed the order and issued a rule on why the order will not be declared illegal after a writ petition was filed in this regard.

The court asked cabinet, environment, land and public administration secretaries to reply to the rule within four weeks. Lawyer Moniruzzaman Kabir represented the petitioner during the hearing while Deputy Attorney General Bipul Bagmar appeared for the state.

Low BP: How to MANAGE THE SYMPTOMS

In contrast to high blood pressure, low BP -- or hypotension -- becomes serious if certain symptoms persist for long. Although there are no specific boundaries that determine a low blood pressure, a BP count of 90/60 is usually considered low. Symptoms like nausea, dehydration, inability to concentrate, blurred vision, fatigue, etc. can all indicate that your blood pressure is low. While causes stretch from anaphylactic shocks
