## More than 150 rebels killed

The Saudi-led coalition supporting Yemen's government said more than 150 Huthi rebels were killed yesterday in air strikes south of Marib city, where the insurgents are pushing on the government's last northern stronghold.

The latest air strikes against the Iran-backed rebels take the number of them killed in oil-rich Marib province's Abdiya district to more than 500 in just the past four days, according to a toll compiled by the coalition.

The rebels rarely comment on losses and the toll could not be independently verified by AFP.

Destruction caused by Thursday's air strikes "included 11 military vehicles, and killed more than 150 terrorist elements," the coalition said in a statement carried by official Saudi media.

The latest coalition onslaught involved 36 strikes over the past 24 hours, it added.

The Huthi rebels renewed their campaign to seize Marib, a strategically vital city that would complete their takeover of the north and its oil reserves, last month.

The Huthis said they were "on the edges of the city" in a video statement Tuesday. The rebels have since had to retreat from some of their

positions, multiple government military officials in Marib

Despite the losses, Huthis are "pushing new reinforcements... and sending thousands to their deaths," according to one of the officials.

The pro-government military sources said 23 of their own fighters were killed and dozens were wounded during

## India praises prompt action by BD govt

India yesterday noted "some disturbing" reports about "attacks on religious gatherings" in Bangladesh but appreciated the "prompt" reaction of the government of the country to control the situation.

Asked about several attacks on Durga Puja mandaps, Spokesperson for India's External Affairs Ministry Arindam Bagchi told the weekly media briefing in New Delhi that "we have also seen some disturbing reports of untoward incidents involving attacks on religious gatherings in Bangladesh.

"We note that the government of Bangladesh has reacted promptly to ensure control of the situation with the deployment of law enforcement

Bagchi said, "We also understand that the ongoing festive celebrations of Durga Puja, which you alluded to, continue

The letter informed the Indian prime minister about the current status of the liberation struggle and said, "The liberation army of the People's Republic of Bangladesh, the Mukti Bahini, are in

#### 183 more hospitalised with dengue

At least 183 patients were hospitalised with dengue in the last 24 hours till 8am yesterday, of which 162 are from outside Dhaka, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

With the new cases, a total of 2,715 patients were diagnosed during the current month out of a total 20,912 infected. Of the total infected, 2,864 are from outside Dhaka.

At least 7,841 were diagnosed in September, 7,698 in August, 2,286 patients were hospitalised in July, 272 in June, while 43 were infected in May and rest are from January to April, according to the DGHS.

### Finnish scientists produce coffee in laboratory

With climate change threatening traditional coffee farming, Finnish scientists say they have produced coffee from cell cultures with an aroma and taste resembling the real thing.

The VTT Technical Research Centre of Finland may have come up with a more sustainable alternative to growing coffee beans by floating cell cultures in bio-reactors filled with a nutrient medium used to make various animal- and plantbased products.

## Now extended further inside int'l border

The Indian Border Security Force's jurisdiction of operation has been extended from 15km to 50km inside the international border and its officers have been given the power to arrest and seize in the three border states of West Bengal, Assam and Punjab in a bid to crack down on smuggling including that of narcotics.

The move by the Indian home ministry,

#### Covid-linked deaths fall to seven

466 more test positive

Seven people died with coronavirus and 466 got infected in 24 hours till yesterday morning, read a press release of the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

With the fresh numbers, the Covid-19 fatalities reached 27,737 in the country while the caseload rose to 1,564,485, according to the DGHS.

Of the latest deceased, three were men and four

Three of them died in Dhaka division, two in Chattogram and one each in Khulna and Barishal divisions. Bangladesh last logged

seven Covid-19 deaths on October 8, the lowest since March 17 this year when the country recorded 11 such deaths.

The fresh cases were detected after testing 21,568 samples.

With this, the daily-case positivity rate declined to

ACC sues man for earning Tk 252cr by extracting stones

The Anti-Corruption Commission has filed a case against the owner of a company for illegally extracting stones worth Tk 252.75 crore from the Shah Arefin Tila in Sylhet's Companiganj upazila.

The accused, Mohammad Ali, 40,

of the upazila's Kathalbari area, is the owner of MS Bashir Company and was originally the lessee of a declared stone quarry in the hilly area in the mid 2000s. Md Ismail Hossain, assistant

In the case statement, the ACC official stated the Shah Arefin Tila (hillock) lies on 137.5 acres of khas (government-owned fallow
