# **FOOT-DRAGGING** at its best

Performance of BMRC, the apex research institution, during pandemic pitiful

Bureaucratic foot-dragging appears to be what Bangladesh Medical Research Council (BMRC) has done most of the time during the pandemic.

The government body, tasked with determining and facilitating priority areas in health research, took five months, from February to June this year, to inform local drugmaker Globe Biotech Ltd that animal trials would be required for the formal approval of its Covid-19 vaccine.

Also, in April this year, when many hospitals were struggling with patients needing high-flow oxygen due to a scarcity of high-flow nasal cannulas, inventors in Buet developed a device that could make high-flow oxygen support available at facilities lacking proper equipment.

But BMRC took three months to announce that the device, named OxyJet, could be trialed at hospitals. By the time the approval came, new cases of Covid-19 had declined and than there was another spike in the coronavirus infections.

A BMRC official familiar with the proceedings said the council did not have members with expertise to make decisions on such matters. Neither did the council bother to look for individuals who could make such decisions promptly.

#### **UNNECESSARY DELAY**

OxyJet, an oxygen supply device developed by the researchers at BUET, showed huge potential in initial trials. It was developed at a time when Covid patients were dying due to the shortage of high-flow oxygen devices in April this year. BMRC took more than three months to approve it for final-stage trial.



### **OPPORTUNITY LOST**

Bangladesh lost an opportunity to hold human trials of China's Sinovac vaccine at seven hospitals. BMRC neither took a proactive role nor urged the health ministry to make prompt decisions in this regard.

BMRC could have done a lot of things to facilitate research during the pandemic. But I don't know what role it has played."

## Bangladesh's status now 'moderate'

Fares better than India, Pakistan

Bangladesh has been ranked 76th in the Global Hunger Index 2021 among 116 qualifying countries, with a score of 19.1.

The country has slipped one notch from

last year's 75th position.

Bangladesh, however, fared better than its South Asian neighbours Pakistan (92nd), India (101st), and Afghanistan (103rd) according to the report jointly published by Irish aid agency Concern Worldwide and German organisation Welt Hunger Hilfe.

This year, Bangladesh's level of hunger has dropped to "moderate" from "serious" for the first time as it achieved a Global Hunger Index (GHI) score of 19.1 points out of 100, said the report.

# Another mosque attack kills 41

At least 70 wounded; IS likely behind carnage AFP, Kandahar

Suicide bombers attacked a Shia mosque in the southern Afghan city of Kandahar during Friday prayers, witnesses said, killing at least 41 people

at a mosque in the northern city of Kunduz, which was claimed by the Islamic State group.

"Today, on the blessed day of Friday, a brutal attack has been witnessed on a Shia mosque as a result of which a huge number of our countrymen have lost their lives," Kandahar police chief Maulvi Mehmood said.
