

## Huge support awaits TIGERS IN OMAN

The general cricketing fraternity may not relate the game with Oman but the oil-rich gulf nation is all set to host the qualifying round of the flagship event in the form of ICC T20 World Cup from tomorrow.

The interest of the Bangladesh cricket fans have focused towards the middle-eastern nation as the Tigers have arrived at its capital to play three qualifying matches at the Al Amerat Cricket Ground — located 15 km to the south-east of Muscat, where the first game against Scotland is scheduled on October 17.

From the experience of covering international cricket events around the globe as a journalist, it was a different experience since landing in Oman, especially in the middle of the pandemic, where traveling gets even harder due to health safety measures.

As there is hardly any cricketing interest among the majority of the local population, there was no such evidence of enthusiasm or branding of the mega event, which is going to take place in the country in just two days.

The final moments of preparation to build new roads, that connect the stadium to the highway, was going in full swing since the ground is situated right in the middle of a desert surrounded by rocky hills.

And the temporary stands to accommodate 3000 spectators were almost ready as the sultanate, where the extreme heat just adds to what is already a difficult condition for the Bangladesh team, is all set to create history.

But when it comes to around nearly eight lakh Bangladeshi expats residing in Oman, for them to witness their heroes playing right in front is a great opportunity — one that they barely get in this part of the world where cricket is hardly a topic of interest.

However, disappointment was in the air around the Bangladeshi expats here in Muscat as the limited seating arrangements could well end up depriving many of watching the Tigers live in action.

Mohammad Riyad, a Bangladeshi businessman living in Oman for the past 15 years, expressed his combined enthusiasm and frustration.

"Well, the local Omanis have little interest when it comes to watching cricket matches. But for us, we don't want to miss supporting our Bangladesh team from the ground for the very first time here in Muscat, and that too in a world cup event."

"But the problem is, there are only 3000 seating arrangements for each game at the stadium [Al Amerat] and considering the huge number of Bangladeshis living here in Oman, it's not enough at all," added the Bangladeshi expat.

The lack of seating arrangements was one of the major issues but an even

bigger problem for the Bangladeshi expats was the price of the match tickets, which is on the expensive side, according to many.

"For the past few days, we have been trying to find tickets but unfortunately we're yet to acquire them as there are no ticket booths. You can buy tickets online but then again, it's very hard to get one, considering the limited seats in the ground," said Nurul Haque, another Bangladeshi expat who owns an electronics shop in Muscat.

"The cheapest tickets which cost around 10 Omani Rial [approx. Tk 2200] are unavailable while the price of the available ones cost you around 30 Rial [approx. Tk 6700], which is pretty expensive. But still, we are trying to arrange tickets to watch Bangladesh play in front of our very eyes," added the Bangladeshi expat.

However the situation unfolds, the Tigers can anticipate to get massive support during their stay in Oman for the next seven to eight days.



## T20 WORLD CUP BLAST

### Scotland packed with 'match-winners'

Former England Test star Jonathan Trott says Scotland's batting line-up is full of "match-winners" as they bid to reach the second stage of a T20 World Cup for the first time.

The Scots have fallen at the first hurdle in their three previous appearances, in 2007, 2009 and 2016.

The rejigged format at this year's edition in the United Arab Emirates and Oman gives the Scots, ranked 14th in Twenty20 cricket, a real chance.

Bangladesh are Group B favourites, but the other two teams are Oman and Papua New Guinea, both ranked below Scotland. And they begin their World Cup journey against Bangladesh, the toughest opponent in the group, on Sunday.

"We have some really good players in this Scotland squad, the batting line-up is full of match-winners," the 40-year-old Trott told the Scotsman.

"But T20 matches can ebb and flow so much that it can't be left to one player to perform well. The whole XI has to play well to get good results."



### O'Brien desperate to put Ireland on T20 map

Kevin O'Brien -- the architect of one of one-day cricket's greatest upsets -- is hoping to inspire Ireland as they seek finally to make their mark at a T20 World Cup.

Ireland have shown they can mix it with the big boys in the longer format of white-ball cricket, with scalps including England, Pakistan and West Indies in the 50-over World Cup.

But their record in the 20-over game is less impressive -- they boast just three wins in 15 matches over the past five tournaments.

Their most notable victory was against Bangladesh at the 2009 competition in England, a result that helped propel them into the second stage.

But they have crashed out at the first hurdle in every tournament since then, despite wins against Zimbabwe and the United Arab Emirates in 2014.

O'Brien is desperate to put matters right in Ireland's first appearance on the global stage in limited-overs cricket



since 2016.

Irish cricket's most recognisable face and their only Test centurion retired from one-day internationals in June to focus on T20 cricket and the five-day game.

"We've had a lot more success and our big victories have been in the 50-over tournament," the 37-year-old told the Irish Examiner. "But you look back at when we beat Bangladesh in 2009 at Trent Bridge you have still had victories at T20, but lately the ones that stand out are the results we have been on the wrong side of."

### 'An opportunity to upset the big guys'

The Netherlands open their assault on the T20 World Cup next Monday against Ireland. Both team coach Ryan Campbell and captain Pieter Seelaar have high hopes for the little associate country, known for punching above their own weight and upsetting some big name teams -- just as they did in 2009 when they stunned England at Lord's.

"We bring a really well-balanced side. I believe our greatest strength is our adaptability. We have players who can bat 1-9, which will also provide us with six or seven bowling options at any given time," Campbell added.

"We all know that full members have massive cash and assets at their disposal. But we never look at it that way, we just see it as an opportunity to upset the big guys."

"We've been a top member in associate cricket for as long as I can remember. We want to take it to the next level and get the respect from the full members," said skipper Seelaar.

### A lot at stake for Namibia

Namibian cricket coach Pierre de Bruyn doesn't buy the narrative that his underdog team have nothing to lose at the T20 World Cup.

De Bruyn said his players were determined to upset the odds by finishing in the top two in their first-round group in order to qualify for the Super 12 phase.

"The impact for Namibian cricket would be massive. It means automatic qualification for next year's T20 World Cup and the financial benefit that comes with it," he said.

"The stakes are high for us. We've got a huge amount to lose, probably more than any other team. We're talking about finances, so many other things."

## Shakib to join Tigers today

Following defeats in both official warm-up matches against Sri Lanka and Ireland, Bangladesh spent time at the gym and at their hotel premises in Muscat yesterday after arriving from Dubai on Thursday night.

The Tigers will take part in a training session at the Al Amerat Cricket Stadium in Muscat at 5:00pm ahead of their first qualifier against Scotland tomorrow.

Star all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan will join the team in Muscat today as well after completing his duties in the Indian Premier League for Kolkata Knight Riders.

Shakib was yet to join the team as KKR reached the final of the IPL, which was taking place against Chennai Super Kings when this report was filed yesterday night.

Selector Habibur Bashar, who is accompanying the Tigers in Muscat, said that Shakib would travel from Dubai to Muscat by road to avoid quarantine and join up with the team. It takes four hours to travel to Muscat from Dubai by road.

"Shakib will travel by road since there might be a risk if he comes by air. He was in a bio-secure bubble during the IPL. He will directly come from one bubble to another so there is no need to quarantine," Bashar told the media yesterday.

"He might take the bus after completing the game at night or maybe in the morning. He is expected to join the team tomorrow (Saturday). Both the ICC and his franchise are looking into the matter."

However, it is still uncertain whether the 34 year old will join the final training session.

"We are still not sure whether Shakib will join the training session in the afternoon. But he has been playing in games. I don't think there will be an issue for him," he added.

## Chennai lift fourth title

Faf du Plessis smashed an attacking half-century to help Chennai Super Kings thrash Kolkata Knight Riders by 27 runs and clinch their fourth Indian Premier League title on Friday. Du Plessis' 86 off 59 balls guided Chennai to 192-3, a total their bowlers defended by restricting Kolkata to 165-9 in the final in Dubai.

Opener Venkatesh Iyer smashed a 32-ball 50 but the knock was not enough to stop Chennai's M.S. Dhoni from a landmark win in his 300th match as T20 skipper.

Shardul Thakur took three wickets including twin strikes in one over to hurt two-time champions

Kolkata who came into the final on the back of four successive wins.

Spinner Ravindra Jadeja and pace bowler Josh Hazlewood took two wickets each. Eoin Morgan's Kolkata won the toss and elected to field but their bowlers failed to get a wicket until the ninth over and took a hammering in Dubai. Rituraj Gaikwad fell for 32 off spinner Sunil Narine but Du Plessis kept up the charge to raise his fifty with a six amid raucous support for Chennai at a nearly packed stadium.

The South African veteran smashed seven fours and three sixes and put on key partnerships with Robin Uthappa, who made 31, and Moeen Ali, who hit an unbeaten

37 off 20 balls. Du Plessis was out on the final ball off pace bowler Shivam Mavi.

Narine was two-time champions Kolkata's best bowler with figures of 2-26. Kolkata started strongly with Iyer and Shubman Gill, who made 51, putting on a quickfire opening stand of 91.

But Chennai hit back with Thakur's twin strikes in one over including Iyer's key wicket as wheels came off the Kolkata chase.

Chennai, winners in 2010, 2011 and 2018, remain one of the most successful IPL franchises after five-time champions Mumbai Indians who failed to defend their title this season.
