## Rich nations must fulfil commitment

Speakers tell webinar ahead of COP26

Developed countries must fulfil their commitment to meeting the hundredbillion-dollar climate finance goal, said speakers at a webinar organised ahead of the COP26 summit to be held in Scotland

In Bangladesh, the annual average temperatures increased by 0.64 percent in 2018, which was 10 times higher than the annual average temperature increase in 1961, they said.

If the trend of increase in annual average temperature continues, by 2030 the annual average temperature in Bangladesh will nearly be double.

"Since 1971, the average change in the annual average temperature has been 0.30 degrees Celsius [in Bangladesh]. From the year 2000, that increased to 0.57 degrees Celsius," said Dr Fahmida Khatun, executive director, Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD). CPD and International Centre for

Climate Change and Development (ICCCAD) jointly organised the webinar.

Not only has the global goal for a hundred billion dollars in climate finance not been reached, most of the money to combat climate change has come in the

form of loans, pointed out Professor Mizan R Khan, deputy director of ICCCAD. Only 20 percent has been in the form of grants.

Accessibility of climate fund has been challenging task for Bangladesh since a considerable amount is in the form of loans and non-concessional instruments," said Prof Mizan. "I call this the new climate debt trap.

Judith Herbertson, development director, Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) Bangladesh, British High Commission, said, "We are going to need financial institutions like development banks to step up on financing. Currently, private investment is absolutely absent from adaptation [measures]. Public money is not going to be adequate.

Dr Saleemul Huq, director of ICCCAD, said every country goes to this conference asking "what are we going to get out of it?" but that should not be the focus.

"The question we should be: 'what is going to be our contribution?' What are the global leaders going to do to make sure they do not leave behind a dead planet?"

Speakers also criticised the fact that most of the money has been coming for mitigation measures -- steps to mitigate the SEE PAGE 5 COL 1

### Govt cancels PECE exam of this year

Says state minister

The government cancelled this year's Primary Education Completion Examinations and its equivalent exams due to the pandemic.

Primary and Mass Education State linister Zakir Hossen confirmed the news to The Daily Star yesterday evening.

Annual exams for class-V students will now be held at schools, said a top official of the ministry.

Earlier this month, the ministry wrote to the Prime Minister's Office seeking cancellation of the exams and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina approved the proposal, the official told The Daily Star.

PECE and the equivalent exams, usually held in November, are the largest public examinations. Three million students were supposed to take part in the exams.

The exams were cancelled last year as well because of coronavirus restrictions.

The government may cancel this year's Junior School Certificate (JSC) and Junior Dakhil Certificate (JDC) exams. These exams, meant for class-VIII students, were also cancelled last year. Education Minister Dipu Moni on

September 28 said these exams were cancelled because of time constraints.

#### AL leader shot dead in Rangamati

An Awami Leaguenominated chairman candidate was shot dead at his house in Rangamati's Kaptai upazila early yesterday.

The victim, Nethoai Marma, 58, had been out of his house for 14 months due to fear that he might be killed. He returned home on Saturday, said Aungswe Chaine Chowdhury, president of Kaptai upazila unit AL.

Nethoai was the candidate for Chitmorom Union Parishad elections.

Some 10-12 criminals surrounded Nethoai's house in Agapara area and shot him dead, said Mir Muddasser Hossain, superintendent of Rangamati police.

"We recovered his body. It was definitely a political murder. No one wants to talk about the murder. But we are investigating it to know the details," he said.

"Nethoai was the president of Chitmorom union unit AL," said Aungswe Chaine.

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# Darwin family microscope to be sold at auction

A microscope Charles Darwin gave his son Leonard and which has remained in the family for nearly 200 years is headed for auction in December, and is expected to fetch up to \$480,000.

The instrument was designed by Charles Gould for the firm Cary around 1825 and is one of six surviving microscopes associated with the British naturalist, according to auction house Christie's.

The date of its manufacture coincides with the time when Darwin was studying zoophytes, organisms such as coral and sea anemone.

"It is just incredibly spine tingling to look through this and see the microscopic world that Darwin would have seen in the 1820s and 30s,' James Hyslop, Head of Department, Scientific Instruments, Globes & Natural History, at Christie's, told Reuters. "Later in his life in 1858, there's a wonderful
