# Russia suspends its mission to Nato

Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said yesterday that Moscow was suspending its mission to Nato and closing the Western military bloc's liaison mission in Russia, in a row over spying.

"We are suspending the work of our official mission to Nato, including the work of our military representative from November 1 or it could take a few more days," Lavrov told reporters.

Lavrov said that Russia would also be ending the alliance's liaison mission -- established in 2002 and hosted at the Belgian embassy -- and information office in Moscow.

The bloc's information office was established in Moscow in 2001 to improve understanding between Nato and Russia. The latest row comes after Nato earlier this month stripped accreditations of eight members of the Russian mission to the alliance, describing them as "undeclared Russian intelligence officers".

Nato Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg said at the time that the "decision to kick out the Russian representatives was not 'linked to any particular event' -- but gave no more details over the move.

Yesterday, Lavrov cited "recent moves" by Nato, saying there were no longer "basic conditions for common work."

He said that in case of urgent matters, Nato could liaise via the Russian ambassador in Belgium.

Russia has long had an observer mission to Nato as part of a two-decade-old Nato-Russia Council meant to promote cooperation in common security areas.

Costa Rica, Milan among winners of Earthshot prize

Milan and Costa Rica were among the winners of the Earthshot Prize on Sunday, an environmental award created by Britain's Prince William, who has criticized world leaders for an uninspiring response to the climate change crisis. The honours were established to find solutions through new policies to the planet's biggest environmental problems, with a winner in each of the five categories receiving 1 million pounds. Milan won the "Build a Waste-Free World" award for its food waste hubs, while Costa Rica received the "Protect and Restore Nature" prize for programmes paying citizens to plant trees and restore ecosystems.

Kerala flood death toll rises to 35

At least 35 people have been killed by floods and landslides triggered by heavy rains in the southern Indian state of Kerala with authorities fearing the number of deaths could rise significantly. As search-and-rescue operations by the army and the navy continued yesterday, thousands remain stranded in parts of the coastal area, while many others are still missing. PK Jayasree, the district magistrate of Kottayam, one of the two worst affected areas, along with Idukki, said that three bodies were recovered on Sunday, nine yesterday while a six-member family has been completely lost.

150 Yemen rebels killed in strikes Says Saudi-led coalition

The Saudi-led coalition in Yemen said yesterday it had killed 150 Huthi rebels near the strategic city of Marib, which would raise the rebel death toll to over 1,100 in a week.

Air strikes "destroyed 13 military vehicles and killed 150 terrorist elements" in Abdiya within the past 24 hours, the coalition said in a statement carried by the official SPA agency.

The Iran-backed Huthis rarely comment on losses, and the tolls could not be independently verified by AFP.

In a televised speech yesterday, rebel leader Abdelmalek al-Huthi called for continued fighting, as tens of thousands of supporters marched in towns held by the insurgents.

ASEAN'S JUNTA SNUB Myanmar shadow govt praises the move Wants summit invite

Myanmar's shadow government, formed by opponents of ruling military, yesterday welcomed the exclusion of junta leader Min Aung Hlaing from an upcoming regional summit, but said it should be the legitimate representative.

However, the opposition said it would accept inviting a truly neutral alternative Myanmar representative, as decided over the weekend by the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean).

Asean will invite a non-political representative from Myanmar to its October 26-28 summit, in an unprecedented snub to the military leaders behind a February 1 coup against Aung San Suu Kyi's elected government.

The opposition National Unity Government (NUG), which has been outlawed by the military, said the non-political figure who attends the summit must not be a representative of the junta in disguise.

"Asean excluding Min Aung Hlaing is an important step, but we request that they recognize us as the proper representative," said its spokesman Dr. Sasa.

The decision was an unusually bold step for the consensus-driven bloc, which traditionally favors a policy of engagement and non-interference.

Meanwhile, Myanmar's junta chief yesterday announced the release of more than 5,000 people jailed for protesting against the coup.

There has been chaos in Myanmar since the coup, with more than 1,100 civilians killed in a bloody crackdown on dissent and more than 8,000 arrested, according to a local monitoring group.

# Pakistani commandos' hand suspected in J&K encounter

Say sources in Indian army, police; thousands of migrant workers in Kashmir moved to secure locations

The ferocity of the fighting between security forces and the group of terrorists holed up in the jungles of Jammu and Kashmir's Poonch district for at least eight days suggests the infiltrators were trained by Pakistani commandos, sources in the army and police have said.

Nine soldiers including two Junior Commissioned Officers or JCOs have been killed in the line of duty, fighting these terrorists since yesterday, in what has become the deadliest encounter for India's military in Jammu and Kashmir in recent years.

It is also unclear if any of the terrorists have been killed since no bodies have been found yet. The fighting in the 8-9 km stretch of thick forest has continued despite a massive combing operation, a tight cordon and intense shelling.

In the first brush with these terrorists, five soldiers, including a JCO, were killed on the night of October 10 in the Dera Wali Gali area of Poonch, which is close to the Line of Control.

Following this, an army group searching for the terrorists were ambushed in the forests of Nar Khas

on Thursday. Two soldiers were killed and two more, including a JCO, went missing. Their bodies were recovered after a tough operation two days later, reports NDTV.

Sources in the army and the local police suggest that the fact that this group of terrorists have been able to inflict such heavy casualties while managing to evade thousands of security forces for eight days suggests they were trained by elite commandos of the Pakistani military.

"The group of terrorists may also include Pakistani commandos. But we will only know for sure once they are shot down," an officer, requesting not to be named, said.

Meanwhile, Indian authorities have moved thousands of migrant workers in Kashmir to safer locations overnight, while hundreds have fled the Himalayan valley after a wave of targeted killings, two security officials said yesterday.

"We moved thousands of workers to secure places and are facilitating their return home," a senior police official told Reuters, declining to be named as he was not authorised to speak to the media.

In other areas, security forces had intensified patrolling to prevent any militant activity, the official added.

Australian pair survive for days lost in outback

Two people have survived days without water in Australia's hot and dusty outback, police said yesterday, ending a frenzied five-day rescue effort.

Shaun Emija, 21, and Mahesh Patrick, 14, were reported missing on Tuesday in the Harts Range area.

The pair were feared to be in grave danger given a lack of water and the area's extreme temperatures.

But Northern Territory police said yesterday that the two men were found alive and well by an "absolute miracle".
