ROHINGYA CAMP IN COX'S BAZAR

Six killed in grisly attack

Eight others injured as armed assailants storm a madrasa in wee hours; locals question security of the settlement

At least six Rohingyas were killed and eight others injured as a group of armed criminals attacked a madrasa inside a refugee camp in Ukhiya early yesterday, hours after a block raid of the Armed Police Battalion (APBn).

The incident occurred at Darul Ulum Nadwatul Ulama Al-Islamia Madrasa in Moinarghona camp-18 around 3:00am, said police.

The murders took place 23 days after the assassination of Rohingya leader Mohibullah in Kutupalong refugee camp, raising questions over the security of camps housing more than 10 lakh Rohingyas.

"A group of armed criminals attacked

the madrasa at block-H52 in Moinarghona area, and hacked madrasa students and teachers in their sleep, leaving six dead," said APBn-8 Commanding Officer Shihab Kaiser Khan of Cox's Bazar.

In this connection, police already arrested a suspect, a Rohingya man named Mujibur Rahman, 17, with a homemade gun, six bullets and a machete from the camp area, said the CO.

Of the six deceased, Md Ibrahim Hossain, 22, Azizul Haque, 26, were madrasa students while Md Nur Alam Halim, 45, and Hamidullah, 55, were teachers, said their family members and other local sources.

The other two have been identified as madrasa's volunteer Md Amin, 32, and one Idris, 32, a resident of block-J5 of camp-12.

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Two schoolgirls along with a man cross a bamboo bridge over the Bijoynagar canal in the capital's Manda. 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On runway of recovery

Pandemic-hit aviation sector turning around as flight operations at HSIA increase threefold in three months

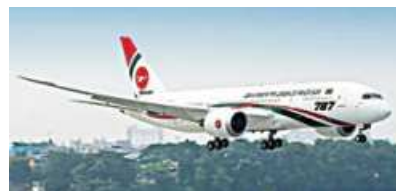

Following a prolonged rough ride, driven by the pandemic, the country's aviation sector is finally turning around as flight operations and the number of passengers flying from the Dhaka airport have almost tripled in three months.

Things appear to be on track to get to the pre-pandemic level, said industry insiders.

The development comes as a huge relief for the three prominent local airlines, which suffered a revenue loss of Tk 2,250 crore in the last one and a half years because of the pandemic.

Of the three, Biman Bangladesh Airlines, the national flag carrier, suffered a loss of Tk 1,300 crore, US-



Bangla Airlines Tk 800 crore and Novoair Tk 150 crore, said their top officials.

Besides, the resumption of regular flights has brought back smiles on passengers' faces, ending their long excruciating wait.

Migrant workers, stuck in the country for months, are now returning to their workplace while those scheduled to join their new jobs abroad are also boarding flights. It

also opened a window of opportunity for Bangladeshi students waiting to pursue higher studies abroad, said the industry insiders.

After the pandemic struck the country in March last year, only a handful of flights, mostly special, chartered and cargo ones, took off from Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport for around a year, leaving the airport almost deserted. Regular flight operations on almost all international routes remained halted.

The HSIA, the main airport of the country, is now once again busy dealing with inbound and outbound passengers, who require to follow the Covid protocols.

"Almost all the 28 foreign airlines

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HSIA currently handles around **10,000** outbound passengers a day, which was **3,500 to 4,000** three months ago.

80 flights are now operating from HSIA per day.

Number of daily flights was **120** during the pre-Covid-19 period.

"Almost all the 28 foreign airlines have resumed flight operations to and from Bangladesh."

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Silence of the river

The Akhira devoid of human activity as Majhipara fishermen stay away 5 days after communal mayhem

Fishermen of Majhipara village look to the Akhira for their livelihood, but since October 17 they have been unable to answer the river's call even though they need its bounties desperately.

Their nets and other fishing equipment lie burnt and in tatters, because religious zealots inflamed by a Facebook post ransacked and set fire to Hindu households and establishments in the village located in Rangpur's Pirganj upazila.

The victims of the attack say they are still scared to go back to the river and so, since the day of the violence, the Akhira river has been devoid of human activity, as if stunned into silence.

The Akhira and the Boro Beela -- a 1400-hectare natural water body through which the river flows when it passes through the Majhipara -- have for centuries been the villagers' lifeline and continue to be so for the 180 fishermen there, said locals.

Pushpa Rani, 30, whose house in the village was burned, said, "The attackers burned our three fishing nets and looted the other. The fishing nets were the means of our livelihood."

Fisherman Dholu Das, 38, said, "The attackers did not torch my house but looted all our belongings including three fishing nets. The nets were my only avenue to a livelihood."

"I got a fishing net from the local fisheries office but can't go to the river as I am still in a panic," said 25-year-old Nibash Chandra Das, another

Although many communal attacks of similar nature took place in the past, those involved in the incidents remained out of the trial process, the eminent citizens said in a joint statement.

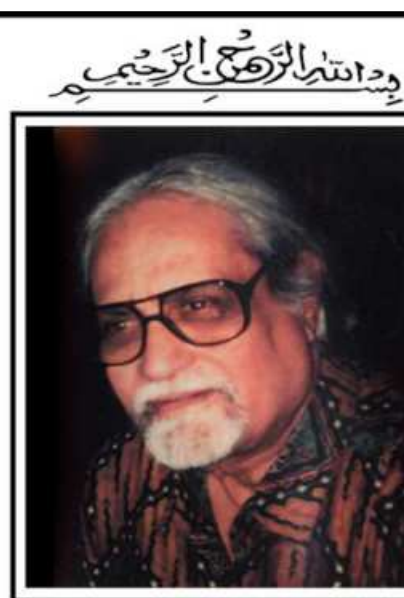
"We strongly demand that individuals and groups, those involved in such criminal acts and [who] created religious madness in the past few days, be immediately brought under the trial process," reads the statement.
