Artist Tahera Khanam breathed her last early yesterday at Square Hospital in the capital. She was 86.

She had been suffering from various health complications and an injury, said family members.

Born in 1935, Tahera completed her graduation in drawing and painting from the then Government Institute of Arts and Crafts (presently known as the Faculty of Fine Arts, Dhaka University), in 1959.

She was one of the first four female students of the institution in 1954.

In 1960, she married Qayyum Chowdhury. The Ekushey Padak winning artist passed away in 2014.

Authorities fell 166 trees in Barishal to construct building

A total of 166 mango trees in front of Barishal's Bakerganj Upazila Parishad office have been cut down by authorities. When asked why this was done, the upazila chairperson said since the trees bear sour mangoes, they chopped them down to construct a new building.

On Friday and Saturday, authorities cut the trees down and removed the branches in a clandestine manner.

According to locals, seven years ago, then Barishal deputy commissioner Md Shahidul Alam planted the local variety of trees and built the mango orchard, locally known as DC's Garden. Apart from Bakerganj, Shahidul had planted trees in every upazila, confirmed Barishal DC office.

Control over extortion, syndicate, establishing supremacy behind factional clashes

The clash at Chattogram Medical College (CMC) on Saturday was not an isolated incident. It is a continuation of rivalry between two factions of Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) over establishing supremacy at the institute, said sources.

The two factions -- one loyal to former city mayor AJM Nasir Uddin and another to deputy education minister Mohibul Hasan Chowdhury Nowfel -- locked into clashes on Friday and Saturday.

Sources at CMC said the rivalry got started to establish full control over illegal activities, like extorting adjacent clinics and diagnostic centres, managing the illegal syndicate that supplies food to Chattogram Medical College (CMCH), and misappropriating the hospital's medicines.

Preferring anonymity, a CMC student said extortion is one of the main sources of illegal income for the student leaders. For example, the leaders can extort money from business establishments, like the 30 private clinics and diagnostic centres adjacent to CMCH.

Another CMC student echoed the same. "BCL, which fully controls the college's central students' union... has formed an illegal syndicate to supply food to the hospital, misappropriate medicine from CMCH stores and wards, and extort clinics, diagnostic centres, ambulance drivers, and some big pharmacies in front of CMCH."

"They don't necessarily come daily

or monthly to extort cash," said a mid-level management official of a private clinic. "On many occasions, the student leaders come to us to sponsor their programmes, and we must accept to do so."

Although both factions of BCL denied all this, they accused one another of doing the aforementioned activities.

Contacted, Abhijit Das, a fourth-year CMC student and leader of the BCL faction loyal to the junior minister, said extortion and syndicates are a reality at CMCH.

"A section of students dominate the hostel, campus and hospital in the name BCL. They are behind all sorts of extortion and illegal syndicates," he said.

Asked who they are, he said, "The factions loyal to the former city mayor are behind all this."

"As we resisted the extortionists on campus, they conducted a series of attacks on us, and the last one was on Aqib, who is now fighting for his life in the ICU," he added.

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'It seems pre-planned'

Investigators suspect outsiders may have used health ministry staffers to steal 17 missing files

Some beneficiaries outside the health ministry with interest in the procurement files might have used ministry staffers to steal the 17 files that went missing on Thursday, officials close to the investigation suspect.

Majority of the files were related to procurement by various medical colleges and health institutions, according to the list of the missing files.

"Outsiders might have tried to access the files with the help of the ministry's staffers. We are still investigating all possible links," an official of the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) told The Daily Star on condition of anonymity.

Meanwhile, a CID source said the CCTV camera of room No 29 of building No 3 at the secretariat, from where the files were stolen, has been out of order for the last two months, which has made the investigation difficult.

CID is interrogating all 12 staffers who

worked at the room. Officials suspect the files were stolen as part of a pre-made plan.

Meanwhile, six staffers of the ministry's medical education division who were picked up by CID on Sunday are still in its custody.

"We didn't detain or arrest them. We're just interrogating them," CID's Additional Superintendent of Police Azad Rahman confirmed.

The files were stored in a room where operations of the Purchase and Collection-2 Section are conducted, according to a GD filed with Shahbagh Police Station on Thursday.

The room is adjacent to an office at room No 29 of building No 3 at the secretariat.

Stenographer/computer operators work in the room. Before leaving office on Wednesday, two of them had kept the files in their cabinet. But around Thursday noon, they discovered the files missing when they went to bring them out from the cabinet.

3 die as boat capsizes in Buriganga

Three bodies were recovered and one person is still missing after a boat capsized in the Buriganga river near Kamrangirchar area in Dhaka yesterday.

The deceased are Rekha (29), Sanjida (8) and her brother Shafiqul Islam (7). Shitol Begum, (27), mother of Sanjida and Shafiqul, is still missing.

"The boat carrying 11 passengers capsized at Huzurghat around 9:15am after being hit by a cargo vessel," said Hafizur Rahman, deputy assistant director of fire service.

"The search operation was suspended around 5:30pm and will begin again tomorrow [today]," said Abul Khair, a diver.

Private firm hired to rescue ferry

A team of divers of Genuine Enterprise, a private company, has started preliminary search work to rescue Amanat Shah, the ferry that half-sank in Manikganj's Paturia ghat, yesterday noon.

Eight members of the diving team are working to find out how to rescue the ferry safely, said Abdur Rahman, head of the team.

BIWTA director (shipping and management) Md Shahjahan said, "The Chattogram-based private company, has been tasked with rescuing the ferry on the basis of a public-private partnership."

The entire operation may cost Tk 1.5-2 crore, said BIWTA joint-director (rescue) and chief of rescue team Fazlul Rahman.

The decision to hire the company was finalised on Sunday, said Ajay Debnath, manager of Genuine Enterprise.

On Wednesday, the ferry tipped over in the Padma river with 18 vehicles.

All of the vehicles have been rescued and handed over to their respective owners.

Out-of-control truck runs rampage in Munshiganj

Four people have died and at least 27 others were injured in road accidents across Gazipur, Munshiganj, and Rajbari over the last two days, report our correspondents.

In Munshiganj, chaos ensued on the Muktarpur Bridge under Sadar upazila, as a truck carrying government fertiliser lost control and bumped on to at least 15 vehicles on the road.

A five-year-old boy died while three of his family members sustained injuries after a truck hit a rickshaw carrying them in Dhaka's Gulshan area early yesterday.

The deceased was identified as Mahfuzur Rahman Rihan.

Rihan was on the rickshaw along with his parents, Shahjadi Akter and Abdur Rahim, and sister Rahi (6), all of whom sustained injuries from the collision that took place in Shahjadpur area around 12:15am, police said.
