Nesarabad tree nurseries face difficult time

When most sectors have started to recover gradually from losses due to months of Covid-19 restrictions, the tree nurseries are witnessing a sharp fall in sales this year in Nesarabad, an upazila known for producing a high volume of tree saplings.

The bulk of fruit, flower and timber saplings -- produced at nearly two thousand nurseries located in Swarupkathi and Atghar Kuriyana unions of the upazila -- are purchased by wholesalers from different areas and shipped out all over the country.

Sapling sales were low but steady during the months when curbs were imposed to contain the outbreak last year. But despite the lifting of the restrictions months ago, the sales have hit rock bottom this year, said nursery owners in the upazila.

The plummeting sales might be a sign that

many of their end customers might have lost the financial capacity due to the negative impact of the coronavirus situation, speculated Younus Ali, a tree nursery owner in Paschim Kuniari village in the upazila.

He did not worry much last year as the sapling sales remained within the range of his expectation, but he could not even sell more than half of the saplings produced in his nursery this year, he added.

Mohammad Younus, owner of another nursery in the same village, said he did not see such situation in his 20 years in the profession. "Usually, almost all fruit tree saplings are sold out every year, but I haven't been able to sell one-third of my saplings this year."

A huge stock of mango, litchi, malta, pomegranate and other fruit tree saplings still remain unsold at his nursery on 2.5 bighas of land, he added.

In order to make room for producing new saplings, the unsold saplings, which grew larger in size, will need to be relocated to larger areas, said many nursery owners.

But the process will only add to their cost, said Mohammad Rubel, a nursery owner in Paschim Kuniari village.

Downplaying the gravity of the situation, Nesarabad Upazila Agriculture Officer Chapal Krishna Nath said the sales at tree nurseries -- on which over 20,000 people depend for their livelihoods in the upazila -- have no reason to fall since there was no bar on transport of agricultural goods during the months of Covid-19 restrictions.

However, he said that restriction on organising agricultural fairs during the period might have had some impact on the sale of saplings produced at the nurseries in Nesarabad.

'Setubandhan' building bridge between birds and humans

A youth organisation in Nilphamari plays crucial role to increase bird populations

Six years ago, a group of schoolboys of Khalisha Belpukur village of Saidpur upazila, took an auspicious initiative to conserve birds setting artificial nests where their feathered friends could lay eggs and incubate them comfortably.

Now anyone paying a visit to the village or the adjacent villages will be amazed to see the abundance of birds in the area. The nests made of earthen pitchers have provided safe havens for the birds and have proven to be a catalyst for increasing bird populations in the area.

The initiators said that they came up with the idea seeing that there was a dearth of large trees in the area and some birds do not prefer the trees of foreign origin.

In course of time, their initiative has turned into a movement with the participation of people from all walks of life.

Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change rewarded the boys for their contribution to conserving birds a couple of years ago.

Alamgir Hossain, leader of the boys, said, "Six years ago while visiting our orchard in the village, I noticed that birds looking for suitable trees for making nests but failing to find those."

People randomly fell large trees to make a quick profit or plant trees of foreign origin, which birds do not prefer making nests, he added.

Being concerned, Alamgir discussed the matter with his friends to do something for

the birds. Later, they formed an organisation titled 'Setubandhan', symbolizing the linkage between humans and birds.

Raising funds on their own, they purchased earthen pitchers and ropes setting them in tilted position on branches of trees in the area. They stuffed dry leaves and straw inside the pitchers on the host trees.

Birds, particularly of local species, namely wagtails, doves, owls, mynas, shrikes made the pitchers their homes laying eggs and raising hatchlings.

"We also hold awareness-raising programmes in schools and house yards, hang signboards and posters in crowded places spreading the message to conserve birds for saving the environment," he added.

Ahsan Habib, (23), a member of Setubandhan, said, they have expanded the area of their movement to the adjacent villages and also rescue sick and wounded birds which become victims of natural calamity or unwanted incidents.

Chairman of Saidpur Upazila Parishad Moksedul Momin said that they extend support to Setubandhan whenever it requires and have requested the livestock department to treat sick or wounded birds.

Bird watcher Shahin Zajangir Alam expressed satisfaction seeing the affinity of the birds with the people of the area.

The birds can be seen loitering closer to humans fearlessly.

Deputy Commissioner of Nilphamari Hafizur Rahman Chowdhury said, "We've taken steps to set up a wildlife rescue and treatment centre in Saidpur soon."

Record number

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production will increase further," said Barisal Fisheries Officer (hilsa) Bimal Chandra Das.

Alauddin Mia, a fisherman in Bhola Sadar, said they have been netting hilsa for some time now. Around 300 maund were caught three days ago, which is comparatively more than the desired amount.

Hilsa trader Zaheer Sikder said some of the hilsas being sold at the markets are carrying eggs. He said big-sized hilsas are being sold at Tk 1,000 per kg, and 600 to 900 grammes at Tk 900.

"During the 22-day fishing ban, 680 people had been jailed through 899 mobile courts," said Anisur Rahman Talukder, deputy director of the Divisional Fisheries Office.

"At the time, a total of Tk 2,336,300 fine was imposed while 9 lakh metric tonnes of fish and 60 lakh metres of nets were seized," he said.

One die in a day

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The number of confirmed cases and deaths started declining in early August.

In the 24 hours preceding 8:00am yesterday, the DGHS reported 154 Covid cases after 13,072 tests were carried out across the country.

This took the total number of confirmed cases to 15,70,835. The positivity rate was 1.18 percent.

A total of 157 Covid patients recovered in the 24-hour period, raising the recovery to 97.70 percent.

The only deceased, a male Covid patient aged between 71 and 80, was undergoing treatment in a Dhaka hospital.

45 nations set to pledge to protect

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The statement did not give the total amount of funding, but said the measures would include "leveraging over \$4 billion of new public sector investment into agricultural innovation, including the development of climate-resilient crops and regenerative solutions to improve soil health".

In the Dhaka-Cumilla-Chattogram sector, Mukti Bahini engaged Pakistani troops in Saldanadi of Cumilla district killing 2 and injuring 4 enemy soldiers. On the same day, in another engagement with the Pakistani troops in Kaimpur area, 3 enemy soldiers were killed.

Another group of Mukti Bahini made a repulsive attack on the occupation troops in Mandabhab area of Cumilla district inflicting 15 casualties. During this action three freedom fighters were

also injured. Mukti Bahini ambushed Pakistani troops in Radanagar killing 2 and injuring 3 enemy soldiers. In another ambush in Latimia area 2 enemy soldiers were killed and 2 were injured.

In the Jashore-Kushtia-Khulna sector, 3 Razakars were captured today with 4 rifles in Shahapur area. Mukti Bahini ambushed Pakistani army patrol in Ramkrishna killing 5 and injuring 3 enemy soldiers.

In an ambush in Gosainghat of Dinajpur district Mukti Bahini killed one enemy soldier and injured three.

"Few moments later, I could sense something wrong. I also tried to get down from the bus. The bus driver did not stop. Rather, he (driver) stood up from the steering seat and asked the helper to drive the bus," said the girl.

"Then, the driver tried to rape me. At one stage, I jumped off the moving bus Colora area on Dhaka-Aricha highway," said the victim while talking to newsmen.

A private car was plying behind the bus. Seeing the incident, the private car driver stopped the
