North Bengal Museum to get new address

The North Bengal Museum displaying rare local artefacts and documents from the time of the war of liberation was established in 2012 at the abode of Kurigram’s Public Prosecutor (PP) SM Abraham Lincoln. Lincoln turned his familial home into an archive showcasing the invaluable documents of the Liberation War collected for 20 years.

The living room, dining room and even bedroom of the two-storeyed residence at Nazira Baparipara in the town are a treasure trove of more than two thousand authentic documents and materials related to local history, heritage and liberation war.

The museum is finally going to get an address of its own as the construction of a four-storeyed building was inaugurated by the Liberation War Affairs Minister AKM Mozammel Haque on June 9. The building will be constructed on 20 decimals of land donated by the museum’s founder SM Abraham Lincoln next to his current residence at a cost of Tk 2 crore and 16 lakhs allocated by the Ministry of Liberation War Affairs.

Lincoln collected many rare memorabilia while working in the field of research on

the Liberation War. While doing research, he came across many rare documents from the time of the liberation war and felt the need to preserve them.

Starting from his living room, he gradually turned his whole familial house into a museum reflecting on the local history, heritage and the war of

independence. The museum contains a list of 5,865 Razakars from the greater Rangpur region, a list of members of the peace committee, some dummy rifles used by the freedom fighters on the Roumari battlefield, British-era swords, mortar shells fired by the Pakistan Army on the Bhurungamari battlefield, grenade shells and grenade launchers.

Currently, the visitors pay a visit to

the museum during the day. Lincoln and his family dwell in it at night. Once the construction work is completed, visitors will be able to visit the museum more comfortably.

The ground floor of the original design includes the library, store, office, seminar room, cafeteria and theatre hall. The upstairs will be the main gallery.

Abraham Lincoln thanked the government for its support and funding for the institutionalisation of the museum, saying, “I am grateful to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina. I thank the entire ministry including the Liberation War Affairs minister. They have joined me with a big heart in my small endeavour to preserve history.”

The Liberation War researchers, freedom fighters in Kurigram said that the money allocated for the construction of the building will be needed for the construction of the basement and the ground floor. More allocation will be required to build the main gallery.

They have expressed hope that the Ministry of Liberation War Affairs and the Ministry of Cultural Affairs will collaborate in the funding of the museum to upgrade it to an international standard.

Galib is a first-year law student at a private university. He passed Secondary School Certificate (SSC) examinations in 2016. He got involved in militancy when he was a student of a college, said CTTC officials.

The CTTC chief said Galib was initially inspired by content, hailing violent extremism, circulated by two Facebook profiles under the names of Jamil Hasan and Jamshed Hossain. The two IDs were later suspended by the social media platform for spreading write-ups promoting Taliban and Al Qaeda.

Galib learnt about Ansar al Islam online pages like “Dawailallah”, “Darulilm” and “Gazwa” –through those two IDs, he said.

Earlier, the CTTC unit arrested two of the three Ansar al Islam operatives tasked with spreading the outfit’s ideology online. The arrestees are Al Amin Siddiqui and Jobaida Siddiqui Nabila, said officials.

Asaduzzaman said the trio used to run various campaigns on social media platforms to spread Ansar al Islam’s ideology. Their ultimate aim is to introduce

Sharia law in the country.

Talking about Galib, the CTTC chief said he started posting his write-ups on social media in 2019. For this, he opened a Facebook ID named “Azzam Al Galib”. He also operated a telegram channel under the same name.

Galib opened another page on Facebook under the name of “Muahid Muslim” and sent the page’s invite to others. Facebook shut down the ID and the page for having “too much radical content,” he said.

Galib was also responsible for collecting funds through mobile money transfer apps. After getting the money, he would transfer it to the family members of arrested Ansar al Islam members.

Asaduzzaman said they would contact banks to know about the transaction details and whether any of the money was used to secure bail of those arrested Ansar al Islam members.

Replying to a question, he said they found contents encouraging militant activities in the cell phones recovered from the arrestees.

Yesterday, CTTC officials produced Galib before a Dhaka court, which placed him on a five-day remand.

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and others were reasons behind these violence,” Nurul said.

The media reported that people were killed in violence, but it needs to be probed whether the violence took place over the polls, he said.

A total of 17 registered political parties and a large number of independents ran. There were 41,218 candidates vying for various posts, he said.

It has been observed that an average of four candidates ran for a chairman post.

“ ... the election was participatory and competitive,” Nurul said.

He urged all candidates, their supporters, and the political leaders to abide by the electoral code of conduct, be tolerant, and cooperate with the election officials in the coming phases.

He differed with Election Commissioner Mahbub Talukdar’s comment that “Election is now in ICU, democracy on life support” by saying that “I don’t believe that there is no proper atmosphere for election.”

“The comments he [Mahbub Talukdar] made are not decent,” Nurul said.

Engineers make

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soft robots are “naturally geared to interact with the soft stuff, like humans or tomatoes”, Pierre-Thomas Brun, assistant professor of chemical and biological engineering at Princeton, said.

This could make them significantly more useful for harvesting food, taking items off a conveyor belt, or providing health care – as part of wearable exosuits or under-the-skin devices that could help people with heart issues.

The robots are built by injecting bubbles into a liquid polymer called elastomer which becomes rubbery when it solidifies, then inflating the device to make it bend and move. Gravity helps the bubble rise to the top as the elastomer reaches the bottom; once it has hardened, it can be removed from the mold and inflated.

He said inclusive politics is essential for every country’s prospect -- something that Bangladesh’s Father of the Nation Sheikh Mujibur Rahman knew very well.

“Bangladesh has today built something quite remarkable. Yet, no country progresses by sitting on its laurels. There is an opportunity for this great nation to go even further.”

He said Bangladesh has shown sustainability of democracy, the pillars of democracy are being strengthened, but always there are needs to work on, call it in UK or Bangladesh, he said.

EU Ambassador to Bangladesh Charles Whiteley said they will be following the next general election very closely because the international community

is “very interested” in what happens in Bangladesh.

“Why we’ll be following it very closely is not because we want to interfere, but the international community is very interested in what happens in Bangladesh,” he said at “DCAB Talk” in a city hotel.

Diplomatic Correspondents Association, Bangladesh, (DCAB) President Pantho Rahaman and General Secretary AKM Moynuddin also spoke at the event.

“I think the bottom line is in any election, average citizens wake up the day after the election and see the results and say my vote is counted,” said the EU diplomat.

During the talks, marking the 50 years of UK-Bangladesh relationship, Lord Tariq said the UK is working to strengthen the ties with Bangladesh in terms of trade, education, climate change and more.

“We must work together so that economic development does not come at the cost of the planet. It is now the time to act now, not tomorrow,” he said.

He assured that the UK would continue to stand with Bangladesh in urgently finding ways to a solution to the Rohingya crisis, stressing the need for accountability as well as repatriation.

Lord Tariq announced that the UK will provide £54 million to ensure disadvantaged girls and young people have access to quality education. Nearly half a million children will be benefited by it.

BANGLADESH PROBLEM WILL BE RESOLVED SOON

YAHYA LOSING CONTROL OVER EAST PAKISTAN

The US president’s assistant for national security affairs, Henry Kissinger, in a memorandum dated November 16, 1971, informed president Nixon, “Yahya has only decreasing control over his government’s policy in East Pakistan because the Pakistan Army there is nearly autonomous. The army’s policy is such that the running battle with guerrillas is likely to continue with little attention to changing practices in a way that could restore genuine civilian government.” The memorandum was based on the report of USAID official Maury Williams who had visited East Pakistan recently.

“The Pakistan Army in East Pakistan was

operating in many respects independent of the policies and direction of president Yahya. The recently appointed civilian government is really run by a major general who is the military adviser to the governor,” added the memorandum.

ON THE WAR FRONT

Mukti Bahini raided Pakistani troops position in Godagari area of Rajshahi today. Six enemy soldiers were killed and four were wounded in the operation.

The Pak occupation troops attacked a Mukti Bahini position near Bamondia in Kushtia district today. The freedom fighters retaliated bravely, and after a fierce battle the enemy retreated. The enemy troops suffered heavy casualties.

Mukti Bahini clashed with occupation troops in Bagerhat area today killing 10 enemy soldiers. On the same day, Mukti Bahini ambushed a Pakistan army Jeep near Jagati and killed four enemy soldiers. Another group of Mukti Bahini attacked Pakistani troops moving to Goalahati from Chhutipur area, killing two and injuring three enemy soldiers.

Mukti Bahini raided Muktagacha Police Station today and killed six enemy irregulars.

Meanwhile, China yesterday pushed back at criticism that it helped weaken language on phasing out coal at the COP26 conference, saying that it had already made “enormous efforts” to reduce coal consumption.

China’s foreign ministry spokesman Zhao Lijian at a news briefing in Beijing said that China has already made “enormous efforts” in controlling coal consumption, reports Reuters.

Energy transitions should be based on national circumstances and developing countries’ energy security should be guaranteed, he added.

Teen held captive for 80 days, raped

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Kamal, 46, Naser, 25, and Farhad, 27.

All of them are residents of different villages of the same upazila.

The four used to stalk the girl, a student of class-9, according to the case statement. At one stage, the girl shared the incident with her guardians, who later sharply rebuked the stalkers.

The incident made the stalkers furious.

On August 26, as the girl was en route to her school, Mamun and his cohorts abducted her from the Mazumdar Hat area at gunpoint.

The girl was first taken to a house at Chatarpaiyyar village under nearby Senbagh upazila. She was kept hostage for about a month and was violated by Mamun and Kamal continuously.

On September 28, the girl was taken to a residence in Tangail’s Shahidpur village, where the

four accused continued to rape her.

The acts were filmed by the accused, who threatened to release the video on social media if she discloses the matter.

Later on November 9, the girl managed to flee from the compound and returned to her home in Noakhali in a poorly state.

As soon as she was physically able to venture out of her home, the girl filed the case with the Begumganj Police Station.

The victim’s medical test was completed yesterday, said Mir Zahedul Haque Rony, the officer-in-charge of Begumganj Police Station.

The victim’s family members said they are passing days in insecurity as the rapists are threatening them, the police said quoting the victims.

Police were conducting raids to arrest the accused, Rony added.

How do Covid pills work?

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The second such drug, Paxlovid by Pfizer is, however, yet to be authorised around the world.

The two drugs have a lot to offer in terms of treatment of coronavirus infection.

But how do these work?

MOLNUPIRAVIR

According to the makers of Molnupiravir, it cuts the risk of being hospitalised or dying by half – among adults with mild to moderate Covid, who would otherwise be at risk of developing serious disease.

The drug creates erroneous mutations in the genetic code of the virus, stopping it from replicating accurately.

The increasing replication with mutations, called “error catastrophe,” eventually stop the virus’ reproduction entirely.

The drug, due to its powerful destructive process, is named after “Mjölnir”, the hammer wielded by the God of Thunder, Thor.

PAXLOVID

Paxlovid also stops viral replication, but in a different way.

Coronavirus remains functional and reproduces in our body with the help of protease, which is a kind of enzyme.

Paxlovid attaches to protease and makes it non-functional, thus making the coronavirus non-functional.

According to studies revealed by Pfizer, Paxlovid reduces the risk of hospitalisation or death by 89 percent among those most vulnerable to Covid-19.

A major advantage the new drugs have is that they come in pill form, rather than as intravenous drugs. However, for both drugs, starting treatment early is important.

In clinical trials, Merck and Pfizer started the treatments within five days of symptoms starting. The trials for both treatments reported no unfavourable side-effects.

Such drugs, in the form of pills are expected to not only help cure people, but also stop the spread of coronavirus.

EC asks Pabna MP to leave Bera

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reasons. He, however, claimed he does not violate electoral code of conduct.

The lawmaker’s son, Asif Sams Ranjan, is contesting the mayoral polls on AL ticket.

More than one mayor candidate complained against the lawmaker over influencing the election violating the electoral code of conduct, said Md Mahabubur Rahman, Pabna district election officer and also the returning officer of Bera municipality polls.

“According to the electoral rules [section 22], important personalities, including lawmakers, do not stay in the electoral area to make sure that the election is not influenced. We have requested the lawmaker to leave the area ahead of the election for the sake of maintaining the electoral code of conduct.” Mahabubur said.

Speaking to The Daily Star, lawmaker Tuku

yesterday said he was staying at his home in Bera and was not violating the electoral code of conduct.

“I am staying at my home and this is my right. I don’t take part in any polls campaign and never influence the election. I have no intention of influencing the polls.”

He said he would go to Dhaka soon to join the current parliament session.

Campaigning in the municipality polls began on Friday. A total of five candidates are taking part in the election.

Tuku, also a former state minister for home affairs, thanked the returning officer for trying to hold an impartial and peaceful election.

“I am happy that the election officials are working to hold a peaceful and impartial election.”

He said the Awami League is a well organised organisation and its leaders and activists will work for the party mayor candidate.
