## Rizwan eyes greater heights in Mirpur

Pakistan wicketkeeper-batsman Mohammad Rizwan mentioned yesterday that his team is well aware of the Mirpur conditions.

"We've seen in the recent past that the conditions favour the spinners," said Rizwan, who has recovered well from a chest infection and is all set to begin training ahead of the three-match T20I series, which begins from November 19, against hosts Bangladesh.

All the matches in the T20I series will be underway from 2pm, with fans returning to the gallery in Bangladesh for the first time since March 2020.

Rizwan made a miraculous recovery last week after two days in hospital to materialise a scintillating performance as he top-scored with 67 in the ICC T20 World Cup semifinal against Australia.

He ended with an impressive 281 runs tally, the third-highest in the mega event, despite missing out on the final after Pakistan bowed out to the eventual winners with a five-wicket loss.

And in the process, Rizwan became the

first batter to score over a thousand runs in a calendar year in T20Is and has the chance to raise his tally further against the Tigers in Mirpur.

"I'm happy that I have scored the most runs in the calendar year. But I'm more delighted that I was able to secure this record for my country," Rizwan said.

Despite the early struggle in his T20I career, he blossomed this year after having shown promise in 2020 by scoring his maiden fifty against New Zealand in December.

Meanwhile, Pakistan announced the squad for two-match Test series against Bangladesh, the first of which will take place at Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium in Chattogram on November 26.

has," Finch said after the title triumph that adds to their five ODI World Cup trophies.

"It's had ups and downs along the way, don't get me wrong. It's never smooth sailing. When you're in bubbles and things like that, it's always difficult. Guys get along very well.

Australia's previous best was a runners-up finish in 2010 when they lost the final to England and the T20 World Cup remained a dream for six editions since 2007.

"I think there's been so much talk about this being the one that's been elusive to Australia. And to be fair, we probably under-performed in the past, if we are being honest with our selves, said Finch.

"We've had some great teams along the way. This team is pretty special. The camaraderie, the way that everyone really cares for each other and looks after each other, looks out for each other; pretty special.

"So yeah, it's awesome. That's brilliant and it's great for Australian Cricket.'

### A triumph for Australia and organisers

As fireworks lit up the Dubai sky after Sunday's Twenty20 World Cup final and shimmering confetti rained on the jubilant Australian team, the organisers heaved a huge sigh of relief at the safe and glitzy culmination of the showpiece event.

It was not until June that the Indian cricket board (BCCI) threw up their hand conceding it was not possible to host the 16-team tournament in the coronavirus-battered country.

The tournament found a new home in the United Arab Emirates (UAE) while Oman was allotted some preliminary round matches, even though the BCCI retained its host status. After an action-packed month, Aaron Finch's Australia, written off after a horrendous build-up, emerged with their maiden 20-overs world title in their arms.

The tournament meandered initially until pretournament favourites India sent shockwaves with their premature exit in what was Virat Kohli's swansong as the team's 20-overs leader.


The competition sprang to life in the semi-finals when New Zealand stunned reigning 50-overs world champions England and Australia humbled Pakistan, the tournament's only unbeaten team until then.

England opener Jos Buttler and Sri Lanka all-rounder Wanindu Hasaranga set alight the tournament with their individual brilliance even if their team could not last the distance.

And few can match the bravery of Pakistan stumperbatsman Mohammad Rizwan, who spent two nights in intensive care with a chest infection and returned to topscore for his team in their semi-final loss to Australia.

India's Kohli also won hearts for his bold stance against religious discriminatio. His South Africa counterpart Tenda Bavuma also defined true leadership with his graceful handling of a crisis. Kane Williamson also led by example but New Zealand still finished runners-up. The only blot on an otherwise successful tournament was the conditions, especially in Dubai, which favoured the chasing teams and the toss had a major impact on the outcome.

The chasing team won every night game in Dubai and Finch admitted he had been lucky to win six out of seven tosses.

#### Tigresses whitewash Zimbabwe



A five-wicket haul from Nahida Akter helped Bangladesh women's national cricket team cruise to a comfortable seven-wicket victory with 190 balls to spare as they whitewashed Zimbabwe in the three-match ODI series in Bulawayo yesterday.

Zimbabwe skipper Mary-Anne Musonda elected to bat first before Bangladesh's deadly bowling attack restricted the hosts to 72 runs in 27.2 overs.
