Sixty one percent of Bangladesh's population still do not have access to safely managed toilet facilities, UN Water data suggests.

Despite this, budget allocation in this sector is highly inadequate, and this needs to be addressed according properly, experts.
"There is progress in

the sanitation sector in the country. But if we consider the parameters of sustainable development goals, we have many things to do, especially allocate adequate budget and plan comprehensively," Zobair Hasan, research director at Development Organisation of the Rural Poor (DORP), told The Daily Star yesterday.

In 2021-2022 fiscal, the total allocation for the WASH sector was Tk 5,932 crore or only Tk 247 per capita. This is much lower than

the global standard of Tk 1,186. The SDG 6 states that

adequate sanitation and

in education settings and workplaces are essential to make sure that women can participate in society on equal terms.

The country, however, has big gaps in these indicators, data showed.

There should be at least one toilet for every 10 members of a household while at least one toilet against every 50 students in schools, according to the sector development plan (SDP) of the government.

In reality, however, people living in slums and rural areas do not have an adequate number of facilities. There is one toilet for every 300 students in different educational institutes in the country.

The progress in ensuring safely managed toilets for all is very slow, according to the UN Water data.

In 2000, only 23 percent of the population had access to safely managed toilets and it reached 39 percent in

## Dengue fear still looms over Ctg

Residents of Chattogram are still dealing with the dengue menace even in November. This is not a regular occurrence, as the Aedes mosquito population starts to decline during the

This correspondent contacted a number of doctors specialising in medicine and paediatrics in different hospitals of Chattogram, and they said they were receiving a good number of dengue patients every day, which is quite unusual in November.

Many children are testing positive for dengue and several were brought to hospitals in critical condition, they

According to the Chattogram Civil Surgeon Office, in the current month, three succumbed to the disease in the past 18 days, while two of them died in a span of 24 hours in Chattogram city on Tuesday and Wednesday.

The two deceased are Saddam Gauchiya Tayabiya Sunniya Dakhil Madrasa in Sitakunda upazila, and

### No fault of their own

90 families suffer as Titas cut off gas line of Japan Garden City building saying authorities didn't pay bill on time

Ninety families living at Mohammadpur's Japan Garden City have not been able to cook anything since Wednesday, as Titas cut the gas line of Capital Apartment building.

And the residents have little to no idea when the connection will be restored.

Titas said authorities of Japan Garden City, a residential project of Japan-Bangladesh Joint Venture Company, did not pay the gas bill for 300-400 consumers for a long time.

According to Titas, authorities of the residential project haven't paid gas bills amounting to over Tk 58 lakh, and it incurred an additional Tk 2 lakh as penalty. They have been served with

The increasing use of antibiotics to fatten cows needs to stop to control antibiotic resistance, Health Minister Zahid Maleque said yesterday at an event at the Directorate General of Drug Administration, marking World Antimicrobial Awareness Week 2021.

A 2019 study by the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR) showed that antibiotic drugs have been losing their capacity to kill germs rapidly.

The minister urged medicine sellers not to sell antibiotics without prescriptions.

# Preventing Misuse of FB Zuckerberg served | Luring with deals, discounts

DB busts fraudster who swindled over hundreds of travel agents on social media

Boran Uddin posed as Bangladeshi expatriate living in Dubai or Qatar, working for an international travel agency.

He would first open a WhatsApp or social media account using a Dubai or Qatar's SIM card. He would then join different social media groups run by Bangladeshi travel agencies.

The 37-year-old would post on the groups, mentioning how he has some airline tickets bought at a discount price from the Middle East. Putting the tickets up for sale, he would invite customers to buy paying 50 percent of the amount in advance.

Once a buyer was found,

Borhan would ask them to send money to his wife Humayra Akter Munni's bank accounts, saying that she lives in Bangladesh. At times, he would provide mobile financial service (MFS) numbers

But as soon as the interested buyer would deposit the money, Borhan would switch off his WhatsApp or social media account and simply disappear, before repeating the cycle with someone else.

The Cyber and Special Crime Division of police's detective branch (DB) unearthed these details after arresting Borhan from Chattogram's Satkania area on November 12.

Junaed Alam Sharker, additional deputy commissioner of DB police, told The Daily Star that they conducted a drive and arrested Borhan after receiving complaints from a travel agency owner.

"Borhan was involved with this type of fraudulence for the last five years or so. We have come to know that he defrauded over hundreds of travel agents so far," said Sharker.

Due to Borhan's activities over the years, a group of travel agents even declared a Tk 2 lakh bounty for his arrest. The Daily Star has obtained a copy of the bounty declaration.

### Love is there, not resources

Central Veterinary Hospital in Dhaka struggles with staff shortage, broken equipment, out of date premises

By Monday morning, it was two whole days of anxiety for Riya. On Saturday, her pet cat -- who's a few months pregnant -- had gone missing. Thankfully, the cat eventually returned on Monday, but not without some nasty bruises on her head.

Without delay, Riya took her to the Central Veterinary Hospital, which happened to be right beside the Old Dhaka resident's house.

Located at Kazi Alauddin Road, the hospital sees around 200 to 250 patients everyday, according to authorities. Over the years, it has become the go to place for pet owners or animal rescuers of Old Dhaka, while people from New Dhaka often visit too.

There are state-of-the-art digital X-rays, ultrasonography, primary surgery, pathological labs for the animals that come here for treatment. Apart from this, an endoscopy machine has also been installed recently.

But for all its importance, the actual condition of the hospital isn't very good. This means that despite their best wishes, neither the doctors nor the authorities can deliver as much as they can.

### 'We demand better food at hall canteens'

Leaders and activists left-leaning the Chhatra Samajtantrik Front held a human chain on the Dhaka University campus demanding yesterday, lower price and better quality canteen food at the university.

They said ever since the halls reopened after 18 months of closure due to the lockdown, the price of food has been increasing on one hand, while its quality has been falling.

"Canteen owners told us they have no option but to hike the prices as food prices have increased at the kitchen markets. But when we faced similar situation in the past, food price at the canteens were still stable, as the authorities used to intervene," said Salman Siddiqui, president of the organisation's DU unit.

"But now the hall canteens are controlled by private owners, which is why they don't care about students' welfare," he alleged.

"Another reason is that many leaders who eat at the canteens don't pay the bills, shifting the burden on to general students," he said.

Speakers at the programme asked for the university authorities to pay subsidies to keep food prices stable, if necessary.
