



They duped people with ‘cheap’ phones

Cops arrest Muktagacha gang that amassed huge wealth

A three-member gang from Muktagacha of Mymensingh that has been embezzling lakhs of taka by baiting people with fancy gadgets at low prices on bikroy.com has been nabbed by the police.

In less than a year, the trio -- Sojayet Ahmed Shikon, 21; Al Amin, 20; and Sahinur Rahman Biplob, 26 -- has appropriated more than Tk 21 lakh in cash and bought a car, two motorcycles and constructed a one-story building in their district.

The gang first collected registered SIM cards of different operators for Tk 350 to Tk 500 and opened Gmail accounts with the numbers. With the Gmail accounts, they advertised the gadgets on bikroy.com, the country's largest classified ad site.

In addition, for communication with interested buyers, they pretended to be serving police members to gain trust.

Once people showed interest in the mobile phones advertised, the trio asked for 50 percent of the amount, according to Junaed Alam Sharker, additional deputy commissioner of police's detective branch (DB).

They then provided false booking receipts of Sundarban Courier Service as proof of shipping and demanded the remaining sum.

The gang used to collect the courier's booking books from a broker for Tk 30,000-35,000.

CHINA'S SPEECH NOT UNEXPECTED: INDIRA
China's relations with Pakistan and the reported speech of the Chinese delegate at the United Nations were not unexpected, Indian prime minister Indira Gandhi said today.

The speech of the Chinese representative Fu Hau at the world body wouldn't change India's stand and its relations with China, she added.

Asked to comment on the statement of Pakistan president Yahya that he desired to improve relations with India, Indira said India would welcome such a move provided the Pakistan president meant it sincerely.

Asked to clarify what she meant by “sincerity”, Indira said the Pakistan government should immediately release Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and give up the farce of fresh elections in Bangladesh. They should recognise the elected public representatives and arrive at a political settlement with them in order to create the necessary atmosphere and guarantee of safe return of the refugees.

ON THE WAR FRONT
A joint command composed of the Indian Armed Forces and Bangladesh Mukti Bahini was formally formed today. Lieutenant General Jagjit Singh Aurora, commander, Eastern Command of Indian Army, became the commander of the joint forces.

Mukti Bahini and the 14th Punjab Regiment of the Indian Army moved in to capture the areas around Garibpur, Boyra. Pakistan immediately retaliated with an infantry battalion.

Says Foreign Minister Momen

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen yesterday hoped that Myanmar would take back Rohingyas gradually as the pressure on Myanmar would be mounted following the recent adoption of resolution in the United Nations.

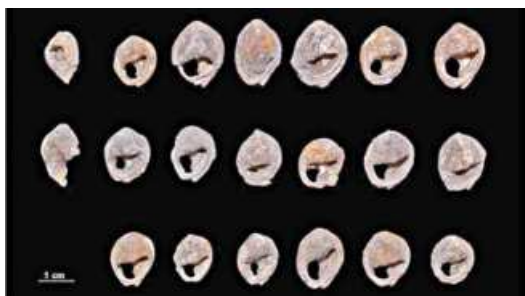

Momen said Myanmar did not say they would not take back their people. “We hope Myanmar will create a conducive environment for the voluntary return of the Rohingyas.”

‘Oldest’ jewelry unveiled in Morocco

Archaeologists in Morocco have unveiled what they said was the oldest jewelry in the world, perforated seashells dating back as much as 150,000 years.

The shells, assumed to have formed necklaces and bracelets, were discovered in the Bizmoune cave near the coastal resort of Essaouira.

They were dated as 142,000-150,000 years old, according to researcher Abdeljalil Bouzouggar.

“This discovery has enormous implications for the history of humanity,” he said on Thursday, adding that it suggested the owner was using language.

Myanmar Navy detains Bangladeshi fishermen

At least 22 Bangladeshi fishermen were detained and four Bangladeshi fishing trawlers were seized by Myanmar Navy personnel yesterday.

The fishermen were detained while they were fishing in the Bay of Bengal near St Martin's Island inside the Bangladesh maritime territory around 10:00am, said Noor Ahmed, chairman of St Martin's union parishad.

“A few of our fishermen contacted me over phone immediately after they were detained. But later, their mobile phones were found switched off. We have informed the matter to our upazila nirbahi officer (UNO),” he told The Daily Star.

Trawler owner Nurul Amin said they frequently face similar problems as Myanmar Navy often detains Bangladeshi fishermen entering

KILLING OF BLM PROTESTERS Calls for calm after US teen cleared of murder

Kyle Rittenhouse, the American teenager who shot dead two men during protests and riots against police brutality in Wisconsin last year, was acquitted of all charges on Friday after a high-profile and politically divisive trial.

A jury found Rittenhouse, 18, not guilty of reckless and intentional homicide and other charges stemming from the shootings that took place in August 2020 in Kenosha, Wisconsin.

The case drew national attention, in part because it arose from the Black Lives Matter demonstrations that swept the country last year and featured a controversial mix of guns, racial tensions and vigilantism.

Rittenhouse, who claimed he acted in self-defense, sobbed and shook as the verdict was read, sank into his chair and embraced his lawyer before rushing out of the courtroom.

President Joe Biden warned against violence following the verdict in the closely watched trial and appealed for calm.

“While the verdict in Kenosha will leave many Americans feeling angry and concerned, myself included, we must acknowledge that the jury has spoken,” Biden said in a statement.

“I urge everyone to express their views peacefully, consistent with the rule of law.

“What we need right now is justice, not more violence,” lawyers for the family of Gaige Grosskreutz, who was shot and injured by Mr Rittenhouse, said in a statement.

There were scattered cheers and clapping from
