

Students still on streets

Protests continue for gazette on half pass, road safety

Students will stage a sit in on the BRTA office premises in the capital's Banani today to press home their nine-point demand

The demands include issuing a gazette notification with regard to half-passes for students on public transport. The agitating students said if the notification of half fare

is not issued by today, they would announce their next programme at the sit-in programme. Meanwhile, Bangladesh Road Transport Owners'

Association will hold a press briefing today to announce their decision on the students' half-fare demand Students demonstrating for safer roads and half bus

fare over the past couple of weeks also took to the street yesterday in different parts of the capital. At the Nilkhet intersection, protesters said they have not gotten any assurance from the government, which had

They said they have demanded half fare on all buses, not just on BRTC ones. Some people are trying to malign the movement in

various ways, they alleged. A similar protest was held in Shantinagar by students of different colleges and schools of the area. In hundreds, they first blocked the Shantinagar intersection and then marched in a procession to Kakrail and back to Shantinagar

Nirapad Sarak Andolon, a group of road safety campaigners, yesterday submitted a memorandum to the education ministry, seeking steps to realise the nine-point demand.

Why govt shouldn't be asked to re-fix tariff

Says HC rule

The High Court yesterday issued a rule asking the government to explain in a week why it should not be directed to re-fix the tariff of petroleum products including kerosene and diesel as per relevant provisions of the Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission (BERC) Act, 2013.

In the rule, the court also asked the respondents to show the causes why the inaction of the BERC chairman to finalise three rules and provisions made in 2012 regarding fixing the prices of petroleum products through gazette notification should not be declared illegal.

The senior secretary at the ministry of energy and mineral resources. BERC chairman and other officials concerned have

INVESTMENT SUMMIT

Investors propose pumping \$2.7b into Bangladesh

The two-day investment summit, which concluded vesterday, received investment proposals of \$2.7 billion from domestic and international companies in different sectors.

Engineering Dimension, a Saudi industrial group, declared to invest \$1.75 billion in making power generators and setting up cement manufacturing plant, said Md Sirazul Islam, executive chairman of Bangladesh Investment Development Authority (BIDA) after the summit.

Aygaz, a Turkish industrial group, nnounced it would invest \$150 mill along with local United Group, he said.

Besides, Karnaphuly Dry Dock signed a deal with Bangladesh Economic Zones Authority to invest \$118 million in construction of a terminal in the Chattogram port, he said, adding that Barishal Electric Power Company announced investment of \$100 million in producing electricity.

Guopo Renewable Energy Technology proposed to invest \$50 million. Hangzhou JY Supply Chain announced plans for investment of \$20 million and IT Hub Investments will invest \$15 million, added

Indira wants Pak troop withdrawn from Bangladesh

INDIRA'S SPEECH AT RAJYA **SABHA**

Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi today suggested straightway withdrawal of Pakistani troops from

Bangladesh as a gesture of peace . The presence of troops in Bangladesh is a "threat to our security", she claimed.

In her speech at the Rajya Sabha she further said that next month would be one of great difficulty for the people of Bangladesh and India. She urged all the parties to unite and face the challenge.

Indira Gandhi said India had remained restrained but "we can't allow annihilation of the entire people next door. It is not in our national interest that the entire unarmed population of Bangladesh should be annihilated. This will increase the threat to our security".

Referring to Pakistan's consistent attempt to internationalise the issue by making it and Indo-Pak problem Indira Gandhi said the bid to bring in the Security Council was part of the same game to confuse reality and those who were moving in the matter couldn't but the suspect in the eyes of the people of India. She spoke highly of Mukti Bahini and said, "They have our

2 more held over Sohel murder

Police have arrested two more suspects in the councillor Sohel murder

According to the police, Jisan, 28, son of Nur Ali of Suzanagar, was arrested at Panchtubi of Kotwali late Sunday night and Rabbi Islam Antu, 19, son of Badal Mia of Sangraish, Cumilla, was arrested at Debidwer the same night, following a tip-off.

Including the two, six people have so far been arrested in connection with the gruesome murder and five of them have been named in the case filed by Sohel's younger brother Syed Mohammad Rumon.

Rumon accused 11 named and 12 unnamed individuals in the case.

Jisan and Antu were produced before the Cumilla Chief Judicial Magistrate Court with seven-day remand prayers for each yesterday.

When people think of artificial intelligence, the images that often come to mind are of the sinister robots that populate the worlds of "The Terminator," "i, Robot," "Westworld," and "Blade Runner." For many years, fiction has told us that AI is often used for evil rather than for good.

But what we may not usually associate with AI is art and poetry -- yet that's exactly what Ai-Da, a highly realistic robot invented by Aidan Meller in Oxford, central England, spends her time creating. Ai-Da is the world's first ultra-realistic humanoid robot artist, and on Friday she gave a public

Indian Farm Laws

Parliament passes bill to repeal

India's parliament yesterday passed a bill to repeal three laws aiming at deregulating agricultural markets, bowing to pressure from farmers who have protested for over a year to demand that the laws be rolled back.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's administration introduced the farm bills last year through an executive order, traditionally reserved for emergency legislation, triggering India's longest-running farmers' protest. Parliament then passed the legislation via a voice vote, drawing widespread criticism that it had rushed through the laws without proper debate.

In a bid to end the protests ahead of the state assembly election in India's most populous Uttar Pradesh state early next year, Modi said this month his government would repeal the laws in the new session of parliament. As parliament reconvened for its winter session

yesterday, both the lower and upper houses passed the bill to withdraw the laws meant to deregulate and open up agricultural markets to companies. Farmers have said the laws would leave them with scant bargaining power against big private purchasers. The controversial laws saw tens of thousands of people,

including many elderly growers and women farmers, brave extreme weather and a severe second wave of coronavirus infections to camp out on the outskirts of New Delhi over the past year.

In addition to their repeal demand, protesting farmers are also asking that Modi's administration introduce a law SEE PAGE 5 COL 4
