LEWANDOWSKI 'deserves award for 2020'

Lionel Messi has said he believes Robert Lewandowski should be retrospectively awarded the 2020 Ballon d'Or as he praised the Bayern Munich striker in his acceptance speech for the 2021 honour on Monday.

Messi was crowned the 2021 Ballon d'Or winner at a ceremony in Paris, claiming the trophy for the seventh time in his career.

But the Paris Saint-Germain star admits he had tough competition in the form of Lewandowski this year as he gave a special mention to the Poland international.

"I would like to mention Robert Lewandowski, it's been a real honour to compete with you," Messi said after collecting the trophy.

"Everyone knows and we agree that you were the winner last year."

"I think France Football should award you your 2020 Ballon d'Or - you deserve it and you should



have it at home."

He added: "I think Robert Lewandowski had a great year. Year after year, he improves and shows the excellent striker he is, as well as his ability to score goals."

"This year he was awarded as the top scorer. Of course he can certainly aspire to that level next year, thanks to his way of being on the pitch. And in addition, he plays for a big club."

Lewandowski was largely seen as the favourite to win the Ballon d'Or in 2020 because of his goal scoring exploits for Bundesliga champions Bayern.

But the award was cancelled that year because of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Lionel Messi is not sure if his record will be broken after the Paris Saint-Germain and Argentina superstar won a seventh Ballon d'Or on Monday.

Messi claimed the coveted award for a record-extending seventh time during a ceremony in Paris, while Bayern Munich talisman Robert Lewandowski won the inaugural Striker of the Year award and finished second in the Ballon d'Or voting.

Many had backed Lewandowski to take home the prized individual honour, after France Football's 2020 Ballon d'Or was scrapped due to COVID-19 -- the Bayern forward has scored 53 goals in 42 appearances in 2021, the most of any player in Europe's top five leagues across all competitions.

But Messi added to his incredible haul after guiding Argentina to a drought-ending

triumph at the Copa America -- the country's first piece of silverware in 28 years, while he has netted 32 goals and supplied 12 assists across 40 club appearances for Barcelona and PSG this year.

"I don't know if the record is beatable, I just have to accept it," the 34-year-old Messi told reporters, with Cristiano Ronaldo next on the list after winning the award five times.

"But honestly, I don't know if this record seven Ballon d'Or's can be beaten. But seven anyhow is really impressive and I'm very happy to win it here in Paris."

"Concerning [Liverpool star] Mohamed Salah, like [Robert] Lewandowski he will have other opportunities in the years to come. Both players are really at the best at what they've managed so far. They will have other opportunities to win the trophy."

Messi scored four goals and provided five assists as he led the Albiceleste to their first

Copa America title since 1993, involved in nine of the 12 goals scored by Argentina at the showpiece South American tournament.

"I had a pretty good year with Barcelona without titles, however I did win the Copa del Rey," Argentina's captain and all-time leading scorer Messi added.

"The Copa America was very important to help me win this Ballon d'Or. And yes, I am very proud to be the first PSG to conquer this Ballon d'Or. It's special to do so with another jersey and it makes me very proud."

"This trophy really is special. It gives me a feeling of accomplishment with the Argentine national team. It was indeed a special year for me and of course it helped me in this new stage in my life, this move to PSG and my family and kids."

"I know they enjoy the moment and I enjoy seeing them happy. Seeing my parents, cousins and brothers happy, too."



"It is unacceptable that the person responsible for awarding such a prestigious prize could lie in this way, in absolute disrespect for someone who has always respected France Football and the Ballon d'Or."

France Football did not immediately respond to an emailed request for comment on Ronaldo's post.

"I always win for myself and for the clubs I represent, I win for myself and for those who love me. I don't win against someone," added the Portugal forward.

"The biggest ambition of my career is to leave my name written in golden letters in the history of world football."

Schick's Euro stunner in FIFA shortlist

FIFA have announced an 11-player shortlist for this year's Puskas Award, with Patrik Schick's goal against Scotland at Euro 2020 among the nominees.

Czech forward Schick beat goalkeeper David Marshall with one of the most remarkable goals in European Championship history, a stunning 45-metre strike from just inside the halfway line as his team beat Scotland 2-0.

Schick's effort was subsequently voted goal of the tournament.

Tottenham Hotspur forward Son Heung-min won the award in 2020 for his solo effort against Burnley in the Premier League in which he ran nearly the length of the pitch, dribbling past several Burnley defenders before scoring.

Premier League players Erik Lamela and Riyad Mahrez are also on the list.

Lamela scored with a rabona against Arsenal in a North London derby and Mahrez was recognised for his solo effort against Zimbabwe while on international duty with Algeria. The winner will be selected by an international jury comprised of former footballers and select fans from across the globe. The winner will be announced on Jan. 17.

Thankgod for Ctg Abahani

came from behind to play out a 1-1 draw against Bangladesh Police FC in a Group D encounter of the Riviera Independence Cup at the Birsreshtha Shaheed Mostafa Kamal Stadium in Kamalapur yesterday.

Abahani's Nigerian forward Ebimobowei Thankgod cancelled out a 48th-minute lead from Police's Brazilian Denilson Roldao in the 50th minute to snatch a valuable point for the 2016 champions.

Even though Chattogram Abahani could not form a strong squad like last season as all national players left the club, the current brigade of Maruful Haque were good enough to hold Rumanian tactician Aristica Ciobă's rejuvenated Bangladesh Police side.

Bangladesh Police, who fielded all four foreign recruits from Brazil, Germany and Afghanistan, looked much better from the beginning against a depleted Chattogram Abahani side but they were not lucky

to leave the field with a victory over the Sky Blues, who played with three foreign recruits.

Police could have taken the lead in the very first minute when Afghan forward Amiruddin Sharifi ran into the box from the right flank to cut it back for Amirul Islam, who however surprised all to tap it wide from in front of open net. Then national discard Mathews Bablu, after being

KINGS EASE PAST NAVY

set up by Denilson, was denied brilliantly by defender Shawkat Russel in the 13th minute.

Domestic chores put Burundian on track to success

For 19-year-old Burundian Adelphine Nimpasha, regularly carrying more than twice her own weight in rice on her father's bicycle proved to be excellent - albeit unusual - preparation for becoming a professional cyclist.

On Sunday, Nimpasha came sixth in Africa's first international women's cycling competition after a fall cost her the lead she had held for most of the way.

"I didn't give up but rose up, took my bicycle, and proceeded to finish the race," said Nimpasha, who finished in the top three in national competitions in Egypt and Nigeria before the latest competition, held in her home country.

Her determination earned her the road cycling "combativity" award. Two Kenyans and a Ugandan won the top three prizes.

Cycling is gaining popularity as a



sport in Burundi, where bicycles are already an essential part of life for many. But resources are limited.

"The bicycles are not... suitable. There is also a financial problem - organising training requires huge financial means to accommodate and feed participants for three or four months," said Prosper

She hopes to be an internationally celebrated athlete like Francine Niyonsaba, the Burundian runner who won silver in the 2016 Rio Olympics and broke a 2,000-metre world record in September this year.

"Now I want to become for cycling what Niyonsaba is for athletics."
