Axe irritants, engage deeply

Experts say on partnership between neighbours

Mutual respect, trust and equality should be the pillars of bilateral relationship between Bangladesh and India, foreign policy analysts and academics said at a discussion yesterday.

They said the two countries need to remove all the irritants and engage deeply to flourish and tackle the challenges emerging out of global geopolitics and climate change

The observations came at a discussion, titled "50 years of Bangladesh-India Partnership: towards a journey in next 50 years", jointly organised by the Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD) and Research and Information System for Developing Countries (RIS), India at a city hotel

Analysts said despite a lot of challenges, Bangladesh and India have made some great achievements, with the major three being implementation of the Ganges Treaty, the Land Boundary Agreement and tackling cross-boundary terrorism. The two neighbours also progressed much in terms of connectivity and trade.

"At the same time, we also have problems," said CPD Distinguished Fellow Dr Debapriya Bhattacharya.

He said for trust, respect and equality, religious or ethnic minorities should be treated equally and that one should

agree to live with a pluralistic view in one's own country. Equality means your agenda and my agenda are equally important. If you think my agenda is more important than the other, then you are not having equal treatment within

Pressure on India won't work: Indira

INDIRA CRITICISES UN **OBSERVER PLAN** Indian prime minister Indira Gandhi declared today that it did not worry India at all as to who called her aggressor when

she had not committed any aggression.

Making an obvious reference to the latest newspaper comments in London that Britain might describe India as an aggressor, Indira said, "Times have passed when any nation sitting three or four thousand miles away could give orders to Indians on the basis of their colour superiority to do as they wished. India has changed, and she is no more a country of natives."

"If any country thinks that by calling us aggressor it can pressurise us to forget our national interest, then that country is living in its own paradise and it is welcome to enjoy that," she added.

Referring to Pakistan's effort to get UN observers in East Pakistan, Indira said she did not know what useful purpose these observers could serve in the present situation. She added that the idea of posting observers to East Pakistan was to check the activities of the Mukti Bahini. But they were forgetting that all the checks and controls in Vietnam failed to stop the guerilla activities. "I do not know how observers can function when it is made plain by the Bangladesh government that it cannot guarantee their safety," Indira commented.

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HSC exams begin today

The Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) and its equivalent exams start today after a break of a year due to the pandemic.

The exams for 2020 did not take place last year, with the results prepared based on the candidates' performance in previous public exams.

This year's exam, which will have fewer subjects and a shortened syllabus, is being held eight months later than the usual schedule as the government waited for the coronavirus transmission to come under control.

The examinees will have to take tests only in three optional subjects. They will not have to sit tests in compulsory subjects like Bangla and English. The exams will carry fewer marks.

The HSC exams will end on December 30.

The lot, which will be put up for auction from December 3 to 5 by the Illinois-based Rock Island Auction Company, is valued at \$1.5 million to

The sword, with its scabbard, is the "crown jewel" of the collection, said the auctioneers, who will host the sale both in person and online.

The weapon was made by Nicolas-Noel Boutet, who was director of the state arms factory in Versailles.

Complete trials within 90 days

CJ orders courts about cases related to communal harmony STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Chief Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain has ordered lower courts and tribunals across the country to dispose of cases filed in connection with harming communal harmony within 90 working days.

Supreme Court's Registrar General Md Ali Akbar yesterday issued the notification to this effect under the directive from the chief justice.

The countdown would start from the receipt of the charge sheet.

The notification said if the subordinate courts and tribunals fail to finish the trials of the cases, they must send those with explanation to the Supreme Court.

On November 11, the chief justice told a programme in Dhaka that necessary steps would be taken so that the trial in any case for harming SEE PAGE 13 COL 1

'Don't freak out' about **Omicron**

BioNTech CEO says vaccinated people likely remain protected against severe illness

The CEO of Covid-19 vaccine maker BioNTech has a message for those who are worried about the Omicron

variant of the coronavirus: keep your cool. In an interview with The Wall Street Journal (paywall) on Tuesday, Ugur Sahin, who co-founded BioNTech and invented one of the first Covid-19 vaccines, said that while the Omicron variant could lead to more vaccinated people becoming infected, they will likely remain protected against severe illness.

Our message is: Don't freak out, the plan remains the same: Speed up the administration of a third booster shot," he told the WSJ.

Sahin said that the BioNTech mRNA jab, which he and his team of researchers invented in January 2020, and then developed together with United States drugs giant Pfizer, has already proven that it can protect against severe disease from other variants of the virus that vaccinated people have contracted.

He noted that while Omicron will likely be able to evade antibodies generated by vaccines better than Delta, due to the new variant's higher number of mutations, it is unlikely that Omicron will be able to circumnavigate the body's T-cell immune response to an infection.
