A year on, now it's all settled

For Abdul Jalil, life in Bhasan Char is way better than it was in a cramped Rohingya refugee camp in Cox's Bazar.

After a year of being on the island in the Bay of Bengal, he is now able to earn a living.

The 40-year-old grows spinach and radish in one bigha of land, and sells his harvest at a kitchen market. Over the last one week, he earned around Tk 500 everyday.

"I am expecting to sell vegetables worth Tk 30,000 this year," Jalil told The Daily Star yesterday.

He hopes that things will be even better when the United Nations begins humanitarian operations in Bhasan Char. On December 3 last year, Jalil arrived on the remote

island in the first batch of Rohingyas from the crowded camps in Ukhia and Teknaf, the world's largest refugee settlement. The government relocated them to provide them with a better life and livelihood. Another reason behind the relocation was to reduce the pressure on the Rohingya camps.

The government has so far relocated around 19,000 Rohingyas in multiple phases. Initially, the UN was not involved with the humanitarian support programme in Bhasan Char. But the UN recently signed a MoU with the government to extend support.

Bangladesh Navy developed the island under a Tk 3,100-crore housing project.

Ali Akbar, another Rohingya man, said, "Everything is almost settled now. Since the UN is coming here, we will SEE PAGE 5 COL 5

ON THE WAR FRONT The Mitro Bahini (India-Bangladesh Joint Command) swung into action against Pakistan today. The air force of

the Joint Command bombed Dhaka, Chittagong, Narayanganj, Chandpur, Jessore, Syedpur and Lalmonirhat. The Indian Air Force strafed and bombed eight West Pakistani airfields including Sargoda, and two near Rawalpindi and

The navy of Mitro Bahini pounded Chittagong and Cox's Bazar and destroyed two ships. Two ships were captured on the sea. An air'and'sea blockade had been set up to prevent the Pakistani troops in East Pakistan from being resupplied or reinforced from

The rail link at Akhaura was cut. Several towns in East Pakistan fell to Mitro Bahini's hands. Fighting was continuing near Jessore, Satkhira and elsewhere. In the Western sector of India, there was fierce fighting in Husseinwalla.

Earlier this morning, Lt Gen Jagjit Singh Aurora, general officer commanding in chief of the Indian and Bangladesh forces in the Eastern Theatre, said at a briefing for newsmen: "My aim is to make the Pakistan armed forces surrender ... to get Bangladesh to have their own type of government.

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Dinajpur girl fights for life after rape

Parents say they rescued her while she was hanging

A seven-year-old girl has been fighting for life after she got raped and hanged from the ceiling of her home in a village in Birol, Dinajpur, said her family members and police.

She is being treated at the ICU of a hospital in the district.

The girl was at home alone on Thursday afternoon. Her parents returned home around 5:00pm, about two hours after they left, and found her hanging from the ceiling with a rope tied to her neck, her father told The Daily Star yesterday.

The family members rescued her and rushed her to Birol Upazila Health Complex from where she was referred to a more advanced hospital.

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Post-conquest Aztec altar found in Mexico City



Sometime after Hernan Cortes conquered the Aztec capital of Tenochtitlan in modern-day Mexico City in 1521, an indigenous household that survived the bloody Spanish invasion arranged an altar including incense and a pot with human ashes.

The remains of that elaborate display have been unearthed by archaeologists near what is today Garibaldi Plaza, famed for its revelry and mariachi music, Mexico's culture ministry said on Tuesday.
