### PM asks Murad to quit by today

Minister Sheikh Hasina has asked State Minister for Information and Broadcasting Murad Hassan to resign from the cabinet for his offensive and derogatory remarks on women that sparked waves of criticism.

"The prime minister has asked him to step down from his post within 24 hours," Obaidul Quader, road transport and bridges minister and also general secretary of the ruling Awami League, reporters last night.

"The prime minister gave this directive when I talked

with her this evening," he said, adding that he has conveyed the message to the state minister at 8:00pm. The directive came as outrage continued to pour in over the

comments Murad made during an online interview and also during a phone conversation with two film actors.

Women's rights activists, political leaders, lawyers and a cross section of people deplored the remarks terming those indecent, vulgar, racist, and misogynist. They demanded his immediate removal from the cabinet and legal action against him.

During an interview on Facebook page NahidRains Pictures, the state minister made some offensive comments on BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia, acting chairman Tarique Rahman and his daughter Zaima Rahman. It was on December 1.

# Focus should be on trade, connectivity

Says Hasina on Friendship Day; Modi reassures of expanding relations

Mentioning that the Bangladesh-India relationship is anchored in history and culture, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the two countries now should concentrate on people-to-people contact, trade, business and connectivity as the issues became increasingly important for the two sides.

She said this in her video message screened at a programme marking Maitri Diwas (Friendship Day).

Indian Council of World Affairs arranged the event in New Delhi yesterday on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of India-Bangladesh Diplomatic Relations as India recognised Bangladesh on December 6,

Hasina said the relationship between the two countries is anchored in history, culture, language and shared values of secularism, democracy, and countless other commonalities. "Our bonds of friendship have further been strengthened, diversified





and expanded in recent years due to regular high-level political interactions and exchanges.'

#### A retreat from '71 commitments

Prof Rehman Sobhan points to absence of unqualified freedom of expression

For expression of dissent there should be unqualified freedom to express oneself, and not having this is a significant retreat from the commitments made during the time of the country's liberation, Prof Rehman Sobhan, chairman of Centre for Policy Dialogue, said yesterday.

"The capture of our electoral institutions by the business elite, the dominance of money and force in our electoral contestation have further moved us away from Bangabandhu's vision of a just democratic order where the voices of the less privileged members of society could be clearly heard in our institutions of governance," he said.

Prof Sobhan was speaking at the inaugural session of a four-day international conference, organised by CPD and the South Asia Program, Cornell University, to mark 50 years of Bangladesh. He said much of the gains of the country in the last 50

years have eroded because of an unjust governance system and the inability of the state to enforce law. Economic and social injustice is also compounded by

a decline in democracy as manifested in the weakening credibility of the electoral process, erosion in the freedom of the media and unfair access to public services, he said at the virtual conference.

## Rain brings fear, tears

Officials and experts said this untimely rain will have an impact on winter

Department of Agricultural Extension (DAE) officials said they have been collecting information on the damage to crops and it will take some time to get a full picture.

Officials said currently the crops being cultivated are Aman paddy, potato, onion, lentil, various vegetables, maize and wheat.

Depression formed over the Bay of Bengal has triggered incessant rains for the last two days across the country.

560 Model Mosque Project

#### Rise in cost, delay by 3yrs

The government is set to extend the duration and budget for constructing 560 model mosques-cum-Islamic cultural centres all over the country for the second time by another

The development means the cost of the project, which was taken up in 2017 with the view to promoting Islamic values and culture in the country, will increase 8.17 percent now.

The project, which will be implemented by the Bangladesh Islamic Foundation, will now cost Tk 9,435 crore and end in June 2024.

The proposal for the amended project cost and duration will be placed at today's meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council.

At the time of taking up the project, 90 percent of the estimated Tk 9,062.4 crore outlay were supposed to come as a grant from Saudi Arabia. But after waiting for more than a year, the foreign

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
