Murad Quits As State Minister

Now facing party action

President accepts resignation letter; district AL relieves him from duties



Move for disciplinary action in AL's next central committee meeting

HC orders removal of audio, video of Murad's abusive comments from social media

Murad Hassan yesterday resigned as the state minister for information and broadcasting amid severe backlash for his misogynistic and sexually abusive remarks, while Jamalpur Awami League recommended his removal from his district unit post. He is also on the verge of losing primary membership of the party as a

decision on disciplinary action will also be taken against the Jamalpur-4 lawmaker at the next AL central working committee meeting. The party's Jamalpur district unit yesterday relieved Murad from the

duties of health and population affairs secretary for denting party image, breaching party discipline and carrying out anti-organisational activities. The unit also recommended the AL central working committee take a "final decision" in this regard, said a press release.

Same drain, same danger

Child goes missing in Chattogram

A 12-year-old boy has been missing since falling into a drain in Chattogram on Monday -- the third incident in just over three months of people dying or disappearing following a fall into open drains in the port city.

On September 28, the body of 19-yearold university student Sehrin Mahbub Sadia was recovered after she had fallen into a roadside drain the previous day.

The drain where 12-year-old Kamal fell into on Monday afternoon -- at Sholashahar Railway Station area under Panchlaish Police Station -- is the same one in which 55-year-old vegetable trader Saleh Ahmed had fallen into on August 25, near Muradpur intersection.

Saleh has since been missing despite a sevenday rescue operation by

AL in a spot of bother

Infighting, scandals embarrassing party high-ups

While the ruling Awami League is grappling with divisions and disputes over the union parishad polls, controversial activities of some leaders have severely embarrassed the party as well as the

Bloody clashes between supporters of AL candidates and party rebels in the polls have already become a headache for the top party leadership as such conflicts continued to take place in the staggered elections despite repeated warnings and punitive actions.

The intra-party feuds, especially among the supporters of lawmakers and district-thana level leaders, are considered by the AL high-ups as serious organisational problems. Those incidents also manifested a lack of chain of command in the party.

On top of it, unruly and violent activities of some Chhatra League leaders and activists also remain a cause for concern for the AL highcommand. At least three educational institutions had to be shut down following incidents involving BCL, a pro-Awami League student body.

To aggravate the situation, some leaders of AL, which is not facing any major opposition in parliament or on the streets, have got embroiled in controversies, causing further embarrassment to the party.

Over the last couple of months, these leaders made different types of

comments. Some of them are accused of insulting religion, while others are accused of making derogatory comments about Bangabandhu Sheikh SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

Even with the students' movement for road safety continuing across the country, the numbers of

accidents and victims are still rising as another university student was killed in Noakhali

yesterday. With this, at least seven students were killed on the road over the past 15 days.

In Noakhali, a lorry hit a CNG-run auto ricksȟaw from behind around 12:30pm yesterday. The auto rickshaw was carrying passengers, including Ajay Majumder, a third-year student of Department of Information Sciences and Library Management of Noakhali Science and Technology University

AIR FARE TO MIDDLE EAST

Migrants priced out

Fares in cases more than doubled since last month

Airfares for flights to different Middle Eastern countries have doubled since last month, adding pressure on migrant workers returning to their workplaces. In November, airfares for different

Middle Eastern countries were between Tk 40,000 and Tk 45,000. At present, the prices are between Tk 70,000 and Tk 90,000, which is totally illogical and unexpected, said Bangladeshi expatriates. Amid this situation, the Association

of Travel Agents of Bangladesh (Atab) yesterday demanded that the government forms a regulatory board immediately to address the issue.

At a press briefing at a city hotel, Atab leaders said thousands of Bangladeshi expatriate workers couldn't return to their workplaces in different Middle Eastern countries on time due to the high airfares.

Monsur Ahmed Kalam, president, Atab, a platform of around 3,500 registered travel agency, said, at present the airfare for the Dhaka-Dubai or Dhaka-Abu Dhabi route is Tk 87,000, which was Tk 40,000 just last month.

He also said airfare for Dhaka-Muscat route is Tk 72,000, which was Tk 35,000 a few months ago.

The airfares for Riyadh, Jeddah and



Madina from Dhaka were between Tk 42,000 and 45,000. Now, they are between Tk 75,000 and Tk 80,000, said Atab leaders.

Giving a comparison of airfare between Bangladesh and its neighboring countries for Riyadh, Fakhrul Islam, president of the Recruiting Agency Welfare Organization of Bangladesh, yesterday told The Daily Star that the fare for the Colombo-Riyadh route is Tk 38,000, while for the Nepal-Riyadh route, it is around Tk 45,000.

He also said airfare for Mumbai-Riyadh route is around Tk 32,000.

Meanwhile, a Bangladeshi passenger needs to spend around Tk 80,000 to Tk 85,000 to go to Riyadh, said Fakhrul.

He also said in some cases, the airfare for Dhaka-Riyadh route goes up to Tk 1

Pakistan off-spinner Sajid Khan's maiden six-wicket haul yesterday made things interesting in the ongoing second Test as Bangladesh need 25 more runs to avoid follow-on on the final day of the game at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur today.

A horrible batting display saw the Tigers reeling at 76 for seven at stumps on the fourth day.

Despite rain washing out almost two days' play, the game now awaits an exciting finish, thanks to some irresponsible batting by the hosts.

Following a delayed start to the fourth days' play, Mohammad Rizwan and Fawad Alam struck unbeaten fifties as Pakistan declared their first innings after scoring 300 for four before tea.

Pakistan skipper Babar Azam took the challenge of continuing with spinners when bad light forced him from employing pacers at the latter stage of the day's play. SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

6 Bangladeshis named in Pandora Papers

Six Bangladeshi nationals have been found to hold shell companies in the tax haven British Virgin Islands, as per the latest release from the Pandora Papers, the biggest trove of leaked offshore data yet.

The names include Nihad Kabir, president of Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Sakina Miraly, a director of Ambee Pharmaceuticals, Mohammad Bhai, former chairman of Olympic Industries, and Manzurul Islam, chairman of Eastern Housing.

Sayedul Huda Chowdhury, the editor-in-chief of defunct primenews.com.bd and Prime Khobor, was also named in the release on December 6. Chowdhury is the brother of Mohammad Saiful Huda Chowdhury Shatil, a director of Masafi Group and a BNP leader in Munshiganj.

One Anita Rani Bhowmik of Chawkbazar was named as the beneficiary of Anteris Holdings, but no references were

The disclosure comes at a time when the High Court has cranked up the pressure on the Anti-Corruption Commission, the Criminal Investigation Department and the Bangladesh Financial Intelligence Unit to take action against those named in the Panama and Paradise Papers, the precursors to Pandora Papers. BNP leader Abdul Awal Mintoo and his family,

controversial manpower exporter Moosa bin Shamsher, United Group's four founding directors, Baraka Patenga Power's director Faisal Ahmed Chowdhury, Brummer & Partners Asset Management (Bangladesh) among others were mentioned in the Panama and Paradise Papers.

The latest release under the Pandora Papers does not specify whether those named had dodged taxes or broke their home countries' laws while opening the shell companies.
