#### ROAD SAFETY Cops foil hunger strike by students

Police have foiled the hunger strike by agitating students demanding half fare at all public transport across the country and safe roads yesterday.

Witnesses said a group of students gathered inside the Jatiya Press Club under the banner of "General Students" around 12:15pm and started marching towards the secretariat from

Around 12:30pm, the agitating students assembled in front of gate-2 of the secretariat to hold their pre-announced programme, when police came in to remove them from the spot and snatched their banners.

Later, police brought them back in front of the press club. At that time, students were shouting slogans in favour of their nine-point demand to ensure half fare, road safety and justice for the victims.

One of the students --Mohidul Islam -- said, "We have rejected the gazette notification on half bus fare. We demand half fare at buses, train, launch and metro rail without any condition." According to Mohidul, police didn't allow them to hold the hunger strike in front of the secretariat, saying that there was "VVIP movement" in

## Why illegal 3-wheelers still on the roads?

HC directs authorities to take action

The High Court yesterday directed authorities concerned to locate illegal three-wheelers plying across the country and take necessary steps to remove them from the roads.

The court also issued a rule asking authorities to explain why their inaction to halt import and local production of illegal three-wheelers should not be declared illegal, Deputy Attorney General Amit Dasgupta told The Daily Star.

Secretaries at the ministries of industries; road, transport and bridges; environment, forest and climate change; executive chairperson of Bangladesh Investment of Revenue; and inspector general of police remains the same. have been made respondents to the rule.

The HC bench of Justice Mamnoon

Rahman and Justice Khandakeı Diliruzzaman issued the order and rule, following a writ petition filed by Kazi

Zashimul Islam, president of Bagha

Automobiles Ltd, seeking necessary

directives on the issue. Citing the petition, petitioner's lawyer Atique Towhidul Islam said easy-bikes, illegal three-wheelers that are powered by recycled lead-acid batteries, are not approved by Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology and are not registered under BIDA.

The government does not get revenue from easy-bikes, and such vehicles pose risks to public health, he said.

# A piece of furniture, a piece of history

Tales of the table where surrender document of Liberation War was signed

At first glance, it doesn't look much different from any other table. In fact, you or someone you know may own one bearing the very same design.

But the table kept at Shahbagh's Bangladesh National Museum is unlike any other in the entire world. Indeed, for Bangladeshis, it bears witness to one of the most significant events in the country's history. On December 16, 1971, General Amir Abdullah Khan Niazi signed the surrender document of the war on behalf of the Pakistan army on top of

Today, it occupies a special place at the museum. Complete with a caption stand, it always pulls in the eyes of the visitors by its sheer historical significance, for the table does not bear any noteworthy aesthetic element.

Coming in at three by one-and-ahalf feet, it features a wave-like pattern

on the top and two cleaved lines on

legs that gradually narrow as they

reach the bottom.

a hurry. Although representatives of both the Allied Forces and the Pakistan Army were there, no table to sign the surrender document was available. As there were no furniture shops or offices nearby, the table and two chairs were brought in from Dhaka Club.

The table was later collected by the personal efforts of then Dhaka Museum -- now Bangladesh National Museum -- Chief Executive Firoz

"Later on, Dhaka Club recognised the table as one of theirs," he said.

Firoz recounted to correspondent his journey of recovering the table. "The day after the army surrendered [December 17], I went to the Racecourse. I didn't go there to collect the table. I went there just to see the spot where the surrender took place. But I did ask around for the table, but left after I couldn't find

"Around January, 1972, I suddenly heard that the table was in the History tells us that arrangements possession of a Dhaka University for the signing programme at the then staffer. Without delay, I rushed there Ramna Racecourse, now rechristened and found it at the Dhaka University

Suhrawardy Udyan, was done in staff welfare association's office, which was beside the Shaheed Sergeant Zahurul Haq Hall.'

> "Its possessor wasn't a staffer, but a young man. After I asked him where he found it, he confirmed that he collected it from the Ramna Racecourse on December 17 early dawn," Firoz recalled.

> "After I told him of its historical significance, he finally softened and promised to hand it over once his exams ended in May. He kept his "As soon as I got it, I brought it

> back to the museum. However, I could never find the chairs where the signatories of both parties sat during the surrender programme," Firoz said.

> A year after its recovery, the table started being exhibited at the National Museum since May 12, 1973, where it stands to this day. Meanwhile, a replica is put up for display at Suhrawardy Udyan's Museum of Independence.
