Lewy eyes another milestone

Bayern Munich striker Robert Lewandowski can achieve another milestone on Friday in his club's last game of 2021 as the Bundesliga leaders look to extend Wolfsburg's miserable six-match losing

With another goal, Lewandowski can claim a new record for most goals scored in German league football during a calendar

He scored twice in Tuesday's rout of Stuttgart to draw level with Gerd Mueller, who scored a record 42 goals over 12 months back in 1972.

Lewandowski loves to score against Wolfsburg, netting 23 goals in 15



games against Wolves, the most he has scored against any club in Germany's top

That tally includes the five Lewandowski hit in nine jaw-dropping minutes when he came off the bench to steer Bayern to a 5-1 victory and claim a host of records in September

Bayern are buoyed by winning the last six games in all competitions, including beating secondplaced Bundesliga rivals Dortmund, then Barcelona to seal a perfect six wins from six Champions League group stage games.

Patience, fortune put Australia on top

A day that began chaotically ended on a high note for Australia, who take

commanding position in Adelaide via patient top order knocks and a slice of late luck.

The good fortune offered England by Australia's unexpected loss of captain Pat Cummins to pandemic protocols proved shortlived as Marnus Labuschagne and David Warner combined again to put their team into a position of strength after day one of the

Warner fell short of his century but Labuschagne remained on course for a hundred.

221-2 despite being jolted before the start of the match at Adelaide Oval with Cummins forced out after being identified as a close contact of a positive COVID-19 case. With five overs remaining, Jos Buttler dropped a regulation catch off the bowling of James Anderson to offer a reprieve to Labuschagne,

who remained not out on 95. Buttler had earlier spilled a tougher chance behind the stumps when Labuschagne was on 21.

England dominated the first session though they blew two reviews trying to get Warner, who made 95, dismissed.

Warner said nothing could deter him from going out to face the old enemy despite the injury to his ribs sustained in the first test in more than once, said of Buttler's

Australia finished day one on Brisbane, which left him unable to costly mistake. pick up his children.

"I didn't feel great," he said. "I had a couple of painkillers and a local (injection) this morning. You have got to put your best foot forward." Warner looked destined for his 25th Test century as he began to open his bat, but fell in the nervous 90s for the second Test in a row, caught by Broad off Ben Stokes. Labuschagne almost did the same, also on 95, when wicketkeeper Jos Buttler dropped a sitter off Anderson -- much to the delight of the partisan crowd.

There's a bit of disbelief -- it is my job to capitalise on that now, I gave him a chance... I've got to make sure tomorrow no chances,' Labuschagne, who rode his luck

Labuschagne hung on to the close of play, surviving 275 balls to remain unbeaten, while Steve Smith -- captaining the team in the absence of Cummins -- was 18 not out in front of 32,328 fans. Smith became his country's third captain - after Tim Paine and Cummins - in the last three Tests.

Broad took 1-34 while Anderson bowled a very tidy 18 overs for 29. "I thought we stuck at it well but they played particularly well in the first two sessions," said England assistant coach Graham Thorpe.

"But we would have obviously loved to have more wickets down. It's not a case of feeling sorry for ourselves, we just need to do very similar things tomorrow,"

CA defends protocols after **Cummins scratched**

Cricket Australia has defended its biosecurity protocols after captain Pat Cummins was forced to withdraw from the second Ashes test in Adelaide on Thursday for being a close contact of a COVID-19 case. Cummins was ruled out of the day-night clash after dining in the same restaurant as the positive case on Wednesday night and must isolate for seven days.

His absence from the match is a big blow to Australia's hopes of extending their lead in the five-test series after winning the opener in Brisbane. Cricket Australia boss Nick Hockley said the 28-year-old had done nothing wrong and was acting within the protocols set by its medical team.

"We have protocols that flex according to risk levels of each jurisdiction," Hockley told reporters at Adelaide Oval. "We are looking at them every single day. We are comfortable with the protocols with what they are for SA (South Australia).

'We don't want to completely lock down the players, we want to take a proportionate approach, we are very conscious of their mental wellbeing.

The only limit on Australia's players in Adelaide are that they head out in public in small groups.

Smith, Boucher and De Villiers showed racial prejudice: ombudsman

South African cricket legends Graeme Smith, Mark Boucher and AB de Villiers were all found to have engaged in racially

prejudiced conduct in a report by an independent ombudsman released on Wednesday. Cricket South Africa made public a

235-page interim report by Advocate Dumisa Ntsebeza, who headed a Social Justice and Nation Building Commission to investigate allegations of racial discrimination in South African cricket. CSA board chairman Lawson Naidoo said the board would study the report and would "engage with it and its recommendations".

Ntsebeza found that former Test captain Smith's appointment as CSA's director of cricket was irregular, although he did not attribute this racial discrimination. But he

was critical of Smith's decision to appoint Boucher as head coach of the national team ahead of Enoch Nkwe, a black coach who served briefly as national team director, which he found was not in accordance with the organisation's human resources policy.



'Mr Smith and CSA failed to rebut the presumption of unfair discrimination in the appointment of Mr Boucher ahead of Mr Nkwe," according to the report. Smith was also accused of racial discrimination, along with other CSA and team officials, when he was captain

of the Test team in England in 2012. Following an injury to Boucher,

leading batsman De Villiers was selected as wicketkeeper ahead of Thami Tsolekile, a specialist wicketkeeper. "The (ombudsman) is persuaded by the argument that CSA, its coaches and selectors unfairly disadvantaged against Mr Tsolekile on the basis of his race."

De Villiers was also found to have resisted the selection of Khaya Zondo, a black batsman, when he was South Africa's one-day international captain ahead of a series-deciding match in India in 2015.

Dean Elgar, a late replacement for the one-day games, was picked ahead of Zondo, who was part of the original squad for the series.

Boucher was accused by former teammate Paul Adams of leading a song in after-match fines meetings in which Adams was referred to as a "brown

Injured Pliskova ruled out of Australian Open



Wimbledon finalist Karolina Pliskova will miss the Australian Open in January after breaking her forearm in training,

her husband and manager Michal

Hrdlicka said on Thursday. "Karolina broke her radius... in a fitness room at a training camp in Spain," Hrdlicka said in a statement, adding that treatment would take

about four weeks. "Unfortunately I will be out for a while and will not compete at my favourite tournaments in Australia,' the 29-year-old Pliskova said on Facebook.

"Some days are worse than others... but time and belief can heal everything," added the world number four, posing for a photo with her right forearm in a bandage.

Pliskova has yet to win a Grand Slam tournament, having reached the 2016 US Open final and then lost in three sets to Ashleigh Barty in the Wimbledon final this year.
