Environment continues to worsen

Report says civil society bodies in Bangladesh subject to strict control

Civil society organisations working on democracy, good governance, and human rights last year were subject to strict control by the regulatory authorities and various types of bureaucratic harassment in Bangladesh, says a global index report.

The overall sustainability of the organisations deteriorated slightly, according to the 2020 Civil Society Organizations Sustainability Index, Bangladesh.

The legal environment governing CSOs deteriorated slightly in 2020. CSOs continued to face prolonged registration and renewal processes and bureaucratic delays throughout 2020, and Covid-19 restrictions increasingly limited civic space and CSOs' ability to operate," it reads.

Besides, they were increasingly engaged in selfcensorship to avoid clashes with the government, according to the report by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID).

"As in previous years, the government continued to use the DSA [Digital Security Act] to severely limit freedom of expression, thereby impacting CSOs' ability to exercise their freedom of speech, criticise the government, or engage in advocacy.

The report was launched in an international event held virtually on Thursday night. Seventy-three countries were SEE PAGE 5 COL 5

Bangladesh lost \$8.27b a year to misinvoicing

The country lost \$8.27 billion every year on average between 2009 and 2018 resulting from misinvoicing of values of imported and exported goods by traders to evade taxes and illegally move money across international borders, the Global Financial Integrity (GFI) said on Thursday.

The average loss of customs and taxes was 17.3 percent of Bangladesh's trade with all its trading partners during ears, said the GFI in its latest report, "Trade-Related Illicit Financial Flows in 134 Developing Countries 2009-

The Washington-based think tank did not provide data on trade misinvoicing on Bangladesh after 2015.

The report comes at a time when illegal money transfer through various channels, including under and over invoicing of internationally-traded goods, are believed to be rampant in the country due to alleged collusion between dishonest customs officials and traders.

The GFI report did not have year-wise data on Bangladesh for 2014, 2016, 2017 and 2018.

The Daily Star emailed GFI Communications Coordinator Lauren Anikis about the reason. No reply came until this report was filed last night.

JAPAN CLINIC BLAZE

At least 24 killed

Arson suspected as man seen with bag leaking liquid



At least 24 people were killed after a blaze gutted a mental health clinic in a commercial building in the Japanese city he then kicked over to ignite. of Osaka yesterday, local media said, with police reportedly considering it a possible arson case.

The fire broke out mid-morning and raged for half an hour on the fourth floor of the clinic, which also provided general medical care.

The clinic's charred interior was visible through burnt-out window frames as firefighters put up a tarpaulin to block the scene from view.

Public broadcaster NHK and other major Japanese media said 24 people had died, citing local police, who did not immediately confirm the toll.

Earlier yesterday, an Osaka fire

department official feared 27 people had perished in the blaze. In Japan, only a doctor can officially certify a death.

"The municipal fire department is investigating the cause of the fire. I have received a report that Osaka police is investigating the fire as possible arson," regional governor Hirofumi Yoshimura said on Twitter.

Japanese media said a man in his 50s or 60s had allegedly dispersed a liquid to start

Kyodo News, citing police sources, said the man had placed a paper bag containing a flammable liquid next to a heater, which Masakatsu Shinozaki, 74, the owner of

a shop across the street from the building, told AFP he had seen a lot of smoke coming out of the windows.

"I saw a girl shouting for help from the sixth floor, but I didn't realise there were so many people in the building," he said.

"Fire is really scary. It takes away everything. A thief can take away some items. But a fire takes away everything." DARK SMOKE
