Tourist raped in Cox's Bazar

Victim was on holiday with husband, 8-month-old baby; Rab identifies 3 key suspects from CCTV

Rab yesterday identified three young men suspected of raping a tourist while their cohorts held her husband and child hostage in Cox's Bazar on Wednesday evening.

The rape incident at the country's prime tourist destination sparked outrage on social media. Netizens criticised law enforcers for failing to provide safety to tourists.

Rab sources said the suspects identified from CCTV footage are: Ashiqul Islam Ashiq, Israfil Huda Joy, and Mehedi Hasan Babu. All of them are from Madhya Baharchhara in Cox's Bazar town.

The woman, her husband, and their eight-month-old child went to Cox's Bazar on holiday on Wednesday morning from the capital.

They checked into a hotel and went to Laboni Beach in the afternoon, reports our correspondent in the district.

While shopping at a nearby market in the evening, the victim's husband got into an argument with three men, one of whom he had bumped into, the victim told Rab after being rescued.

Her husband at one stage begged pardon

"Later, a group that included the three youths ambushed us near the golf course





area. They threatened to stab me and separated me from my husband and child,"

"They took away my husband and child in a CNG-run auto rickshaw and took me to a secluded place at knifepoint where they raped me. They threatened to kill my husband and child," she added.

She said later the men took her to Zia Guest Inn in an auto-rickshaw and gang raped her again confining her to a room on the second floor.

The rapists then left the room, locking it from the outside. They threatened to kill her husband and child if she disclosed the matter to anyone, the victim said.

The victim managed to open a window of the room and contact a hotel guest who unlocked the door.

After she called 999 and Rab-15, Rab rescued her around 1:30am yesterday.

Ansar Al Islam

Lying low, continues recruitment

Militant outfit Ansar Al Islam has no plan to carry out any attacks right now but its recruitment and training activities are going on in secret.

The hiring and initial training are done online, whereas the advanced training -- for the outfit's military wing -- is given in person in some remote areas of the country, counterterrorism officials told The Daily Star.

Besides, a recent intelligence report shows Ansar Al Islam, said to be the Bangladesh chapter of al-Qaeda in Indian Subcontinent (AQIS), is finalising a list of its targets, but has no plan to launch any attacks now.

The report categorises atheists as their "soft targets", and organisations promoting Hindutva and foreign mission as "hard targets". The Daily Star has obtained a copy of the report. According to the report, Ansar Al Islam, previously called Ansarullah

Bangla Team (ABT), has no plan to attack law enforcers as it believes such attacks will ultimately backfire, leading to a full-throttle crackdown on the organisation, weakening its strength.

Instead, it plans to build dens in the Indo-Bangla border areas to smoothly run its activities. Its ultimate aim is to take control of the Indian sub-continent through Ghazwa-e-Hind (conquest of India), it says. Besides, the outfit sees Kashmir as a possible shelter and the Rohingya

community in Bangladesh as a source for recruitment of new members, the report said. The report also said a group of new Ansar Al Islam recruits tried to go

to Afghanistan and Kashmir through the Chattogram Hill Tracts and Cox's Bazar. It, however, did not mention whether they were successful. Asked about it, officials of the Counter Terrorism and Transnational

Crime (CTTC) unit said they have information that three youths possibly reached Afghanistan. Talking on the issue, CTTC chief Md Asaduzzaman said Ansar Al Islam

has no organisational strength to carry out any attack right now. SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

Khandaker Al Moin, director (media wing) of Rab, said they recovered heroin, phensedyl and yaba

Economic recovery fragile: **CPD**

The economy is recovering from the damages inflicted by the coronavirus pandemic but the revival has remained fragile owing to rising inflation, exchange rate volatility and squeeze in the government's fiscal space, said the Centre for Policy Dialogue

(CPD) yesterday. "Many of key macroeconomic correlates are in the recovery trajectory, led by export-oriented sectors. Regrettably, macroeconomic stability is no longer in a comfortable state," said **CPD Executive Director** Fahmida Khatun. Rising prices of

essentials are hurting the recovery efforts of low-income people, said the think-tank.
