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Luxury boats with ludicrous fire safety

Dozens of luxury launches are carrying hundreds of passengers without adequate fire safety equipment, industry insiders said.

Some of the vessels are equipped with elevators, well-furnished rooms, echo sounders to fathom the depth of water, radars, wifi, radio communication and modern gadgets. But the owners do not invest in fire safety equipment.

"These boats have multiple large engines and countless things that consume electricity. But our fire safety measures are not enough. There is always a risk of fire hazard," said Mujibur Rahman, master of the Sundarban-10.

"There should be large fire extinguishers and hose pipes on each floor of launches. Besides, every member of the crew should have firefighting training every month," he told The Daily Star.

Md Kamaluddin Bhuiyan, deputy director of Fire Service and Civil Defence in Barishal, said construction of every building containing 10 or more floors requires approval from the fire service.

But these vessels are carrying hundreds of people without having to consult the fire service.

The launch owners and crew members are not interested in fire safety training, he said, adding that no fire drill for the crew members took place in the last four years.

Contacted, Barishal Port Officer Mostafizur Rahman said, "We check the lights and the number of crew members. But we are not responsible for checking fire safety."

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Three rows of people carriers, popularly known as Legunas, and another row of buses parked on a street near Golap Shah Mazar in Gulistan make the road practically unusable for other vehicles and motorists. The photo was taken yesterday.

Nine in 10 Covid cases were in Dhaka city

Four Covid-19 patients died and 268 new cases were reported in the 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday.

Ninety-one percent of the cases were in the Dhaka metropolitan area while the rest were from 12 districts including Dhaka, according to a press release from the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

Of the four patients who died during that time, three were in Dhaka and another in Rajshahi division.

The total number of fatalities due to the highly transmissible virus has now risen to 28,060 and the total confirmed cases to 15,83,253.

The death rate was 1.77 percent.

Against a total of 17,072 tests countrywide, the positivity rate was 1.57 percent.

During the past two months, the positivity rate has been below two

Over half return with shattered dreams

BILS shares findings at roundtable

Some 55 percent of 323 female migrant workers' return to the country was either unexpected or forced, says a study by the Bangladesh Institute of Labour Studies.

As many as 22.6 percent of the female migrants returned less than a year of their migration, 17.6 percent between one and two years and 17.3 percent within two to three years. The data was collected between July and December 2020.

Also, 38 percent of the returnees said they were "abused physically" in the destination countries while 52 percent were victims of forced labour, according to the study, which was conducted in 12 upazilas in Chattogram, Jashore and Faridpur.

It further found 60 percent of the returnees were unemployed after their return home.

In terms of social stigma, 52 percent thought a change of social attitude towards them had happened after their return.

BILS shared findings of the report "Social and Economic Reintegration of the Returnee Female Migrant Workers: Success and Sorrows" during a roundtable at The Daily Star Centre yesterday. The report was earlier shared with the media in September.

On average, the returnee's families had Tk 2,378 income-expenditure gap while two out of every three returnees did not have a regular monthly income, said Manirul Islam, lead researcher of BILS.

Also, 61 percent of the returnees had a debt burden of Tk 76,736 each.

In the case of social attitude, 38 percent said they were considered as "low-class" people while 45 percent said they were overlooked or avoided or not invited to social events.

OMICRON THREAT Travel chaos worsens

Over 7,000 flights scrapped globally; China sees 21-month case record

More than 7,000 flights have been canceled worldwide over the Christmas weekend and thousands more delayed, a tracking website reported yesterday, as the highly infectious Omicron variant brings holiday hurt to millions.

Severe weather is compounding the travel chaos in the United States, with storms expected to wreak havoc on roadways in the country's west, though they brought a white Christmas weekend to Seattle and parts of California.

According to Flightaware.com, more than 2,000 flights were canceled yesterday-- including more than 570 originating from, or headed to, US airports. More than 4,000 delays were reported.

Aircrew and ground staff have fallen sick or gone into quarantine after exposure to Covid, forcing Lufthansa, Delta, United Airlines, JetBlue, Alaska Airlines and other carriers to cancel flights during a peak travel period.

More than 2,800 flights were scrubbed around the globe on Saturday, including more than 990 originating from or headed to US airports, with over 8,500 delays. On Friday, there were around 2,400 cancellations and 11,000 delays.

The cancellations added to the frustration for many people eager to reunite with their families over the holidays after last year's Christmas was severely curtailed.

Chinese airlines accounted for the highest number of cancellations, with China Eastern scrapping more than 1,000 flights, over 20 percent of its flight plan, on Friday

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
