# Iran nuclear talks resume in Vienna

Tehran says talks should focus on lifting sanctions, return of US AFP, Tehran

Iran said nuclear talks that are set to resume yesterday in Vienna should focus on lifting sanctions on the Islamic republic and "guarantees" the US will return to the fold.

Negotiations to salvage the 2015 Iran nuclear deal resumed in late November, after a five-month hiatus.

The talks seek to bring back the United States, after it withdrew from the accord in 2018 under president Donald Trump and began imposing sanctions on Iran.

Iran has reported progress in the talks, but European diplomats have warned they are "rapidly reaching the end of the road".

The talks are expected to get underway in the Austrian capital at 6:00 pm (1700 GMT), according to a source close to the negotiations.

Ahead of the resumption, Iran's Foreign Minister Hossein Amir-Abdollahian said the agenda yesterday should be "the issue of guarantees and verification" on the lifting of US sanctions if it returns to the accord.

"The most important thing for us is to reach a point where we can verify that Iranian oil will be sold easily and without any limits, that the money for this oil will be transferred in foreign currency to Iranian bank accounts, and that we will be able to benefit from all the revenues,'

he said, quoted by state news agency IRNA. The opening of the eighth round of the talks involves delegations from Iran and the other countries that remain party to the landmark accord -- Britain, China, France, Germany and Russia.

West fears Iran is trying to make nuclear weapon. On Saturday, Atomic Energy Organization of Iran director Mohammad Eslami said Tehran has no plans to enrich uranium beyond 60 percent, even if the Vienna talks fail.

# Travel chaos mounts

Scrapped flights, resurgent Covid deliver gut punch to holiday season

Holiday travel headaches and safety worries swelled yesterday with thousands of flights cancelled and Omicron cases soaring, as people wrap up Christmas celebrations bruised by a resurgent Covid-19 pandemic.

About 8,300 flights were grounded and tens of thousands more delayed on the weekend -- one of the year's busiest travel periods -- with multiple airlines saying that Omicron spikes caused staffing shortages

Effects rippled worldwide and the hurt has bled into the work week, with more than 2,000 flights cancelled Monday and over 700 more on Tuesday, according to flight tracker FlightAware.

The highly transmissible Omicron strain has sent new cases skyrocketing across the globe, with countries reviving lockdowns and cruise ships returning to port with infected passengers.

France's President Yesterday, Emmanuel Macron will meet officials to discuss new measures to combat Omicron after infections hit recordhigh figures for three consecutive days.

French officials have warned that after a record 100,000 cases were

Still, cases have soared. New York's health department said Covid pediatric hospitalizations have risen four-fold over the past two weeks as Omicron took hold.

In Florida, health officials said new Covid cases spiked to 125,201 for the week ending December 23, four times its previous week's total.

In Israel, a hospital launched a clinical trial yesterday on the impact of a fourth shot of the Pfizer-BioNTech coronavirus vaccine, as the health ministry weighs a national fourth jab rollout.

# **ESCALATING VIOLENCE IN MYANMAR** 'Horrified' UN calls for new year truce

The new United Nations special envoy to Myanmar yesterday said she was "deeply concerned" by escalating violence in the country and called for a new year ceasefire between the military and its opponents.

Nationwide protests against the February coup have been met with a bloody crackdown, with more than 1,300 people killed and over 11,000 arrested, according to a local monitoring group. Diplomatic efforts to resolve the crisis led by the UN and the

Association of Southeast Asian Nations have made little headway so far, with the generals refusing to engage with opponents.

Special envoy Noeleen Heyzer "is deeply concerned by the continued escalation of violence in Kayin State and other parts of Myanmar", she said in her first statement since taking on the role.

She also called for "all parties to... allow humanitarian assistance to be provided to those in need, including those forced to flee the violence", and for all sides to come to a new year ceasefire

On Sunday, a UN official said he was "horrified" by credible reports that at least 35 civilians were killed and their bodies burned in an attack on Christmas Eve in eastern Myanmar, and demanded the government launch an investigation.

Two workers for non-profit group Save the Children remain missing - their vehicle was among several that were attacked and burned in the incident in Kayah state. There have also been fresh clashes in recent days between ethnic rebels and the military in Kayin state -- also known as Karen state -- sending thousands fleeing into neighbouring Thailand.

A junta spokesman told AFP last week that the military had carried out air strikes against Karen National Union fighters and members of local "People's Defence Force" groups that have sprung up to fight back against the putsch.

## Iran, Hezbollah aid Yemen rebel strikes

Says Saudi-led coalition AFP, Riyadh

The Saudi-led coalition yesterday accused Iran and Hezbollah of helping Yemen's Huthi rebels to launch missiles and drones at the kingdom, where two people were killed.

The latest Saudi accusation came as the coalition intensified airstrikes against the Iranbacked Huthis in retaliation for deadly attacks on the kingdom.

Coalition spokesman Turki al-Malki told a news conference the Huthis were "militarising" Sanaa airport and using it as a "main centre for launching ballistic missiles and drones" towards the kingdom.

Malki showed reporters a video clip which he said depicted "the headquarters of Iranian and Hezbollah experts at the airport" where, he alleged, "Hezbollah is training the Huthis to booby-trap and use drones".

#### Sri Lanka shuts three foreign missions as dollar crisis worsens

Sri Lanka yesterday announced the closure of three overseas diplomatic missions in a bid to save foreign currency reserves, as the country's central bank slapped tighter controls on dollars needed to finance essential imports. The Sri Lankan High Commission (embassy) in Nigeria and consulates in Germany and Cyprus will be closed from January in the restructuring, the foreign ministry said. The island's tourism-dependent economy was hammered by the pandemic and the government in March last year imposed a broad import ban to shore up forex reserves, triggering shortages of essential goods such as fuel and sugar. The closure of the three missions came on the same day the Central Bank of Sri Lanka tightened restrictions on foreign currency remittances received by locals. It ordered all commercial banks to hand over a quarter of their dollar earnings to the government, up from 10 percent.

### Weather disasters cost \$20b more than last year: NGO

The ten most expensive weather disasters this year caused more than \$170 billion (150 billion euros) in damage, \$20 billion more than in 2020, a British aid group said yesterday. Each year, UK charity Christian Aid calculates the cost of weather incidents like flooding, fires and heat waves

# **ILLEGAL SETTLEMENT IN OCCUPIED GOLAN** Israel approves plan to double settlers

Israel's government has approved a \$317 million plan to double the Jewish settler population in the Golan Heights, 40 years after it annexed the territory captured from Syria.

Prime Minister Naftali Bennett's cabinet voted in favour of the plan that aims to build 7,300 settler homes in the region over a five-year period, during a meeting held at the Mevo Hama community in the Golan.

It calls for 1 billion Israeli shekels to be spent on housing, infrastructure and other projects with the goal of attracting roughly 23,000 new Jewish settlers to the area, seized during the 1967 Six Day War.

"Our goal today is to double the population of the Golan Heights," the right-wing Bennett said ahead of the meeting.

Around 25,000 Israeli settlers live in the Golan Heights, along with about 23,000 Druze, who remained on the land after Israel seized it.

Israel annexed the territory on December 14, 1981, in a move not recognised by most of the international community.

Former US president Donald Trump granted US recognition to Israeli sovereignty over the Golan in 2019. Shortly after Biden took office in January, his Secretary of State Antony Blinken suggested there were legal questions surrounding Trump's move.

Bennett claimed that after a decade of conflict in Syria, international calls to restore Syrian control of the Golan were muted.





weather disasters caused \$150 billion in damage, making this year's total an increase of 13 percent. The most expensive disaster in 2021 was hurricane Ida, which lashed the eastern United States and caused around \$65 billion in damages. Spectacular and deadly flooding in Germany and Belgium in July was next on the list at \$43 billion in losses. A cold snap and winter storm in Texas that took out the vast state's power grid cost \$23 billion, followed by flooding in China's Henan province in July that cost an estimated \$17.6 billion. Other disasters costing several billion dollars include flooding in Canada, a late spring freeze in France that damaged vineyards, and a cyclone in India and Bangladesh in May.

### Philippines typhoon toll hits 388

The death toll from one of the most destructive typhoons to hit the Philippines in recent years rose to 388 yesterday, the government said, as disease outbreaks threatened some of the stricken areas. Typhoon Rai struck the south and centre of the Asian nation on December 16 and 17, toppling power lines and trees and unleashing deadly floods that also left hundreds of thousands homeless. The civil defence office in Manila said 60 people still remain missing and hundreds injured. The archipelago gets hit by an average of 20 cyclones each year.
