Visiting the spot on Wednesday, this correspondent found the florists there smiling after a long time. This smile went missing during the lockdown of the last two

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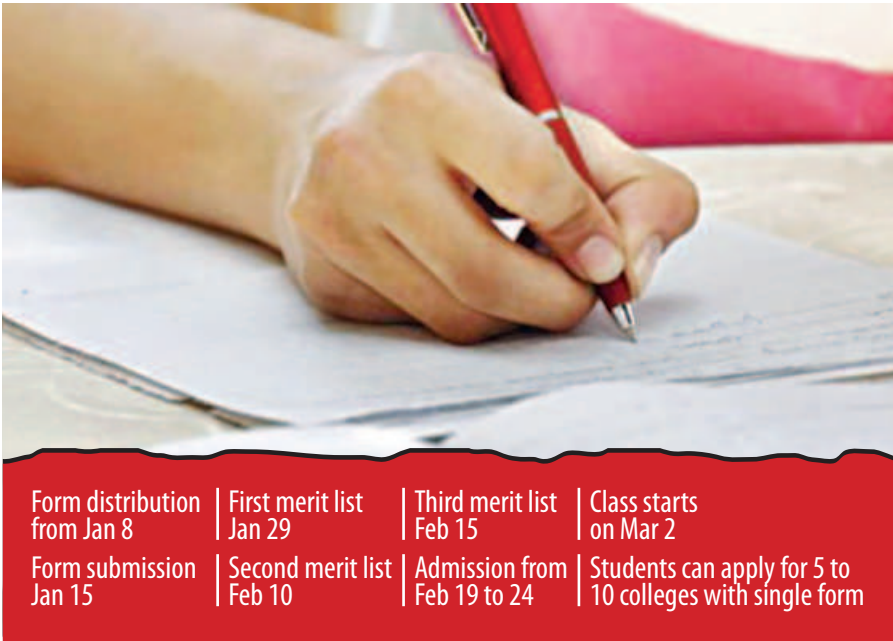

COLLEGE ENROLMENT to start on Jan 8

Online enrolment to Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) and equivalent courses for the academic session 2021-2022 is scheduled to begin from January 8.

Admission forms can be collected and submitted by January 15. Students are required to complete the admission procedure by February 24, and classes will begin on March 2, said Dhaka Education Board Chairman Prof Nehal Ahmed.

"We have finalised the guideline about the enrolment. If the Covid-19 situation worsens and in-person classes stop, academic activities will continue online," he said.

The first merit list will be published on January 29, the second one on February 10 and the third one on February 15.

According to the admission guidelines, each

student can apply to five to 10 colleges with a single form. Admission details will be uploaded to a website.

The admission guideline said that colleges under monthly pay order benefit in Dhaka will be allowed to take admission and session charges up to Tk 5,000, while metropolitan colleges can take fees up to Tk 3,000. Colleges from districts are allowed to collect Tk 2,000 as fees from each student.

Colleges that are not under monthly pay order benefit in Dhaka will be allowed to take Tk 7,500 as admission and session charge. Such colleges from other metropolitan cities can take Tk 5000 as the fees, and colleges in districts can take Tk 3,000 from each student.

A tougher competition awaits admission aspirants for renowned colleges, but there will be no crisis of seats, according to Prof Nehal.

Looking back at 2021's noteworthy judgments

Several important cases, which went on for years, were disposed of in Dhaka's lower courts in 2021, amid the pandemic.

Judgments for murder cases of bloggers Faisal Arefin Dipan and Avijit Roy, LGBT rights activists Xulhaz Mannan and Mahbub Rabbi Tonoy, and Buet student Abrar Fahad were much-talked about.

The graft case of former chief justice SK Sinha was also in the public eye.

On February 10, Anti-Terrorism Special Tribunal sentenced eight members of banned militant group Ansar al-Islam to death for killing Faisal Arefin Dipan.

Dipan, publisher of Jagriti Prokashani, was stabbed to death at his Shahbagh office on October 31, 2015.

The same tribunal on February 16 sentenced five members of Ansar al-Islam to death and another to life in jail for killing Avijit Roy.

On February 26, 2015, assailants attacked US-based Bangladeshi blogger Avijit Roy and his wife Rafida Ahmed Bonyia with sharp weapons near TSC on Dhaka University campus, when the couple was walking out of Ekushey Boi Mela.

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JP'S 36TH FOUNDING ANNIVERSARY

On mission to recover its image

Jatiya Party is celebrating its 36th founding anniversary today. Amid this celebration, however, it is planning to recover from an image crisis, as according to party leaders, it failed to act as the main opposition in parliament.

Founded in 1986 by late military ruler HM Ershad, the party has been acting as the main opposition in parliament since the 2014 parliamentary election.

But even after eight years of playing this role, JP leaders say they could not act as an opposition in and outside parliament, while people consider it to be an "ally" of the government.

Amid this crisis, JP's top leaders said restoring the party's image, and thus, restoring people's trust in the party will be its main challenge this year.

"We will work for the sake of the people in the days to come. We won't work for Awami League or BNP. Our politics will be people-centric," Jatiya Party Chairman GM Quader told The Daily Star yesterday.

Recently, JP's new secretary general said the party leaders are praising the government so much that people consider them to be allies of Awami League.

Asked about the image crisis, GM Quader said people bear this idea as Jatiya Party had done politics together with Awami League under the same platform for a long time, and the ruling party came to power several times with support of JP.

"Jatiya Party had also participated in the different national elections under the electoral alliance with Awami League. That's why people have the wrong idea about us," GM Quader commented.

He claimed that Jatiya Party is doing everything it should be doing as the opposition party in and outside the parliament.



DIGITAL SECURITY ACT

Include media, civil society while amending law: TIB

Welcoming the law minister's remarks about amending Digital Security Act (DSA), Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) yesterday demanded incorporating representatives from media and civil society in the committee formed to review and amend the law.

Although Law Minister Anisul Huq was late to admit that the act was misused, TIB is cautiously welcoming his statement, said a press release.

TIB demanded inclusion of the mentioned representatives to review whether the law is conflicting with human rights. The graft watchdog said not only journalists, but common people should also not be arrested immediately after cases are filed under DSA.

Referring to media reports, TIB said the law minister admitted to the misuse and abuse of DSA and mentioned the government's initiative to ensure its best use by following global practices.

TIB Executive Director Dr Iftekharuzzaman said the government's good sense was illustrated by the minister's statement, which mentioned reviewing sections that undermine freedom of expression and dissent.

From the beginning of DSA's enactment, the media and civil society objected to several sections of the act.

BNP not successful as political party: Quader

Road Transport and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader yesterday said BNP did not have any success as a political party in the last several years, rather they have failed to wage any movement.

BNP has been rejected by people during the polls, and its only "achievement" is failing to wage any movement, said Quader, also general secretary of Awami League, while addressing a press briefing held at his official residence.

Rejecting BNP secretary-general Mirza Fakhrul Islam's statement, Quader said nothing will happen through their initiatives, as people now know BNP for its "injudicious" politics.
