10 new cases raise Omicron spectre

Cabinet discusses Covid spike; experts urge immediate curbs

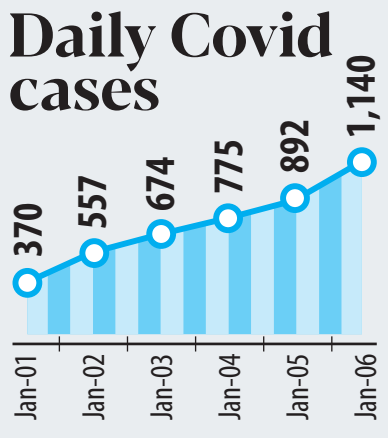

The government considers stepping up vaccine campaign, lowering the age limit for booster doses and preventing gathering of unvaccinated people at public places to contain the spike of Covid cases.

It also considers not allowing anyone to enter restaurants and shopping malls and board buses and trains without vaccine certificates.

Besides, it will make receiving at least one dose of a Covid vaccine mandatory for school children above 12 to attend classes in person.

The steps were discussed at the cabinet meeting, chaired by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, yesterday when the country witnessed a 27.8 percent increase in daily coronavirus



cases. The Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) has logged 1,140 fresh cases, saying the positivity rate rose to

4.86 percent.

Besides, 10 new Omicron cases were reported yesterday, taking the confirmed total number to 20, according to Germany-based global database GISAID.

In such a situation, an expert has warned that the Omicron variant would spread at the community level if health rules are not followed immediately and strictly.

Talking to The Daily Star, Prof Tahmina Shirin, director of the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR), said, "We are detecting new Omicron cases every day [through genome sequencing]. Contact tracing does not suggest that the variant has started community transmission, but it will soon."

Murad's wife calls 999

Says disgraced ex-state minister tortured her, files general diary

Murad Hassan's wife Jahanara Ehsan yesterday filed a general diary accusing him of torturing and threatening to kill her.

The wife of the disgraced former state minister for information and broadcasting called the national emergency hotline in the afternoon seeking police's help, said Saiful Islam, inspector (investigation) of Dhanmondi Police Station.

Ten police officials rushed to their home in Dhanmondi around 3:15pm, he said. Later, Jahanara filed the GD with the police station.

In the diary, Jahanara said she has been married to Murad for 19 years and has two children with him. She alleged that she was tortured both physically and mentally by her husband. He even threatened to kill her, she said.

Bike numbers and RISK RISING

40pc without licence; riders flouting rules, lacking training make roads more prone to crash

With the country witnessing a sharp rise in the number of motorcycles over the last several years, around 40 percent of bikers are riding the two-wheelers without licences, making roads more prone to accidents.

Some 50.13 lakh vehicles have got registered with Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) till last year since the Independence -- 35 lakh among those motorcycles.

BRTA issued licences to 21.28 lakh motorcycles so far, meaning 13.72 lakh bikers or 39.21 percent do not have licences.

There are many bikes, especially in the district and upazila levels, which are not registered at all, meaning the number of bikers without licences could be greater, sector insiders said.

Besides, the bikers lacking training, manoeuvring and violating traffic rules often result in road crashes, leading to deaths and injuries, say experts.

"There is a direct link between the number of motorcycles and road accidents. If the number of bikes increases further, road crashes would increase too, for sure," Prof Hadiuzzaman, director of the Accident Research Institute (ARI) of Buet, told The Daily Star on Monday.
