The Covid curbs are back five months after relaxation as the government looks to stem the tide of Covid-19 cases that can potentially cripple the economy and overwhelm hospitals once again.

On the day that the country announced the highest number of Covid-19 cases in four months, the cabinet division issued a notice with an 11-point directive for public movement from January 13.

No social, religious or political gatherings and rallies at open places are allowed until further notice.

Mask wear is mandatory in all public places, including shops, markets, shopping centres, restaurants, offices and courts. Mobile courts will be operated countrywide to penalise violations of the health guidelines.

Bus, launch and train must

operate at half capacity. The authority concerned will issue a specific notice on the matter along with the date the restriction will take effect. Drivers and their assistants in vehicles must provide proof of vaccination.

To dine at restaurants, a vaccine certificate must be furnished, while students aged 12 years and above will not be allowed to attend classes in-person unless they are vaccinated after January 15.

No visitors will be allowed at airports. All international arrivals SEE PAGE 2 COL 6

No 'crossfire' deaths since **US** sanctions

No "gunfight" took place in the country between law enforcers and criminals since December 10 last when the United States imposed human rightsrelated sanctions on the Rapid Action Battalion and seven of its top officials.

Before December 10, killing of people in "shootouts" had become a regular occurrence, data of human rights organisation and media reports show.

Hours before the imposition of the sanction, a suspected "robber" was killed in a "gunfight" between Rab and "a gang of robbers" in Barguna's Patharghata upazila. Just four days before, two more suspected "robbers" were killed in another such "shootout" with the elite force in Bhola.

Three accused in the Cumilla ward councillor murder case, were killed in two "gunfights" between police and criminals early on November 30 and December 2 last year.

Human rights defenders say the pause in such killings shows that continuing killing in the name of "gunfight" or stopping it solely depends SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

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Six killed in 2 road crashes in Kushtia

Six people have been killed in two road accidents in Kushtia over the last two davs

Four of them died after a tipper truck hit a battery-run rickshaw coming from the opposite direction on Kushtia Jhenidah highway in Battail Dakshinpara area of Kushtia sadar, said Idris Ali, OC of Kushtia Highway Police.

Muktar Hossain, a rickshaw driver, and three passengers of the vehicle died on the spot around 5:30am yesterday, he said.

The three were identified as Jasmine, 30, of Swastipur, Rozina Khatun, 28, and Swapna Rani, 45, of Haldarpara of the upazila. They were workers of a local beedi manufacturing factory.

The truck was seized but its driver fled, said the OC, adding that another injured in the accident was receiving treatment at Kushtia General Hospital.

The bodies were kept at the hospital, he said.

Two more people were killed as the driver of another tipper truck lost control over the steering and hit a motorcycle in Taragunia area of Kushtia's Daulatpur upazila around 9:00pm on Sunday.

The victims – Bidyut and Rajan, both 38 and from Kaipale village of the upazila were on the motorcycle. They died on the spot, said OC SM Jabid Hasan of Daulatpur Police Station.

He said angry locals stopped the truck and set it on fire.

The driver managed to flee, he added.

Guliakhali beach now a reserved tourism zone

Guliakhali Sea Beach, a unique sea beach located in Sitakunda upazila, was declared a reserved area for tourism yesterday.

The civil aviation and tourism ministry made an announcement in this regard, bringing 259.1 acres of the beach under its protection as khas land.

The ministry notification said the area was being affected by unplanned establishments. The protection will also allow development of tourism in the beach, it said.

Lush Kewra forests crisscrossed by a dense network of thin canals give this beach a unique appearance. The canals swell during high tide. Unlike other beaches, it does not have sand, being covered with green grass instead.

The beach is only five kilometres off Sitakunda bazar. It has recently beendeveloped into a popular tourist spot for locals and travelers wishing to see a

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday called upon the country's people to keep up the pace of the economic progress that the country has achieved in the great stride of all to build "Sonar Bangla".

"InshAllah, we'll change the fate of distressed people by implementing the dream of the father of nation. I also urged the people of the country to keep up the progress already achieved for building Sonar Bangladesh," she said.

The PM was presiding over a programme titled "Jatir Pita Mukta Swadesh-a" (The Father of the Nation in his Independent Homeland), joining it virtually from the Gono Bhaban.

The National Implementation Committee for Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's Birth Centenary Celebration arranged the ogramme at BTV's Shaheed Monirul Alam Auditorium in the capital, marking

the 50th historic Homecoming Day of Bangabandhu after the 1971 Liberation War.

Hasina said the goal of her government is to change the fate of the people for whom Bangabandhu liberated the country, struggled throughout his life, endured repeated incarcerations and repression, and dedicated his life.

"Today, I express my gratitude to the people of Bangladesh as they kept their trust in me and I've got the scope time and again to work for the development of the people, coming in power," said Hasina, the eldest daughter of Bangabandhu.

She said people came to know about a complete plan to rebuild independent Bangladesh from the historic 10th January Speech Bangabandhu delivered after returning home from Pakistan jail in 1972.

Now police press charges against JCD leader

Police have pressed charges against Elias Khan, a Chhatra Dal leader in Chattogram, in an arms case filed by Rab with Akbar Shah Police Station. Since Elias's arrest on November 26, his family members have been alleging that he was framed by a team of Rab after being picked up by law enforcers in plainclothes from the street near a shop he owned.

Elias, currently behind bars, is a former vice president of Chattogram City Chhatra Dal. Rab said it arrested Elias with a double-barrel pistol and two cartridges from CDA Road-1 of Bishwa Colony.

He used to sit in his shop named "E & I Traders" just in front of Akbarshah Police Station.

Sub-inspector Biswajit Chandra Debnath of Rab-7 filed the case on November 27. Family members, however, alleged that a local Rab informant in connivance with the SI implicated Elias in the false case.

The Daily Star investigated the incident earlier and found some discrepancy between the witnesses' version and the case statement by the Rab. In a report published on December 18 titled "Ctg Chhatra Dal Leader's Arrest: Everything goes against Rab claim", this newspaper highlighted the discrepancies.

However, the charge sheet, submitted by Akbar Shah Police Station SI Mohammed Sayem, failed to find out the source of the firearms or how the JCD leader allegedly collected the firearms. The charge sheet does not even answer whether Elias had any intention to do any criminal activities carrying the firearms.

UP member shot dead in Abhaynagar

A newly-elected union parishad member in Jashore was shot dead at point-blank last night.

The incident happened around 8:00pm when Uttam Sarker, 34, was on his way home in Harishpur village from Shundali Bazar in Abhaynagar upazila.

He was attacked near Harishpur Primary School by assailants who were hiding in a bush.

The attackers shot him in the chest, killing him on the spot, said AKM Shamim Hasan, officer-in-charge of Abhaynagar Police Station. Uttam became a member of Shundali union parishad after he won in the UP polls on December 26.

The OC said they were trying to identify those involved in the killing.

"We are investigating the incident," he said. The incident follows the fifth phase of the UP election which concluded last week. At least 10 people were killed in polls-violence in that phase.

A total of 86 people have been killed in the various phases of the UP elections since they began in mid 2021.

The most number of deaths happened during the second phase when 30 people were killed.

Form EC thru law, not search committee JP (Manju) tells Hamid

Jativa Party (Manju) vesterday said the new election commission should be formed through the enactment of a law in line with the constitution and not through search committee.

A seven-member JP delegation, led by party chairman Anwar Hossain Manju, said this at a dialogue with President Abdul Hamid at the Bangabhaban regarding formation of the new EC.

In response, the president said he will try to meet their proposal in accordance with the power bestowed upon him as per the constitution, meeting sources told The Daily Star.

"There is a clear provision in our constitution stating that the election commission will have to be formed after enacting a law in this regard," Sheikh Shahidul Islam, JP (Manju) general secretary, told this newspaper after the hour-long meeting that began at 6:30pm.

"We told the president we did not suggest any name for a search committee as the constitution has no such provision [for forming the EC by a search committee].

"Rather, we told him that an EC should be formed comprising people who will be able to gain people's trust and hold a free, fair and acceptable election."

LEGALITY OF ICT CASE SC to hear Shahidul Alam's appeal STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The Supreme Court will hold a hearing on an appeal against the High Court verdict that rejected a writ petition of internationally acclaimed photographer Shahidul Alam, challenging legality of a case filed under Section 57 of Information and Communication Technology Act, 2006. The apex court

yesterday asked Shahidul to file a leave to appeal petition with this court within four weeks against the High Court verdict delivered on December 14 last year.

A six-member full bench of the Supreme Court's Appellate Division, headed by Chief Justice Hasan Foez Siddique, passed the order during hearing a petition moved by lawyer . Sara Hossain on behalf of Shahidul -- seeking stay on the investigation in the case. The HC on December 14 rejected the writ petition filed by Shahidul Alam, saying that the petition is not acceptable against the criminal case proceedings. On March 3, 2019, Shahidul filed the petition challenging the legality of the case, in which he was imprisoned for 107 days. Attorney General AM Amin Uddin represented the state during the hearing.

While authorities have taken an initiative to inoculate students of Chattogram, health guidelines are barely being followed during the vaccination campaign. Students and their guardians crowded the inoculation centres yesterday, with no social distancing in sight.

Hit by BRTC bus, 2 teens die in Chandpur

Two teenagers died as a BRTC bus hit their vehicle at Chandpur's Kachua yesterday.

The deceased are Sajib Hossain (18) from Budhunda and Atiqur Rahman (14) from Sachar Gopirdigheer Paar in Kachua. They were cousins. According to SI Abdur Razzaque of Kachua

Police Station, the accident occurred around 11:00am when four teenagers, including the two, were returning home on a tractor and a speeding Kachua-bound BRTC bus hit the tractor from behind near Shimultali area. The tractor fell into the adjacent canal, where Atique and Sajib drowned and died.

Locals rescued tractor driver Mehedi Hasan and Ful Miah and sent them to Kachua hospital. Monir Hossain, UP chairperson of Sachar, said

the Kachua-Sachar-Gauripur road is too narrow, which makes it accident-prone. "We demand that the road be turned into a four-lane one." OC Md Mohiuddin of Kachua Police Station

Visiting the venues, this correspondent found long queues of students in front of the buildings. The lines spilled onto the roads, creating traffic congestion. Guardians





Danger at Kulaura health complex

Aman harvest faces water stagnation problem

Age-old hospital lies in dilapidated condition

Sadek Mia recently went to Kulaura Upazila Health for the treatment of his child. But soon an eerie feeling gripped him looking at the bleak surroundings.

The two-storey building is worn out and crumpled.

"When I entered the building, I got panicked. The building might collapse anytime," said Sadek Mia.

His wife Husna Begum said the hospital itself is sick and battered. It needs to be treated first. Not only Sadek or Husna but also most of

Not only Sadek or Husna but also most of the patients coming to the hospital also feel the same, since some 30 rooms inside the building are in most dilapidated conditions.

The building's roof might collapse anytime, feared the officials concerned, adding that they have no other options but to work there as alternatives have not been arranged.

The building has a total of 30 rooms on the first and second floors. These rooms include the emergency department, two wards for male and female patients, a warehouse, a children's ward and offices.

During a recent visit, cracks were found on ceilings and walls. Plasters were seen falling off the walls and water kept on dripping from the ceilings. There were patches of rust on the doors and windows due to a lack of maintenance.

"We need to examine patients, which require time. But I am too scared to stay inside the building," said Resident Medical Officer Dr Zakir Hossain.

According to health department sources, the activities of the health complex started in 1967 in this two-storey building. At that time, it had 31 beds. It was upgraded to 50 beds by constructing another concrete building next to the old building in 2006.

Upazila Health and Family Planning Officer Ferdous Akter said every day about 200 patients come to the hospital for treatment in the emergency and outpatient departments of the health complex.

Monirul Haque, assistant engineer of the Department of Health Engineering in Moulvibazar, said a proposal to renovate the building at a cost of Tk 25 lakh has been initially approved by the higher authorities. OUR CORRESPONDENT, Pirojpur

Farmers in Pirojpur and Jhalakathi are facing problem to harvest Aman paddy as most of the paddy plants have remained under rainwater.

The growers said the ripe paddy in large areas of the two districts got damaged as the recent rain caused by Cyclone Jawad caused water stagnation in the fields.

Due to this, they are facing serious troubles in harvesting paddy of the fallen plants in the waterlogged fields, said farmer Nurul Islam of Charkhali village in Pirojpur's Indurkani upazila.

"It takes three to four days to

harvest paddy of fallen plants on one bigha of land while it took only one day to harvest standing paddy on the

same land," said Nurul. Another grower of the village Abdul Halim said labourers are also not showing interest to harvest paddy of fallen plants, much to the worry of farmers.

The farmers added that they store straw of Aman paddy as fodder of domestic cattle. They also use the straw to make roofs of houses.

"But this year we will have to face straw crisis as mostly of them have been damaged due to the rain," said farmer Saiful Islam of Bhaijhora village in Pirojpur Sadar upazila. The delay of harvesting Aman paddy for over three weeks will also badly delay robi plantation as it will take long time to dry up the fields, he added.

"This year we are anxious of being delayed of robi crop cultivation for around a month," said another farmer Mohammad Ali from the same village.

SK Tayebur Rahman, agriculture extension officer in Indurkani upazila, said the natural disaster has caused damage to average 30 percent mature Aman paddy of the upazila It has also caused huge damage to robi crops as mostly lentil plants grown in the Aman paddy fields got damaged, he added.

As Aman plantation is being delayed, it will lengthen the process of the plantation of robi crops including boro, said the officer.

According to the Department of Agricultural Extension (DAE) in Pirojpur, this year 61,630 hectares of land in the district have been brought under Aman cultivation.

Meanwhile, 48,000 hectares of land in Jhalakathi have been brought under Aman cultivation, said Md Monirul Islam, deputy director of DAE in Jhalakathi.

Defeated 'coup'

Says Kazakhstan leader, vows **Russian troops** will leave

AFP, Almaty

Kazakhstan's President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev said yesterday that his country had defeated an attempted coup d'etat during violence last week, and insisted that Russianled troops called in to help quell the unrest would go home "soon".

During a videoconference of leaders from several ex-Soviet countries in a military alliance that sent in the troops, his Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin confirmed they would leave as soon as their mission ended.

Life in Kazakhstan's Almaty appeared to be returning to normal yesterday, with internet coverage restored as the nation observed a day of mourning for dozens killed in the clashes. Tokavev told the video conference that "armed militants" had used the backdrop of protests to try to seize power. "The main goal was obvious...the destruction of government institutions and the seizure of power."

US-RUSSIA TALKS OVER UKRAINE CRISIS Expectations low

Nato chief warns Moscow of 'severe costs' if Kyiv attacked

With diplomats publicly pessimistic, the United States and Russia began difficult negotiations in Geneva yesterday that Washington hopes can avert the danger of a new Russian invasion of Ukraine without conceding to the Kremlin's far-reaching security demands.

Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov has said the diplomacy could end after a single meeting, and US Secretary of State Antony Blinken played down expectations for the high-stakes talks.

"I don't think we're going to see any breakthroughs in the coming week," Blinken said in a CNN interview on Sunday night.

The talks between Ryabkov and Deputy US Secretary of State Wendy Sherman began at the US diplomatic mission in Geneva with US-Russia relations at their most tense since the Cold War ended three decades ago. The pair made only brief eye contact when they posed for photographs beforehand.

Sherman said "the US will listen to Russia's concerns and share our own" in an earlier Tweet from Geneva, adding that no discussions on European security would be held without the presence of other allies. Discussions will move to meetings in Brussels and Vienna later this week. Nearly 100,000 Russian troops are gathered within reach of the border with Ukraine in preparation for what Washington and Kyiv say could be a new invasion, eight years after Russia seized the Crimea peninsula from Ukraine. Russia denies invasion plans and said it is responding to what it calls aggressive behavior from the Nato military alliance and Ukraine, which has tilted toward the West and aspires to join Nato, reports Reuters. Last month, Russia presented sweeping demands including a ban on further Nato expansion and an

end to the alliance's activity in central and eastern European countries that joined it after 1997. The United States and Nato say large parts of the

Russian proposals are non-starters. Meanwhile, Nato chief Jens Stoltenberg yesterday warned Russia of "severe costs" if it launches a further attack on Ukraine, saying he hoped crunch talks could chart a way towards a diplomatic

solution, reports AFP. "We are working hard for a peaceful political path and we are ready to continue to work with Russia to try to find that path towards a peaceful solution," Stoltenberg said before meeting Ukraine's deputy

prime minister. Ukraine's Deputy Prime Minister Olga Stefanishyna, appearing alongside him, said Russia's demands "cannot be considered as a negotiating position".

She told reporters the "aggressor is not in a position to put conditions" while Russian tanks remained near the Ukrainian border.

US President Joe Biden has repeatedly warned Russian President Vladimir Putin that the United States and European allies would impose tough sanctions if Russia chose to invade Ukraine Putir said new sanctions could lead to a "complete breakdown in ties.' In a preliminary meeting with Ryabkov on Sunday evening, Sherman emphasized Washington's commitments to sovereignty, territorial integrity "and the freedom of sovereign nations to choose their own alliances," the State Department said. Ryabkov told reporters his meeting with Sherman had been "complex but businesslike," Russian news agency Interfax said. If diplomacy fails, and Moscow acts against Ukraine, the US has been discussing with allies and partners in Europe and Asia a range of trade restrictions against Moscow, a source familiar with the plan said.

A report by The Quint had said that the "hate speech conclave" was organised by Hindutva leader Yati Narsinghanand from Dec 17 to 19 in Uttarakhand's pilgrimage city of Haridwar, where multiple calls to kill minorities and attack their religious spaces were made.

PM Imran, in a series of tweets yesterday, blasted Modi for his "continuing silence" and inaction against extremist Hindutva groups calling for genocide of minorities in the country.

Suu Kyi jailed for another 4yrs

A Myanmar junta court yesterday convicted Aung San Suu Kyi of three criminal charges, sentencing her to four years in prison in the latest in a slew of cases against the ousted civilian leader, a source familiar with the proceedings said.

The Nobel laureate has been detained since February 1 when her government was forced out in an early morning coup, ending Myanmar's short-lived experiment with democracy.

The generals' power grab triggered widespread dissent, which security forces sought to quell with mass detentions and bloody crackdowns in which more than 1,400 civilians have been killed, according to a local monitoring group.

A source with knowledge of the case told AFP the 76-year-old was found guilty of two charges related to illegally importing and owning walkietalkies and one of breaking coronavirus rules.

Junta spokesman Major General Zaw Min Tun confirmed the verdicts and sentences and told AFP Suu Kyi would remain under house arrest while other cases against her proceed.

Scourge of the road Implement ban on threewheelers on highways

HERE was nothing wrong with how the problem was approached: First, the government banned three-wheelers on 22 major highways in August 2015 to prevent accidents. Then, in January 2017, the High Court reinforced that diktat by ordering a ban on such vehicles on all major highways of Pangladesh. But the problem was with

by ordering a ban on such vehicles on all major highways of Bangladesh. But the problem was with the enforcement of that prohibition. The ban has been followed more in its breach than its execution. The situation, according to a report by this daily, has now turned so bad that the number of road accidents involving three-wheelers tripled last year compared to 2020, according to the Accident Research Institute (ARI) of Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet).

The causative factors have been well-identified, corrective measures have been recognised, and orders have gone out from time to time to the relevant people. Yet, we see a continued rise in the number of traffic accidents, because all the honest intentions of the administration flounder in the face of either lack of capability to implement the relevant rules and regulations or unwillingness to do so.

regulations or unwillingness to do so. The question is: Why? There can be nothing more disheartening, and indeed frustrating, than to hear the minister for road transport and bridges express his helplessness—and many times, too—in enforcing the ban on three-wheelers. One need not be reminded that nonimplementation of the orders of the court amounts to violation of its order.

The villain of the piece, according to the minister, are the local representatives who create obstructions in the way of implementing government orders. But imposing the authority of the government in this regard is literally a matter of life and death. Reportedly, along with the number of road accidents involving three-wheelers, the number of these vehicles has also given a quantum jump in that time.

But it is not only the authorised three-wheelers that compound the problem. The situation has been exacerbated by the appearance of contraptions of various shapes and sizes, powered by various devices that should not be seen anywhere, let alone on the roads and major highways. Are we to believe that the law of the land should be subjugated to the might of the local representatives—more so when that law has the backing of a court order?

Given the current state of road safety, one can be forgiven for questioning the seriousness of the government in addressing this issue. The sluggishness in implementing the so-called Road Transport Act is an index of the government's sincerity in this regard, as well as an indication of its helplessness against the might of the transport owners and operators who run the sector. The situation brooks no laxity. The laws and regulations should be implemented strictly and impartially. It is a question of people's lives.

W ITH Omicron spreading rapidly across the world, Bangladesh is bracing itself for the battle against a potential third wave of the pandemic. The health minister has already stressed that the country is prepared to fight the new variant. Earlier, health authorities had issued a set of 15 soon-to-be-enforced guidelines covering screening at entry points in the country, testing, quarantine, vaccination, and public movement and gatherings.

Meanwhile, according to media reports, the government has also been able to partly reinforce healthcare infrastructure to better handle the new wave, increasing the number of Intensive Care Units (ICUs) and High Dependency Units (HDUs) dedicated for Covid-19 patients.

In addition, more than 1,000 ventilators have been provided to hospitals at the upazila level and over 130 hospitals equipped with a central oxygen system. Abul Bashar Mohammad Khurshid Alam, the DG of the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), has been quoted as saying that oxygen generators are being installed in around 40 hospitals across the country. The government is working on installing more oxygen generators to support rising Covid caseloads.

However, the authorities must not lose sight of the fact that in the face of a fullfledged outbreak of the new wave, these reinforcement measures might not be sufficient. Over the last few weeks, there has been a noticeable spike in Covid-19 cases, with more Omicron patients being identified every day. On Monday morning (January 10), the country recorded a 8.53 percent Covid infection rate—with 2,231 new cases registered—a jump from 6.78 percent recorded on Sunday morning. Health experts fear a further rise in cases is imminent.

While the new measures being taken point to the farsightedness of the health authorities, including the National Technical Advisory Committee (NTAC) on Covid-19, DGHS, and other related bodies, their effectiveness would depend on how well they are enforced.

In the past, we have seen people "escaping" quarantine from hotels; public transports running over capacity despite restrictions; people grossly flouting social distancing guidelines, roaming around and enjoying long drives even during lockdowns (including misuse of the "movement pass" introduced to control public movement), or crowding restaurants, shopping malls, kitchen markets and other public spaces, often
 without wearing masks—the list goes on.
 Even while many countries, including
 our next-door neighbour India, struggle
 in the face of Covid-19 surges, the people
 here could not help but celebrate the

New Year or Christmas. Then there are those grand winter weddings that come with about half a dozen side events where hundreds, if not thousands, gather to other states including West Bengal and Karnataka have had to impose various other restrictive measures and weekend curfews to cope with the rapid increase in Covid cases.

In view of the current scenario, the government in Bangladesh should consider planning ahead for the worstcase scenarios, including by determining the size and scope of stimulus packages,



"bless" the brides and grooms. There are also the weekend parties with family and friends. These occasions provide the perfect breeding grounds for the Covid-19 virus. Unfortunately, these can only be contained with state-imposed curbs.

For the government, managing the crowd at airports is another sticking point, which has emerged as a major concern in recent weeks. With international flights being suspended for eight hours every day at the Dhaka airport due to on-going construction work for the third terminal, the airport authorities are under increasing pressure to accommodate the cramped flight schedules. It is only natural that the health desks and testing counters would be crowded too, and there should be strict enforcement of social distancing and testing guidelines for both in-bound and out-bound passengers to ensure their safety.

It is understandable that blanket curbs on public movement, including lockdown, support mechanisms and related logistics for those who would be most affected—especially small businesses and the underprivileged segments. This will help reduce public sufferings and the likely economic backlash. Pre-planned measures are usually better implemented. And in the context of the fast-changing Covid landscape, one cannot be too careful.

Omicron is highly contagious but comparatively less severe than other variants, with lower hospitalisation rates. Therefore, it might not be as demanding on our healthcare infrastructure as the Alpha or Delta variants. But the danger still persists. And with the virus mutating constantly, we cannot risk becoming complacent. We need to be on our guard at all times so that we can anticipate the new challenges and minimise the damage of the new wave. The new set of 15 guidelines also need to be enforced at the earliest.

The general public must also take ownership of their responsibilities and do their part to keep Covid-19 at bay. The government alone is not responsible for fighting the pandemic; it is the responsibility of each and every single citizen of this country. No matter how clichéd it sounds, we are in this together, and we can only flatten the curve if we put up a united front.

T is frustrating to learn that two illegal brick kilns in Lalmonirhat Sadar upazila, demolished by the Department of Environment (DoE) in February last year, have resumed their operations in full swing. In fact, as alleged by the locals, these brick kilns actually never stopped their operations. Right after a mobile court of the department demolished them, the owners repaired them and started their operations.

The brick kilns were demolished reportedly after protests by local farmers, as their croplands were losing fertility due to the heat generated by the kilns, as well as the toxic emissions. Now that they have started running in full capacity again, the farmers fear that it will further aggravate the situation, resulting in less agricultural production.

Unfortunately, this is not the only case in which powerful businessmen have ignored directives from the authorities concerned and continued with their mindless business. In the past two years, many such closed or demolished brick kilns resumed their operations, ignoring orders from the authorities to stop them permanently. Only last year, five illegal brick kilns in Barguna district resumed their operations after being demolished by the local administration. According to reports, this has been happening in other districts, too.

The question that arises is: How can the owners of these kilns violate orders from the High Court in this regard without facing any consequences? The sincerity of the DoE as well as the local administrations in carrying out demolition drives and stopping the kilns for good also come under question.

In case of the brick kilns in Lalmonirhat, what the DoE did was partially demolishing the kilns, leaving scopes for the owners to repair those immediately and run them without much delay. Does the DoE's job end with just conducting a mobile court drive? Do they have no responsibility to monitor what happens afterwards? Would one be wrong in assuming that the demolition drive was nothing but an eyewash?

It's well known that brick kiln owners are usually powerful people, and the affected local residents and even those in the local administrations hardly raise their voices against them, fearing consequences. It is also common knowledge that, sometimes, people in the administration work as their cohorts, emboldening them to go on with their business.

We, therefore, urge the higher authorities to take immediate action against the owners of these illegal brick kilns, whose action is not only reducing our overall agricultural production, but also polluting air and ruining the surrounding environment. at all times so that we can anticipate the new challenges and minimise the damage of the new wave.

N OVAK Djokovic, the world's top-ranking tennis player, has just been granted a medical exemption to take part in the Australian Open. Djokovic, who has won the event nine times (one more victory would give him a recordbreaking 21 major titles), refused to show proof of vaccination, which is required to enter Australia. "I will not reveal my status whether I have been vaccinated or not," he told *Blic*, a Serbian daily, calling it "a private matter and an inappropriate inquiry."

The family of Dale Weeks, who died last month at the age of 78, would disagree. Weeks was a patient at a small hospital in rural Iowa, US, being treated for sepsis. The hospital sought to transfer him to a larger hospital where he could have surgery, but a surge in Covid-19 patients, almost all of them unvaccinated, meant that there were no spare beds. It took 15 days for Weeks to obtain a transfer—by then, it was too late.

Weeks became another of the many indirect victims of Covid-19—people who never had the virus, but died because others who did were taking up scarce healthcare resources, especially beds in intensive care units. His daughter said, "The thing that bothers me the most is people's selfish decision not to get vaccinated, and the failure to see how this affects a greater group of people. That's the part that's really difficult to swallow."

Last month, Rob Davidson, an emergency room physician at a hospital in Michigan, wrote an essay for the *New York Times* that provided a vivid picture of life in a hospital that had consistently been at or near capacity for several weeks. The overwhelming majority of the patients had Covid-19, and 98 percent of those needing acute critical care were unvaccinated.

What happened to Weeks was happening at Davidson's hospital, too: those in need of more specialised treatment could not be transferred to a larger facility, because nearly every hospital in the region was already full or close to it. Davidson is unable to view the choice not to get vaccinated as a private matter. "It forces patients with ruptured appendixes and broken bones to wait for hours in my emergency department; it postpones surgeries for countless other people and burns out doctors and nurses."

There has been considerable opposition to vaccine mandates—opposition that I have argued is misguided. With earlier variants, the unvaccinated are more likely to infect others. With the more contagious Omicron variant, the extent to which current vaccines reduce infection and the ability to spread the virus is less clear. But we do know that vaccination reduces the severity of the illness, and therefore the need for hospitalisation.

For the situation that Davidson described, and that Weeks' children

believe led to their father's death, a different solution is available, one that respects the decisions of those who choose not to be vaccinated, but requires them to bear the consequences of their choice. Hospitals that are at or near capacity should warn the populations they serve that, after a certain date-far enough in the future to allow ample time for people to get fully vaccinated—they will give vaccinated patients priority over unvaccinated patients with Covid-19. The unvaccinated patient, or the family of that patient, may object. But if the move is in accord with a previously announced policy, and everyone had the opportunity to be vaccinated before the policy took effect, people who make choices that are likely to harm others, and have been warned of the consequences of those choices, must take responsibility for them.

Hospitals with sufficient capacity should, of course, continue to treat unvaccinated patients with Covid-19 as best they can. Despite the extra strain this puts on hospital staff, everyone should have sufficient compassion to try to save lives. Exceptions should be made for those few patients for whom vaccination is contraindicated on medical grounds, but not for those who claim to have religious grounds for exemption.

Such a policy is likely to increase vaccination rates, which will benefit the currently unvaccinated as well as the vaccinated, and save lives—just as vaccine mandates have saved lives by increasing the number of vaccinated people. But even if the policy does not persuade more people to get vaccinated, at least fewer people would die from health conditions over which they have no control.

2021 gives us reasons to hope for climate justice





LIMATE crisis aside, 2021 will be remembered with anguish and misery around the world due to the Covid-19 storms. Without a doubt, 2021 felt like a terrible repeat of 2020. The pandemic now seems like a lifetime experience, threatening us with new variants every now and then and unnerving the global experts and

Thunberg, held a "funeral" for COP26. The high hopes for COP26 in Glasgow meetings were perhaps never going to be fully met in view of the pandemic, which indeed forced the summit to be delayed by a year. The build-up to COP26 left no doubts that 2021 experienced extreme weather events globally in terms of floods, droughts, heatwaves, and wildfires. Amid all these disappointments, a US climate activist reported, on a positive note, some climate justice "wins" for 2021. The wins are a mix of climate actions and land and indigenous people's rights, which are very fascinating stories in their own right.

Despite many challenges, 2021 saw some improvement on the climate justice front.

first Native American to be appointed as the US interior secretary, was another victory in 2021. A fierce Democratic Congresswoman, Haaland always focused on combating the climate crisis. As the secretary of the Department of the Interior, Haaland will play a crucial role in the Biden administration's ambitious efforts to combat climate change and conserve nature. The appointment was both historic and symbolic. Under her leadership, the department will now manage all public lands, endangered species and natural resources in the US, and establish rights of Native Americans.

To many, climate justice is a racial justice too. In 2021, the US city of Evanston in Illinois has begun the process of slavery reparations by giving out housing grants of USD 25,000 to 16 Black residents towards housing repair or costs. The city has established an initial fund in the amount of USD 10 million for distribution to its Black residents for the legacy and trauma of past racist housing policies. Experts consider this a "noble start," which may serve as a model for the future. Many more cities may take this step as an example in the wake of the Black Lives Matter movement in the US and elsewhere.

Canada, in February 2021, joined a global movement to recognise both indigenous law and the rights of nature by declaring Magpie River a legal entity. The majestic Magpie River runs nearly 300km in Quebec's northern region, and is culturally significant to the local Innu people. This will help the Innu to uphold their rights of sacred and ancestral rivers, forests and mountains for the benefits of all. Likewise, the Peruvian Kakataibo tribe formally secured 370,000 acres of their ancestral lands in July 2021 to keep them protected from stealing by nonindigenous outsiders. The Australian government recently moved to return 395,000 acres of land to the eastern Kuku Yalanji people. The transfer of land to the Natives put them in direct control and management of their ancestral lands-a key step to helping address and reverse the climate crisis.

Another important victory in 2021 was the scrapping of the controversial Keystone XL Pipeline Project by President Joe Biden that aimed at building a massive crude oil pipeline

from Alberta, Canada to refineries in Illinois and Texas in the US. This was the result of a decade-long indigenousled resistance and campaigns by environmentalists in Canada and the US. Similar stories of resistance were reported from many other corners. For instance, a predominantly Black community in Memphis, Tennessee came together to stop the 49-mile crude oil pipeline from becoming a reality, because the residents feared that the pipeline would harm their way of life and general well-being.

There are also other wins in many different countries, particularly those living through and adapting to climate changes. For example, the Maldives, which is no stranger to climate risks, is beginning to turn the tide by working closely with local communities to manage wetlands that are critical to reducing climate change impacts for creating a safer archipelago. For Pacific Islanders, both land and ocean have a huge economic, political and cultural significance. Tuvalu, a small island country, is in peril, but its residents are fighting back by introducing measures to protect the environment and natural resources. Bangladesh, already viewed as a climate success story due to its determined policies and adaptive strategies, is currently the chair (2020-2022) of the Climate Vulnerable Forum (CVF), a platform of 54 countries from Africa, Asia, the Caribbean Islands, Latin America and Oceania that are facing climate crisis. The CVF, under the leadership of Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, held a strong lobby at COP26.

The 2021 climate justice wins underscore the importance of people's power and representation. As evident, many grassroots organisations around the world are working to deal with the climate crisis, empower the people at risk, and mobilise resources for adaptation and resilience to climate change impacts. From this point of view, and all that has been already said and won, it seems that 2021 was not as bad a year for climate justice. However, it was not enough, as the UN secretary-general described. We should, therefore, be better prepared for COP27, to be held at Sharm El-Sheikh in Egypt in November 2022.

Bangladeshi mountaineer Shayla Parvin Bithi successfully conquered the Island Peak of the Himalayas, a 6,160-metre mountain in Nepal. Born in Swarupkathi Pirojpur, Shayla has been visiting hill tracts since 2014. She visited Chandranath Hill with her

Himalayas for the first time in 2015. Her recent achievement was conquering the Island Peak of the Himalayas, which was also her first self-organised adventure. After three days of preparation, Shavla started her journey on October 28 of last year from Lukla, Nepal. After three

hours of journey to Phakding, Shayla and her guide reached Namche Bazaar on second day. Her planned itinerary took a turn as she visited Thame and Lungden. After that, she started her extended trekking, including three challenging 5,000 m passes: Renjo La on November 2, Cho La on November 4 and Kongma La Pass on November 6. After these treks, Shayla reached Chukung, the last village before the Island Peak basecamp. On November 7, Shayla and another Indian team started their journey from Chukung to the basecamp.

She completed climbing the Island Peak on the evening of November 8; it took her 11 days to reach the peak. She trekked back to Luka on November 11. "A part of my plan is to conquer an 8,000 meter

mountain in 2022," asserted Shayla.

She also expressed her concerns regarding the trend of young people visiting mountains across the world. "I hope the younger and future mountaineers will take proper preparation and advice as well as equipment along with them, when they decide to go trekking, because faulty or unsuitable equipment do not just hinder the journey, but also create discomfort, which essentially ruins the fun of trekking," she says.

In celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the independence of Bangladesh, Shayla took a portrait of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and another placard to promote her anti-rape campaign on her journey.

The inaugural ceremony of ICDET was held on December 28, 2021. Hon'ble Adviser (Minister) to the Prime Minister for Power, Energy, and Mineral Resources Affairs, Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh Dr. Tawfiq-e-Elahi Chowdhury, BB graced the ceremony as the chief guest. Mr. Moinuddin Hasan Rashid, Chairman & Managing Director of United Group and member Board of Trustees and Professor Dr. Moshiul Hoque, Chair of IEEE Bangladesh Section were present as special guests. Professor Dr. Chowdhury Mofizur Rahman, Vice Chancellor of UIU presided over the programme.

The audiences were welcomed by Professor Dr. Intekhab Alam, Head of the EEE department and Technical Chair of ICDRET 21 followed by a speech from Dean of School of Science and Engineering Professor Dr. Ragibul Mostafa and Professor Dr. M. Rezwan Khan, Organizing Chair of ICDRET 2021.

Mr. Moinuddin Hasan Rashid expressed his delight to see ICDRET being held for the 6th time and reiterated his support to UIU for the advancement of research in RE and other fields. United Group being one of the major power producers (IPP) of the country, he stressed the importance of the IPPs to come forward to install RE based power stations.

In his inaugural speech, the chief guest Dr. Tawfiq-e-Elahi Chowdhury pointed out the technological challenges like food security and land usage for PV farms, power system stability due to intermittent nature of RE based sources, importance of innovation in energy storage like battery to address the peak power problem in the evening etc. In his opinion, we should focus more on clean technology like nuclear power than specifically on renewable energy. There can always be limited use of fossil fuel-based power generation if carbon capture technology can be made cost effective. He also stressed the importance of innovation in adopting clean technology for power generation.

Expressing his gratitude to all parties involved in ICDRET, Professor Dr. Chowdhury Mofizur Rahman said that UIU is always supportive to Research and Development activities and as an example mentioned the enviable success of Mr. Shahriar Ahmed Chowdhury, Director, Centre for Energy Research (CER) in establishing solar mini-grids, providing consultancy services to the large scale govt. funded solar PV projects and achieving international awards like UN's 'Momentum for Change' award, Intersolar award etc.

Mr. Shahriar Ahmed Chowdhury, Director, Center for Energy Research (CER), UIU and Co-chair of the Organizing Committee of ICDRET 2021 gave the vote of thanks to the involved parties to make the conference a success.

Invited Talks

Five invited talks were delivered at the ICDRET 2021 by eminent researchers and policy makers. The first invited talk was presented by Dr. M. Ryyan Khan, Assoc. Professor of East West University on "Techno-economic Prediction of Agrivoltaics: Prospects of Long-Term Sustainable Energy Growth in Bangladesh". He presented his research findings on the possibility of using crop fields for the PV power generation and its opportunities and threats. As investment in a specific area of land can be 30 to 50 times higher with PV in comparison to the crop, it will be a natural tendency to go for PV power generation instead of crop production. So, such a co-generation will require policy intervention so that the crop fields are never electric materials also.

Mr. Mohammad Alauddin, Chairman of the Sustainable and Renewable Energy Development Authority (SREDA), presented a presentation titled "Promotion of Renewable Energy in Bangladesh: SREDA's Role." SREDA is the only cell dedicated to promoting renewable energy and is committed to mitigating climate change challenges by boosting renewable energy and implementing energy efficiency measures. Currently, the total contribution of renewable energy is 777.31MW (including off-grid). He discussed the challenges of generating 10% of total capacity from renewables, including land scarcity, institutional capability, a comprehensive RE map, intermittency, financing, subsidized energy tariff and location reliance, and etc. SREDA's successes in RE promotion include a national database, net metering rooftop solar system calculators, and an E-service desk for solar. In addition, the Kushtia Municipality, the International Center for Climate Change and Development,



used for intense PV installation and the crop yield does not drop more than 5-10%. Even with a 5% compromise in the crop production, the net return from an Agrivoltaic project can be 10 to 20 times higher than a crop only field. Without any proper policy, there will be a tendency for total PV installation as it is economically more rewarding by a factor more than 10.

Mr. Shahriar Ahmed Chowdhury in his invited talk "Renewable Energies in Bangladesh: Challenges and Opportunities" discussed in detail the challenges, including both technical and economic challenges, that Bangladesh may face when the percentage of renewable share in the power system gradually increases. He also pointed out possible options like floating PV farms that can minimize the land usage to address the issue of food security. He presented a proposed road map for the growth of renewable energy integration in our power system to move towards a carbon neutral power system.

Professor Dr. Nowshad Amin, UniTEN, Malaysia, a distinguished researcher in the field of solar cell technology expounded on "Thin Film Photovoltaic (PV) Technology - From Inception to Successful Commercialization of CdTe" presented his talk on the future prospect of Cadmium Tellurium PV cells as a viable alternative for silicon solar cells (the most popular solar cell material of present time). It is a lower cost material, easier to process and manufacture solar cells and can lead to cheaper solar electricity. Its market share is already on the rise.

Dr. Al Jumlat Ahmed of University of Wollongong, Australia discussed on the possibility of using thermal waste energy to the International Finance Corporation, the Bangladesh Economic Zone Authority, and the BGMEA have all signed Memorandums of Understanding (MoU) with SREDA.

Professor Celia Shahnaz of Dept. of EEE, BUET, the newly elected first Bangladeshi member in IEEE Women in Engineering, discussed the opportunities that IEEE can bring for the women engineers in particular but researchers and professionals in general. She also stressed on the application of IoT and signal processing in different renewable energy sectors to make the system smart and cost effective.

Technical Sessions

For this year's ICDRET, the organizing committee received a good number of articles from different countries of the world. After rigorous reviews (at least three blind peer reviews) by renowned experts on the relevant field, Technical Committee, chaired by Professor Dr. Intekhab Alam, UIU, co-chaired by Professor Dr. Kaled Masukur Rahman, UIU selected less than 35% of the papers for presentation. The papers presented covered a varied spectrum of research and field level experience on renewable energy technology broadly classified into four categories- RE Application, PV Technology, RE Policy and Other RE. Moreover, with the technical support from IEEE, all the presented papers would be published in IEEE Xplore digital library, thus allowing global exposure for the participants.

Besides the technical sessions, a workshop on State-of-the-art solar cell technology and Factors affecting Solar PV Generation was conducted on the first day of the conference.

BPL postponed by two weeks

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) has decided to postpone the upcoming Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) by two weeks but remained unmoved to consider appointing foreign referees to conduct its important matches as the league is scheduled to begin on February 3 at venues outside Dhaka.

"The clubs have requested us to provide full fixtures with venues after giving a good period to the new coach [Javier Cabrera] of the national football team ahead of two friendly matches against Indonesia [on January 24 and 27]," said league management committee chairman and BFF senior vice president Abdus Salam Murshedy after a meeting at the BFF House.

Participating clubs in the Independence Cup and Federation Cup have raised serious questions over the standard of the surface at the Birshreshtha Shaheed Mostafa Kamal Stadium and the quality of refereeing.

"The league matches will not take place at the astro-turf," Murshedy continued.

"We aren't thinking of foreign referees because they won't have an idea about who is a big team or a small team and it will lead to another controversy. Rather, we want to stay in the same sequence by appointing and promoting local referees," Murshedy concluded.

Meanwhile, the league committee allowed three more teams - Azampur FC Uttara, Gopalganj SC and BFF Elite Football Academy to play the 12-team second-tier football league titled Bangladesh Championship League, set to begin on Feb 20.

RAJIB seals chess title

Grand Master Enamul Hossain Rajib became champion in the Golden Jubilee of Independence 46th National Premier Chess Championship by beating FM Subrota Biswas in the 13th and final round in Dhaka yesterday.

Rajib had to wait for day's outcome between GM Niaz Murshed and IM Minhaz Uddin Ahmed Sagar before celebrating his fifth title of the national championship as Rajib avoided a title deciding play-off match after Niaz lost to Sagar. Had Niaz beaten Sagor, Rajib and Niaz would have been tied on 10 points, prompting a title deciding play-off.

With the defeat in last match, Niaz finished in third position with nine points while GM Ziaur Rahman who beat CM Sharif Hossain, finished second with 9.5 points. "This time the championship was very competitive as I had to face challenges from all GMs and IMs while the promising players also gave some tough time to all," Rajib said. "The race was initially confined among Niaz bhai, Zia bhai and me before the

The last time Bangladesh produced exciting wickets, which had everything for bowlers and batters, was during the 1998 ICC KnockOut Trophy, also known as the mini World Cup. The curator for those pitches was none other than Nazmul Abedeen Fahim, a mentor to national team stars and also involved as national game development manager. If anyone can talk about surfaces, it is him.

What is a half volley on other surfaces becomes the most potent delivery at the Hagley Oval.

"It's the half volley length that troubles batters, provided you swing the ball. Our bowlers expected the swing from looking at the pitch, but it came as a shock when it didn't." Fahim dictated.

"Their bowlers managed to get the swing.

You don't have to be a Kiwi to swing the ball. Only the seam control gets you that swing, a wobbly seam is not going to do it. The seam has to be vertical so it swings in the air before pitching and the ball itself has to stay in air long enough for the swing to occur. Our bowlers didn't have that seam position which is the primary condition for swing and thus pitching further up may not have produced the movement needed," he added.

However, a pace unit lacking in experience cannot be expected to get it right on first opportunity.

"Particular pitches have different challenges and bowlers also have their natural lengths which are not easy to adjust. You need the experience and the knowledge to create artificial circumstances [at home]

Bangladesh batting crumbled too on day two, slumping to 126 all out. Yasir Ali, who stayed the most still and played late, was able to show the most application. Tushar Imran, a veteran in the domestic circuit, believed lack of experience of such surfaces was showing.

"I think our batters are not accustomed to bat in such pitches and it will be harsh to blame them. The more our batters play on similar pitches at domestic competitions, it will help them to adjust whenever they go abroad," Tushar opined while he remained hopeful of gaining something for the future.

"It's not the end of the world and if we can display a better performance in the second innings, it will help us to gain confidence for the coming days."

Djokovic drama continues

World tennis number one Novak Djokovic was released from Australian immigration detention on Monday after winning a court challenge to remain in the country, but the government said it was still considering another move to deport him.

Djokovic said he was "pleased and grateful" at the judge's decision to reverse the cancellation of his visa and he still hoped to play in the Australian Open.

"Despite all that has happened, I want to stay and try to compete @AustralianOpen. I remain focused on that," he tweeted.

Judge Anthony Kelly ruled the federal government's decision last week to revoke the Serbian tennis star's visa amid a row over his medical exemption from COVID-19 vaccination requirements was "unreasonable" and ordered his release.

Djokovic, who arrived in Australia last week in pursuit of a record 21st Grand Slam title at the upcoming Australian Open, spent the day at his lawyers' chambers and did not immediately appear in public or make any statement after the ruling.

A spokesman for Immigration Minister Alex Hawke said he was considering

using his personal power to again revoke Djokovic's visa.

"The minister is currently considering the matter and the process remains ongoing," the spokesman said.

The controversy has been closely followed around the world, creating diplomatic tensions between Belgrade and Canberra and sparking heated debate over national vaccination rules.

Serbia's parliamentary speaker, Ivica Dacic, said he was concerned Hawke could still deport Djokovic, a move that would bar the 34-year-old from the country for three years. Spanish rival Rafa Nadal called the drama surrounding the build-up to the tournament, which starts on Jan. 17, a "circus".

"Whether or not I agree with Djokovic on some things, justice has spoken and has said that he has the right to participate in the Australian Open and I think it is the fairest decision to do so," Nadal told Spanish radio Onda Cero.

There has been huge global interest in the case, but the authorities' efforts to let the media and public follow events in court at times descended into farce as pranksters hijacked the internet links to stream loud music and porn.

Bus, launch fares likely to go up

Unvaccinated won't be allowed to man commercial vehicles, vessels

The government yesterday decided that only those vaccinated would be allowed to staff vehicles and vessels.

The sector has to face trouble if the decision is implemented, as the number of those who received the Covid shots is poor, say people involved in the business.

Another decision that buses and launches will have to operate at half capacity might push up the fares again. The owners have already hinted at that.

A Cabinet Division circular, issued yesterday, said the restrictions will be effective from Thursday, but it has empowered the authorities concerned to set the date from when the transport-related restrictions would come into force.

Following the sharp rise in Covid-19 cases, the government yesterday issued a set of restrictions to reduce virus transmission.

The circular said buses, trains, and launches would be operated at half capacity and drivers and assistants of all types of vehicles must have Covid-19 vaccination certificates.

The government in March 2020 and April 2021 imposed restrictions on carrying passengers in buses, trains and launches. At that time, bus and launch fares

were increased by 60 percent on condition that they would carry 50 percent their capacities. But the train fare remained the same.

Osman Ali, general secretary of Bangladesh Road Transport Workers' Federation, said they have no exact data on how many transport

workers have had the vaccines. However, the number would be around 40

percent, he told The Daily Star yesterday. Osman said they had demanded the

government take steps to jab the transport workers at bus terminals on a priority basis as they have to deal with people.

But the government did not pay heed to their lemands, he said, adding that if the governmen enforces the decision, the transport sector would face the scarcity of drivers. Shah Alam, president of Bangladesh Noujan Sramik Federation, said very few of their 2 lakh workers were vaccinated. Operations of launches would be hampered if the government wanted to implement the decision, he said. Khondaker Enayet Ullah, secretary general of Bangladesh Road Transport Owners Association, said it would be difficult to operate buses with 50 percent passengers without increasing bus fare by 50 to 60 percent. Badiuzzaman Badal, senior vice president of Bangladesh Inland Waterways (passenger carrier's) Association, said, "We asked the authorities to talk to us before implementing any decisions." The bus and launch fares were raised 28 percent and 43 percent respectively in November last year after the government increased diesel and kerosene prices by Tk 15 a litre. Railways Ministry Secretary Humayun Kabir yesterday said they would sit today to decide when

OMICRON SURGE Britain puts pvt health firms on high alert

India begins booster campaign as Covid cases soar

Britain yesterday put the biggest private health companies on high alert to deliver crucial treatments should Omicron overwhelm National Health Service hospitals in England.

The United Kingdom's death toll from the Covid-19 pandemic stands at 150,154, the world's seventh worst official Covid toll after the United States, Brazil, India, Russia, Mexico and Peru.

British Prime Minister Boris Johnson has bet on refraining from lockdowns to deal with the Omicron variant which in recent weeks has swept across the United Kingdom, albeit with death rates significantly lower than previous waves.

In a sign of just how stretched the

National Health Service could become, Health Secretary Sajid Javid ordered England's NHS to strike a 3-month deal with private health companies to allow patients to get treatments such as cancer surgery outside.

"Millions of patients have already got their tests and treatment quicker thanks to our existing deal with independent providers," said David Sloman, NHS England chief operating officer and Covid incident director.

"It also places independent health providers on standby to provide further help should hospitals face unsustainable levels of hospitalisations or staff absences," Sloman said
